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

STUDY PROVES **QUAIL GET** THE VITAMINS

MADISON, Wis. (UP)-There's one thing you can stop worrying Quail are not suffering from a lack of vitamin "A".

There was a flurry of concern over that possibility about a year ago when a scientist published a paper on the extremely high vita-min 'A' requirements of quail and pheasants

The wildlife people knew domesticated fowl are susceptible to vitamin "A" deficiency during the winter and that their diets have to be supplemented with the addition of vitamins to their feed. Their conclusion was that wild life must have the same problem when snow covers their usual diet of green plant g r o w t h. Therefore, they feared, quail must be suffering

from a lack of vitamins.

The Wild Life Management Institute. Washington, D. C., assigned Donald Thompson, to find out if that could be the case. Thompson worked in the laboratories of the University of Wisconsin College of Agriculture for nine months, studying the livers of pheasants sent to him by field workers with permits to trap and shoot the birds in or out of season. Thompson found that the birds,

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
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
