WASHINGTON gleaming Army Superfortresses, winging 7,000 miles from Tokyo, landed at nearby Andrews Field today in a record-breaking flight climaxing the air forces 40th aniversary celebration.

As matters stand now, there is ample evidence that a majority in Congress would favor liquidation of all federal housing activities, returning the problem to private industry and local governments.




