WASHINGTON, D. C.—(NEA)—The half-dozen high-minded senators who have just introduced a resolution to aid peace by strengthening the UN are indubitably headed in the right direction. But they may be on the wrong track.



What seems to be needed is another international organization to go along with the ECANDSOC Council, UNRRA, UNESCO, FAO, ICAO, WHO, ITO and ILO. If this last-mentioned set of pronounceable initials were not spoken for by the International Labor Organization, it might do for a new International Love Organization. But since ILO is taken, the next best suggestion is UNLO.

It has a nice, Chinese, romantic sort of sound that is just right. United Nations Love Organization. To Unite the World by Love.

This idea was prompted by what happened in London last week when they announced the engagement of Princess Elizabeth to Philip Mountbatten. When the glad tidings were announced, the crowds gathered around Buckingham Palace and were happier than they had been at any time since before the war.

What Princess Elizabeth here proved was that Love has a way of making even world troubles disappear. And if there is anything the world needs today, it is to forget its troubles.

In the good old days they never had to bother about coal production, export controls, wool tariffs or economic conferences. When trouble loomed, the Kings got together and made a match between their eligible sons and daughters. That fixed everything.

The G's did their best to bring peace to the world by marrying girls they met in England, Scotland, France, Italy, Iceland, Australia or wherever they went, and bringing them here for keeps. But what's needed is more love at the higher levels. Whatever became of Stalin's son? Hasn't Molotov a daughter? Can't the British or the French arrange a match and substitute lace for iron in the turtlains when they set up housekeeping?

To support a United Nations Love Organization, each country could be asked to contribute a pro rata share of its national love wealth. Since the United States has Hollywood, it would probably have to pay the most. Russia would have an inducement to join because it could get in without cost. Russia doesn't love anybody and what love they do have in the communist state is said to be free. Okay, we could lease-lend them a billion kisses and they could pay us back 30 years from next Valentine's day.

A little more love in the domestic picture might help, too. There's an election coming up. There ought to be a lot more love planks in both party platforms.

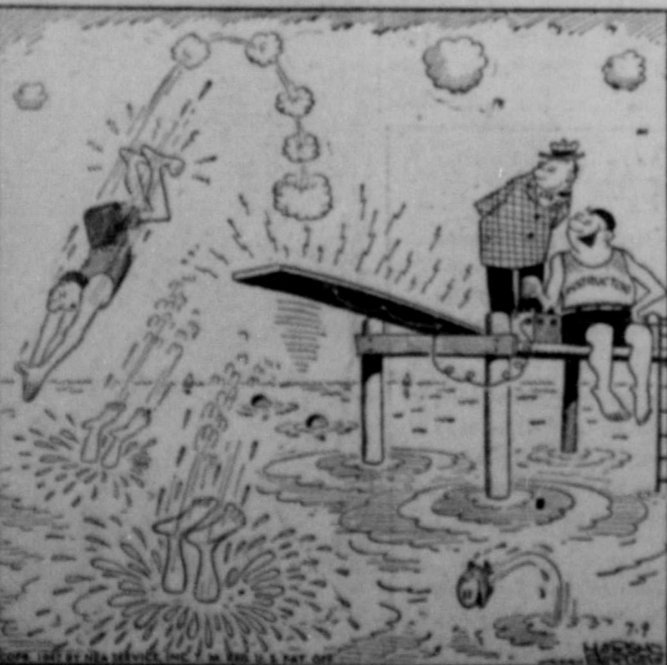

Pasteurized Milk So Much Slop Georgia Rebels Claim In Court

ATLANTA, Ga. (UP)— Pasteurized milk is generally accepted as wholesome and healthy in most parts of the country, but Georgia Commissioner of Agriculture Tom Linder says a lot of it is "slop."

"It has 24,000,000 dead bacteria to the level teaspoon," says Linder, "and that's enough to kill anybody who drinks it." Some Georgians were inclined to agree with Linder.

His outburst against supposedly innocuous pasteurized milk wasn't considered as fantastic as his recent book in which the dignified commissioner prophesied the coming of the millennium in 2008 A.D. a conclusion researched through Biblical numerology.

There was no numerology involved in a recent injunction granted by an Atlanta court which prevented enforcement of a new city ordinance requiring all milk sold in the city to be pasteurized. Linder was one of the most vociferous supporters of the injunction which was granted to Frank H. Neely, a wealthy Atlanta department store executive. Neely believed Atlantans, including himself, shouldn't have to buy pasteurized milk if they preferred raw milk.

Neely's suit resulted in the injunction and in Linder's blast at pasteurization methods in Georgia.

Linder said his fight wasn't against pasteurization, but against "selling slop in grade A milk bottles." He contended that was exactly what would be allowed under the Atlanta ordinance.

He said "pasteurization" did not remove bacteria. "It merely kills it." He added that the dead bacteria would rot.

The state milk control board stood off in a neutral corner and said nothing. W. W. Lively, chairman of the board, explained, "I don't think we would consider it our business."

Dr. James F. Hackney, head of the Atlanta health department, refused to be so passive. He countered that "dead bacteria are not dangerous to anyone."

Atlanta's neighbors in DeKalb county watched the feud and fuss and with interest. They were stinging under a pasteurization ordinance that went into effect July 15.

A DeKalb supporter of the pasteurization edict, health commissioner J. R. Evans admitted the ordinance would not be strictly enforced at least until dairies in the county obtained pasteurization equipment.

Several dairymen argued that pasteurized milk didn't have the flavor of raw milk.

They hinted that there might be some bootlegging.

FAULTY VOTING BILL UPSETS CHICAGO'S ELECTION PLANS

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (UP)— No one knows exactly how Illinois will elect its 26 representatives in Congress in 1948.

Discovery of a one-word drafting flaw in the congressional reapportionment act passed by the legislature June 17 put lawyers and politicians into a dither. As Gov. Dwight H. Green's administration moved for a speedy court test of the law, they foresaw these possibilities:

1. The state supreme court may throw out the entire law, ruling that the state must continue to elect one congressman at-large and 25 congressmen from districts set up in 1901.
2. The court may uphold the whole law. Then the state could proceed to elect its members of the House of Representatives from 26 new districts, eliminating the congressman-at-large post.
3. The court may rule that the

only constitutional part of the new law is the section repealing the reapportionment act of 1901. In that case, some lawyers said, all 26 congressmen might have to be elected by all of the state's voters, instead of one being elected in each district.

The outcome of the court test will determine whether the Cook-Lake County metropolitan area, including Chicago, will gain the three new congressional seats awarded it by the new law. The law gives 13 districts to Cook and Lake Counties and 13 to the state's other 100 counties.

Although the Democrats have their main Illinois strength in Cook County, political effects of the new law—if it is upheld—are uncertain. The Republicans who drew the law and pushed it through the legislature said frankly that it was not designed to give aid and comfort to their political enemies.

Green signed the redistricting bill despite the opinion of Attorney General George F. Barrett that the drafting flaw made it unconstitutional. The governor said inclusion of the words "village of Stickney" instead of "township of Stickney" in the description of the new fifth district was a "minor technical error."

A literal interpretation of that section of the law would mean that voters in the Cook County township of Stickney, except for those in Stickney village, were in no congressional district and

therefore disenfranchised. The governor announced that a "friendly suit" would be filed in a lower court with the hope that it could be advanced to the supreme court in time for a decision before the primaries next April.

If the law is thrown out, reapportionment backers will have to begin a 32-year-old battle all over again. They have fought in the courts and in the legislature since 1915 for redrawing Illinois' congressional districts. With Greek's backing, they beat down a week-long filibuster by reapportionment foes to pass the law this session.

U. S. Machines Aid Chinese Farmers

NEW YORK (UP)— Because the good earth is "turning sour," Chinese farmers are to be taught to church plant food back into the soil scientifically.

Faced with the problem of decreasing yields as the nation's centuries-old soil is eroded by floods and excessive cultivation, China's government has sent an appeal to America for modern farm equipment. Joseph W. Frazer, president of Graham-Paige Motors Corporation, discloses that his firm is shipping 40 multipurpose rototillers, each equipped

with bulldozer and planter attachments, to the farm schools of Nanking University and National Peking University.

Using a newly-developed principle of tillage, these machines, Frazer said, have high-speed rotary tines which pulverize the soil break up the humus fertilizer or other organic matter and mix it thoroughly through the root area where it can nourish the crops. By the rotary tillage principle, the work of plow, disc and harrow is done in a single operation.

Selected farmers throughout China will be trained in use of the machines at the universities, Frazer said, and then will become "agricultural missionaries" to their fellow farmers.

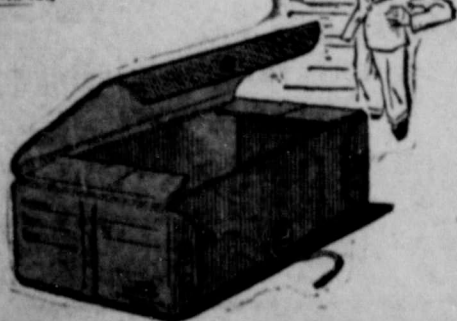

Plenty Of Trouble Ahead In 1948 Old Moore's Almanac Tells World

 LONDON (UP)—They laughed when Old Moore's Almanac said there would be a world crisis—and 18 months later along came Munich.

They tittered when the venerable volume founded in 1697 as "Dr. Francis Moore's Prophetic Hieroglyphic Engravings" said there would be a Socialist sweep—and something over a year later the Tories were out in the cold.

Hittlers' Anschluss with Austria, the general strike of May 3, 1926 ("to the day"), the outbreak of the war ("exclusive to readers of Old Moore's"), the abdication of King Edward VIII, and the atom bomb on Japan—Old Moore's has called them all.

Thus, ye of little faith, hearken to what Old Moore alleges is in store for the world in 1948 which it terms "The Year of Realism." Harkens—and clean out the storm cellars. Hard times are coming.

The big tip for Britain from the Old Moore's forecast is a national strike in the latter part of February. Troops may have to be called out, says the almanac.

His incessant, raucous-voiced complaint: "This country is going to Hell, G-- d--- it!" finally riled the neighbors so they hollered for the cops. Above, Billie's owner, Ike Walton, former Kansas City, Mo., chief of police, remonstrates with his pet, but the profane poll turns his head away, sticking to his contention.

The day was July 24, 99 years from the day Brigham Young viewed Great Salt Lake valley for the first time and told his band of religious refugees, "This is the Place."

Riding hard, the modern pony express relay arrived in East Salt Lake City at the anniversary moment when the Mormon pioneers heard their leader describe the desert valley as the "Zion" of the Mormon religion.

This week, again on July 24, Utahns and thousands of tourists will note the climax of an eight-year program of planning involving millions of dollars.

The scene again will be at the emigration canyon knoll which affords an impressive view of the tree-shaded valley the Mormons have fostered out of a sand and sagebrush strewn desert.

Utah began plans for its centennial observances in 1939. The celebration now reaches its height with festivities dedicating—the Henefer-Salt Lake road and state park and the heroic 12 foot bronze statue of Brigham Young and his counselors, placed on a huge pillar of Utah marble overlooking the prosperous metropolis.

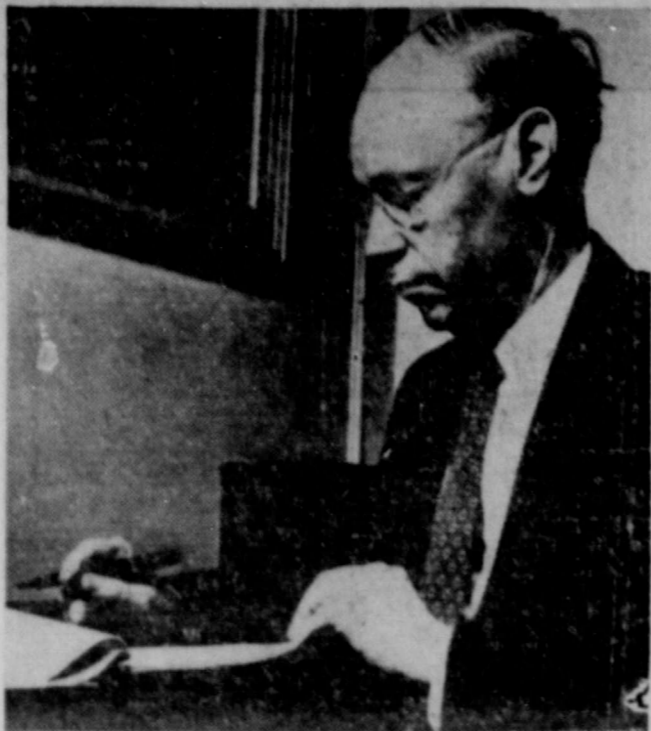
