WASHINGTON, D. C .- (NEA)-President Truman's 10-year \$6 billion flood-control program today seems headed for the political battlegrounds—to be kicked around between the two parties and

He cut back last year's appropriations on flood control and reclamation projects to reduce his budget expenditures. Heretofere he has advocated delaying public works until housing and other wartime construction shortages were relieved or using public works to

In his recent 35th Division speech at Kansas City, however, he criticized Congress for its cuts in reclamation funds. And he follows this up now




