Fire Department To Bring Mills Bro. Circus Here

Charlie Isabell, fire chief, announced today that the fire department will sponsor the appearance of the Mills Brothers Circus in Ranger on October 15.

Two performances will be given, an afternoon and evening show and proceeds from the sale of tickets will go toward purchasing new uniforms for the firemen.

The show will set up on the softball field and will be given under a fire proof and water proof all-weather tent. It is a three ring circus with 250 people in its employ, including 14 clowns.

Tickets will go on sale soon and may be bought from members of the fire department. The department will get 50 per cent of the tickets sold in advance, 25 per cent of what a circus advance man will sell, 10 per cent of all tickets sold at the gate and 10 per cent of all reserved seat sales. Breck Man Makes Bond On Failure To Stop Charge

W. J. Harrison of Breckenridge indicted by the Eastland county grand jury on a charge of failure to stop and render aid in connection with a car-truck accident a few weeks ago on the Cisco-Breckenridge Highway when H. D. Doyle of Cisco had an arm torn off, has made bond in the amount of \$1,500, Sheriff J. B. Williams stated this morning.

Doyle, driving his car with his arm out of the window had his car sideswiped by a truck going in the opposite direction and his arm torn off. It was picked up 16 miles up the road in the direction in which the truck, allegedly driven by Harrison, was traveling.

COOL WAVE USHERS IN AUTUMN

Autumn arrived officially today. It brought the season's first real cool wave to states north of the Mason-Dixon line. In the south, the second tropical storm of the "hurricane season" buffeted the Florida citrus crop.

A belt of light frost formed across the northern states. The cold moved slowly across the midwest, and top-cats popped into sight for the first time this fall.

From the Dakotas, Minnesota, Northern Iowa and Wisconsin the cool air moved across the Great Lakes region, dipping into Indiana, Illinois and Ohio.

The light frost that touched northern Iowa's corn crop moved along with the cool snap. But the weather bureau said it was a "light frost" and the danger to the crops was "very small."

In Florida, winds up to 60 miles an hour snapped trees, clipped telephone poles and caused other damage. The weather bureau warned that the storm was increasing, and might become even more serious.

The coldest spot early today was Cadillac, Mich., where the temperature dropped to 39 degrees.

Federal Grand Jury Summons Meat Packers

CHICAGO—A federal grand jury summoned representatives of the nation's big four meat packers—Wilson, Armour, Swift and Cudahy—today to tell why meat prices are so high.

It called the first of 42 meat industry officials subpoenaed in the government's investigation to determine whether a conspiracy existed to force meat prices upward.

The packing executives and employees faced a critical audience. The 23 grand jurors included 14 housewives who themselves faced the daily problem of feeding families with prices high.

British Mail To Be Subject To Opening Again

LONDON—The treasury announced today that beginning Oct. 1, mails into and out of Great Britain will be liable to opening and search for illicit money or valuables sent by post to contravene the rigorous currency regulations.

A treasury spokesman said the practice of opening mail, abandoned since wartime, would be restored to "detect sterling notes, diamonds, postage stamps and other valuables."

Any suspect goods found will be confiscated, the spokesman said, and "if it is evident that an offense is being committed, prosecution may follow."

Gordon Gray Made Assistant Army Secretary

WASHINGTON—President Truman today appointed Gordon Gray, Winston-Salem, N. C., publisher, as assistant army secretary.

Gray since 1937 has been president and publisher of the Piedmont Publishing Company, which operates the Winston-Salem Journal, the Twin City Sentinel and radio station WSJS.

During World War II he volunteered as a private in 1941 and was commissioned a second lieutenant in the following year. He served in the European theater in Gen. Omar Bradley's 12th Army group, leaving the service in 1945 as a captain.

Merchants Urged To Set Up Sound Credit Systems

With government credit control on durable goods scheduled to be lifted November 1, merchants throughout the State are adjusting and reorganizing their credit operations with the view of giving prompt and courteous service to their patrons, Erwin E. Singleton of Beaumont, President of the Retail Merchants Association of Texas, today advised the Ranger Retail Merchants Association.

Singleton cautioned all merchants in Ranger, big and small, to set up their credit operations on a sound and conservative basis.

"It is to the interest of both the merchant and the patron—as well as to the welfare of the community that wild spending on credit be discouraged," he said.

Singleton said both he and other representatives of the Retail Merchants Association of Texas were visiting as many cities of Texas as possible, helping merchants adjust their consumer credit reporting divisions and encouraging merchants to use their Credit Bureaus to the utmost extent.

"Although the lifting of the government credit restrictions will mean the individual merchant will be free again to work out payment schedules with his individual customers, neither should a merchant encourage spending beyond means, nor should the consumer seek to buy merchandise he is unable to pay for within a reasonable length of time," Singleton said.

"A good credit rating is a very important thing in any community. It means that a family is operating on a sound basis. The best policy for consumers to follow is to plan their credit buying so that obligations can be met promptly on due date."

Singleton said that during tours of several sections of Texas, he had found there were thousands of new business establishments which had not previously operated under unrestricted payment schedules. The attention of each of these merchants should be called to the availability of the services of the consumer credit reporting division of their local association.

It was pointed out that consumers in Ranger had been exceptionally cooperative and understanding during the war years of government controlled retail credit, and on behalf of the merchants of Ranger the association expressed their appreciation.

ATTACK BROUGHT ON BY KOREA, ITALIAN ISSUES

UNITED NATIONS HALL, Flushing, N. Y.—Russia accused the United States today in the United Nations General Assembly of willfully seeking to break its postwar international agreements.

Soviet Delegate Andrei Y. Vishinsky made the charge shortly after UN Secretary General Trygve Lie solemnly warned the U. S. and the USSR that unless they compromise their differences, their diplomatic war will wreck the UN and lead to an "intolerable" war.

Vishinsky's attack on the United States was made in a fight to remove from the agenda of the UN assembly the American proposal to consider the Korean stalemate and the Argentine proposal—supported by the United States—to soften the week-old Italian peace treaty.

Vishinsky charged that UN consideration of the Korean deadlock would be a violation of the U. S.-USSR agreement to settle that problem jointly.

Bulgaria Says Petkov Executed

SOFIA, Bulgaria—The Bulgarian government announced today that it had hanged Nikola Petkov, the opposition leader whose execution the United States had said would jeopardize the establishment of representative democratic government in Bulgaria.

Petkov was executed at midnight Monday, a communique issued two hours later by the government of Communist Premier Georgi Dimitroff said. It related that he was executed before the Sofia district prosecutor after a special commission from the ministry of justice had reported there was no ground for commutation of sentence.

(UP)—When citizens of Galveston's West End decided they were tired of having all their justice court cases held downtown in a "foreign" precinct, they decided to do something about it. They will soon have a neat and well-equipped combination "courthouse" and community center all their own.

The community center project was added when the citizens decided they needed a place to talk over such things as building court-houses.
Martin Hansen, a house-moving and building contractor, offered to donate a government surplus building he had just bought. And another citizen, Joe Glaviana, and his wife, donated a couple of lots they could spare. Others followed with offers of a butane gas system and to furnish and install electrical wiring and equipment. More than \$600 in cash has been collected and enough man hours of labor promised to finish the job.

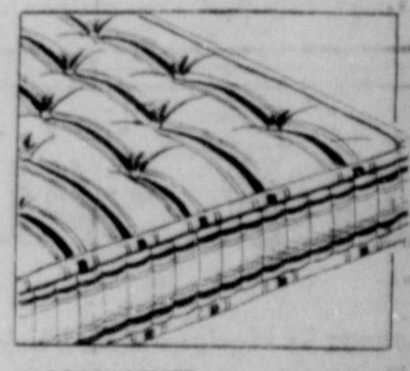

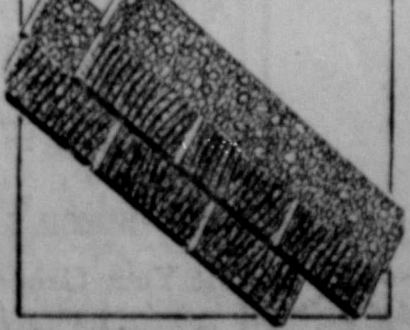

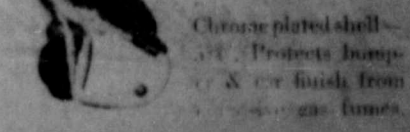
