In studying rock cuttings of drilled walls, by observing rocks exposed at the surface, by electrical means, and by theory the geologist arrives at his conclusions.

Oil and gas can be found along old shore lines, in sandstone and limestone horizons where there is a change in porosity, in buried sand bars, in reefs, in buried sandstone and limestone hills, and in many other geological features.

In finding oil several conditions are absolutely necessary. First. there must be a source for the oil second, there must be a porous reservoir to hold the oil, a n d third, there must be a tight cover over this reservoir, usually shale. 


