

WASHINGTON, D. C .- (NEA) -The job ahead of Secretary of Commerce Averell Harriman's "Committee of 19," in trying to work recommendations for carrying on the Marshall plan to aid Europe,

The group is made up of 10 big-shot bankers and businessmen, like Owen D. Young, six nationally known economists of the caliber of Dr. Harold G. Moulton of Brookings Institute, two representatives of labor organizations and one lone representative of the public, ex-Senator Bob LaFollette, Jr., of Wisconsin.

Since it was named three months ago, the Com-nittee of 19 has had two meetings, and done prac-ically nothing. There is little chance that the Paris report on requirements for the 16 western


