COUNTRY DOCTOR IN PENNSYLVANIA RE-EDUCATED

HARRISBURG, Pa. (UP) — Pennsylvania is passing along the latest know-how in medicine to the man who never had much access to it—the country doctor.

Leading medical centers of the state have put 160 instructors on the road.

This new venture in medical education, sponsored by the Pennsylvania Medical Society, received an enthusiastic reception from some 840 physicians of small towns and rural areas.

"We optimistically planned for 600 registrants for this course," said Dr. Charles W. Smith, chairman of the society's graduate education committee. "We were forced to shift our teaching centers to larger quarters as the doctors flocked to take the instruction."

The "students" attend one eight-hour class a week in the nearest of six centrally located instruction centers. The course lasts ten weeks.

The instructors are medical experts from leading training institutions of Pittsburgh and Philadelphia. They lecture morning, afternoon and evening on the practical phases of diagnosis and treatment, explaining the best techniques known to the profession.

Of the 840 doctors who took the opening course, 580 were general practitioners, most of them from small communities and rural areas. Sixty-two were specialists in internal medicine, 61 were surgeons, 32 were obstetricians and gynecologists, and 25 were neuropsychiatrists.

"This program has proved," Smith said, "that the general practitioner, especially the typical country doctor, seeks to keep himself abreast of the latest progress in medicine."

In view of the program's success, Smith foresees an extension of the service so it will be within reach of more doctors.

"In no other way can the country doctor learn so much for so little outlay of time and expense," Smith said. "We are preparing to open additional teaching centers and employ more instructors."

Teaching centers at present are in Allentown, Harrisburg, Johnstown, Oil City, Wilkes-Barre and Williamsport.

Smith hopes the rest of the nation will take a cue from the results in Pennsylvania.

He said "there never has been anything like this in medical training anywhere in the world. The Pennsylvania program well can be a pattern for other states."

MILWAUKEE (UP) — The Cudahy fortune was founded on the meat packing business and young Mike Cudahy of the present generation has a fondness for animal hides—on a drum in a hot band.

Cudahy, 23, has realized an ambition to get away from the meat packing business and has wrapped up his talents in founding a phonograph recording company.

Mike not only founded his own company but has been the inventor of several novel devices in the recording business.

Cudahy is the originator of the "double groove" in records and it isn't a hep-cat term, his company claims. It's a mechanical process whereby the same side of a record can play two distinct and separate recordings without turning the record over.

Say Fire Will Destroy Badly Needed Wheat

CHICAGO (UP) — Enough grain to feed 5,000,000 starving people for a year will go up in flames during the next 12 months. That's the prediction of Dr. David Price, past president of the National Fire Protection Association, who says 10,000,000 bushels of grain will be destroyed in food processing and storage plant fires during that period.

The farm protection committee of the NFPA estimates that America's 1947 farm fire loss will be about \$80,000,000. In terms of \$3-a-bushel wheat, that amount would fill a freight train nearly 10 miles long.

Georgia Will Display Her Own Freedom Train

ATLANTA, Ga. (UP) — Georgia will have its own Freedom Train.

The State Agricultural and Industrial Development Board has set aside \$5,000 for a special railroad car exhibit of Georgia's documentary history in connection with the national Freedom Train.

Board officials say that Georgia's more than 100 documents, flags and relics will comprise the exhibit including the act by which the state ratified the federal constitution and flags of early settlers and those killed on battlefields.

The train, to be known as the "Georgia Heritage Exhibit," will accompany the regular Freedom Train when it arrives for a tour of Georgia.

Demands Action On German Issue

LONDON — Secretary of State Marshall demanded today that the council of foreign ministers act now on fundamental German problems "in order to end the present division of Germany."

Marshall hurled his challenge at the other foreign ministers as the council began serious discussions of the fundamental economic and political problems of Germany.

Marshall sharply criticized statements of Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov, who during the past two weeks has urged creation of what he called an all-German government.

"The United States wants there to be an 'all-German' government just as soon as there is an 'all-Germany' to be governed," Marshall said. "But," he added, "we regard it as dangerous to the security of the allied nations and to the peace of the world, as well as to the peace of mind of the German people themselves to pretend that the mere setting up of a central German would result in healing the division of Germany. The United States wants a real government and not a facade."

HARRIMAN TOLD TO REPORT ON U. S. EXPORTS

WASHINGTON — The House today approved a resolution requiring Secretary of Commerce Harriman to provide full data on shipments abroad of scarce key commodities and on the extent of unfilled foreign orders.

The resolution does not require Senate approval. It directs Harriman to give the House interstate commerce committee the specified export information on such items as farm machinery, automotive equipment, coal, oil, grain and building materials.

Republicans opposing administration requests for new authority to fight inflation have argued that present export policies are responsible at least in part for high prices.

The resolution was approved by voice vote. It calls for information on exports from Jan. 1, 1947 to the most recent available date.

Before the vote was taken, House Democratic leader Rayburn of Texas told the House that in view of Republican attacks on administration export policies, "I will be glad to have the full facts developed on this and perhaps the fog will be cleared away."

The veterans enrolled in Ranger Junior College met Wednesday morning, December 3, for the purpose of organization. Of the 55 veterans enrolled in Junior College, 37 were present.

Tel Aviv Target Of Arab Attack

JERUSALEM — Swarms of Arabs attacked the Jewish city of Tel Aviv today as other Moslems in Egypt and Lebanon rallied against the partition of Palestine.

Moslems throughout the middle East used their sabbath religious services to pray for Palestine and further inflame Arab feelings.

Arabs tumbled out of their mosques in Jaffa and headed straight for the Jewish city of Tel Aviv. Jewish defenders answered with a stream of flying bullets.

At least three Jews were killed and a number wounded. The Hagana defense force also reported Arab casualties.

Another Jew was killed and a Briton wounded when men of unknown nationality attempted a holdup in Haifa.

In Damascus, the Syrian parliament voted to draft all 19-year-olds for 20 months of Army service that could be extended indefinitely in case of war.

10 Thousand Troops Take Over As More Join Strike

PARIS—Ten thousand French colonial troops imposed virtual martial law on strike-torn Marseille today and the vanguard of 1,200,000 civil service workers answered a call to join the strike which throttled the economy of France.

Marseille strikers tried to storm a rail station in the so-called "Red capital" of France, but were beaten back by combined security forces. The colonial forces took up positions throughout the city, whose traffic save for tanks and military vehicles, was halted by roadblocks.

Furries of disorder erupted throughout southern France and in the coal fields of the north, while in Paris the paralyzing grip of strikes and power failures stopped the subway trains for a time.

Three groups of civil service workers began a five-day strike protesting a government reclassification raising their wages, but not meeting their demands.

Premier Robert Schuman's drastic anti-strike program went before the Council of the Republic, the upper legislative house, with final approval apparently assured.

Four southern provinces were put on alert when strikers were reported massing in ariège under "foreign" leadership.

Authorities feared that a spark might touch off violence which would engulf all of the provinces in the Communist stronghold of southern France.

Manhunt On For Youthful Thief

HUGO, Okla. — Shotgun blasts fired by a youthful petty thief suspect wounded a Choctaw County deputy sheriff and a railroad special agent at a farmhouse near here today and a big manhunt was organized to track the gunman.

Brown Page about 28, a deputy sheriff, was seriously wounded by two charges in his arm and right shoulder. Jackson Jones, about 45, special agent for the Rock Island Railroad, was blinded in the right eye and wounded about the face.

The two officers were shot about 8:30 A. M. in front of the home of Bill Gene Michael, 27, suspected in the theft of a chain hoist in Hugo.

Congress Asked Again For Powers

WASHINGTON — Acting Interior Secretary Oscar Chapman asked Congress again today for standby presidential power to ration and control the price of coal and oil to avert a possible "national economic catastrophe."

He told the Senate - House economic committee that coal and oil "shortages have created an imbalance in our economy which is charged with dangers, the most imminent being the danger of runaway inflation."

Chapman also asked Congress to 1. extend the government's power to allocate transportation beyond its present death date in February and 2. make "immediate provision" of funds — \$750,000 a year—for the government to gather data on coal and oil so that changing conditions can be foreseen.
