Next thing you know, nations start being polite to each other. It's as simple as that on the stage, with St. Francis, Joan of Arc, Tom Jefferson, Ben Franklin and Abe Lincoln uttering great truths in trick lighting effect blackouts. You may recall that this Moral Re-Armament-MRA-movement

stems from the Oxford movement, started in England by Doctor (of Divinity) Frank N. Buchman. It spread to America through organzed, weekend house-party confessionals for young folks. IN England, during the war, the outst was clamped down on for






