## Peanut Sellers Awaiting Army Contracts

Shelled peanut prices held firm in the southwest this week despite slow trading, according to the Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Sellers showed a tendency to wait for contracts to be let for Army purchases, but a few lots sold for February and March delivery at 16 1-2 to 16 3-4 cents a pound for No. 1 Spanish.

All major peanut producing regions had about completed picking. A little farmers' stock still moved, mostly at support prices, although good quality Virginias brought a slight premium. Many
