

#### Taft Challenges Stassen In Heart of Stassenland

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—Another round in the Stassen vs. Taft fight for the GOP presidential nomination was fought Feb. 11-12 in the Twin Cities of Minneapolis and St. Paul. Space Stassen is invading Senator Taft's home state of Ohio, Taft retallated with an invasion of Stassen's home state of Minnesota.

Stassen himself wasn't there. He was in Pennsylvania, His big Lincoln's birthday anniversary speech was in Germantown, Pa. Stassen's interests in his home state were therefore turned over to Sen. Raymond E. Baldwin of Connecticut.




