Grain Market Drop Causes **Outbreak of Political Jitters**

WASHINGTON-(NEA)-Grain market breaks have a nade a lot of people jittery. There's a great temptation to say, "This is it," meaning the depression is here.

If the break is only temporary, yet still serves to brand on fuller realization of the dangers of further inflation, it can be a good thing. On the other hand, too much of this fear that the country is now in the first grips of a recession is bad psychologically, and can only

promote a worse depression.

A break on the commodity market is not considered suft cient evidence on which to base a prediction of immediate disaster, say government economists. For one thing, the break has been of six ort duration. Department of Agriculture has been saying since lasti fall that the price of wheat was unrealistically high, in view of the 1,40 2,000,000 bushel supply. The present drop may be a natural price read, atment. It's too early to tell just what it does mean.

THE grain market is only one part of the economy. Emple yment is still high. Industrial production is still high. Profits an atill high. Wages have not dropped. General price levels are still high. This does not mean that it's time for one of those bland assurances that there's nothing to worry about. Everyone should know that just

isn't so. There are still too many danger signs ahead.

While no one is smart enough to say just what the effects of this grain market break will be on general business conditions, it can have important political consequences.

At this crucial time, even a mild recession can have great effect on Marshall Plan legislation, on the tax program, on coming wagerease demands, on rent control, price control, rationing and other inflationary proposals now before Congress. Lt may influence




