### Ranger Man Aids Warns Against Inactivating Of Navy's Shps

George E. Gideon, chief shipfitter, USN, husband of Mrs. Marion Gideon of Orange, Texas, and son of Mrs. J. W. Gideon of 300 South Hodges, Ranger, Texas, is serving with the Submarine Group One, Texas Group, Atlantic Reserve Fleet, Orange, Texas, and is engaged in the inactivating of the Navy's surplus ships.

The ships of this fleet undergo a change known as "Operation Zipper." Upon arrival at Orange they are moored alongside other members of the fleet and inactivation is begun. Part of the equipment is removed and stored below decks, and the remainder is given a weather-proof plastic or metal covering to prevent rust and deterioration. After inactivation is completed, the ships are placed under close supervision to avoid possible damage.

### Public Invited To Coronation Of College Queen

Officials of Ranger Junior College today extended a cordial invitation to the public to attend the annual ceremonies for the coronation of the college queen Friday night at 8 o'clock at the Recreation building.

The identity of the queen will not be made known until the time for the crowning. Dr. G. C. Boswell, president of the college, will crown the queen and Michael Healy, president of the student council, will serve as master of ceremonies.

Motif for the coronation will be Texas Independence and the college song just written by S. Omar Berker of Sapello, New Mexico, will be sung for the first time at a public gathering.

The doors to the building will be closed promptly at 8 o'clock and no one will be admitted after that until after the coronation.

The court of the queen will be attended by representatives of a number of high schools and other colleges.

### Western Bloc Delegates Hear Stirring Talk

BRUSSELS—Delegates of five nations meeting here to draw up a western European union found a "great similarity of views" on first examination of a proposed treaty draft, it was announced today.

Meeting amid an atmosphere of urgency, delegates spent 85 minutes listening to a keynote speech by Belgian Premier Spaak and examining a draft agreement submitted by the Benelux—(Belgium-Netherlands-Luxembourg) countries.

Some reports said the agreement, which will bind Britain, France and the Benelux countries together in opposition against the westward march of Communism, would contain military clauses in addition to cultural, social and economic provisions.

A communique issued after the meeting said examination of the Benelux draft "revealed a great similarity among the views of the five nations on the question of principles the accord is to realize."

### Republicans In House Ready To Settle Tax Cut

WASHINGTON—House Republican tax spokesmen were reported today to settle for an income tax cut of about 5 billion dollars a year.

The House has approved a bill to reduce taxes by more than 6 billion. The Senate, which will debate the bill later this month, is expected to cut the amount of tax relief.

However, acting Senate Republican leader Wherry said he was willing to support the full amount of the house bill.

"If the Democrats won't go a long, lets make it a campaign issue and take it to the country," he told reporters. "I want to go the limit on it and I'll support the highest amount I can."

Republicans on the Senate finance committee appeared more interested in passing a bill that would survive a presidential veto.

### Says Blood Will Be Price If Red March Unhalted

WASHINGTON—Lt. Gen. Albert Wedemeyer, former commander of American troops in China, said today the United States "will pay in blood" unless steps are taken now to halt the march of Communism.

Wedemeyer, now the Army's planning chief, said that American economic assistance to other nations must be backed by military aid of the "vast movement" of Communism is to be stopped.

Specifically, he urged Congress to give military as well as economic assistance to the strife-ridden Chinese nation.

Testifying before the House foreign affairs committee on the administration request for 570 million dollars for economic aid to China, Wedemeyer broke sharply over the question of military aid.

He said that he was a personal admirer of Marshall but that "we apparently have an honest difference of opinion" over military assistance.

"I don't think dollars alone will stop the spread of Communism anywhere in the world," he said.

### Micheal Claims "Abdication" Forced On Him

LONDON—Michael of Romania proclaimed today that the Communists forced him to "abdicate" under stern threat of plunging his country into a blood bath, and that he still considered himself to be king in fact.

Michael broke the silence he has maintained since he gave up his throne on the last day of 1947 a few hours after he left the continent for the first time on the eve of his departure for the United States.

The 26 year old monarch served implicit notice that he was out to regain his throne when the time is right. Under the circumstances of his abdication he said he did not consider himself bound in any way by it.

### Rotarians Hear Reading Talk About Our State

R. L. Snyder was in charge of the program at the Rotary meeting Wednesday at noon at the Gholson Hotel and presented Miss Jo Oyler of the speech department of the fine arts department of Ranger schools. Miss Oyler introduced Joyce Cole, a student of the department who gave a reading on Texas.

Miss Oyler then gave some statistics on Texas showing why it is the greatest state in the union and some of the surprising "firsts" about Texas.

### WINNERS IN TEXAS POSTER CONTEST NAMED

It was announced today that Dan Mitchell of Hodges Oak Park school and the third and fourth graders at St. Rita's school were the winners in the Texas poster contest sponsored by the members of the Community Public Library board.

Members of the board were judges. Dan's poster was entitled "We The People of Texas March On" and the St. Rita's poster was labeled "Texas Our Texas." Each of the two first place winners will be given a year's membership in the library.

Three months memberships in the library were awarded to the following poster makers, John Henry Wiley, Mike Dean, Helen Rose Williams, James Falk, Nati Flores and Burl Williams.

The judges stated that an excellent poster was displayed at the library through Friday and then will be placed in the windows at Swaney's Pharmacy on Saturday.

### Treasure Hunters Find Large Hole In Hill County

Treasure hunters visited the University of Texas campus recently, seeking the "Department of Indian Hieroglyphics."

They were referred to Prof. T. N. Campbell, anthropology department chairman, who inspected a strangely marked rock they said they believed holds the secret of a buried treasure.

The two men related the story of a large hole in the hill country somewhere west of Austin (they would not divulge the location) which contains two underground chambers. They had found the rock in the semi-cave. Legend about the hole says that mysterious Indian drums have been heard and visitors to the cave have felt a hand on their shoulders, then looked around and saw no one.

Professor Campbell was unable to identify or decipher the markings on the rock, but the men expressed determination to continue their search. Treasure hunting is their hobby they indicated.

### Alabama Governor Named In Paternity Suit

HEPHZIBAH, Ga.—State troopers today trapped two desperate killers in a house near this Tobacco Road village and moved in with sawed-off shotguns and rifles to take them dead or alive for killing a fellow officer.

The two men and possibly a woman companion abandoned their automobile and took refuge in the house as officers cut off their escape by setting up road blocks over hundreds of square miles of east Georgia.

### May Wheat Hits Limit On Market In Chicago Today

CHICAGO—May wheat shot upward the full 10 cent limit on the Chicago Board of Trade today after Secretary of Agriculture Clinton Anderson announced that the government is "feeling" its way back into the market.

Anderson announced late yesterday that the government is going to "feel" its way back into the grain market by buying flour for export. The government has bought no wheat or flour since prices broke a month ago today.

Anderson said at a news conference that he has invited flour millers to submit offers to sell flour to the government equivalent to 9 million 300 thousand bushels of wheat.

Anderson also said the government plans to export 9 million bushels of raw wheat this week.

Meanwhile, a survey of United Press showed that retail prices of most basic foods have stopped dropping, and that the grain market has recovered as much as 50 per cent of the loss it took in the big price break which began a month ago.

### Ranger's Red Cross Drive Chairman Named

Mrs. Joseph M. Perkins of Eastland, Eastland County Chairman of the American Red Cross, announced today that Mrs. J. Floyd Killingsworth has been appointed as Ranger chairman for the annual funds drive for the Red Cross.

Mrs. Killingsworth stated this morning that she has accepted the appointment and will make an announcement in the next few days as to the organization for Ranger's drive.

Ranger this year has a quota of \$1,500 and it is hoped that it can be raised in the shortest time possible. Mrs. Perkins has set Monday March 8, as the official time for the start of the campaign in Eastland County.

Free Enterprise Nipped GARRETT, Ind. (UP)—Keith Haynes, milkman, had to pay \$15 in court for assault on Bradford White, another milkman. Haynes saw White leave two bottles of milk at a house and accused him of customer stealing. Haynes broke both bottles and White was cut on the face with broken glass.

### WOULD TIE IN WITH ERP AID PLAN; OUTSIDE OF UN SCOPE

WASHINGTON—Senate President Vandenberg today fought off efforts of a Republican bloc to saddle the European Recovery Program with an outright military alliance against Russia.

There were indications the proposal would not muster enough votes to pass but it nevertheless promised to enliven Senate debate on the 5 billion dollar ERP bill.

Republican whip Wherry told reporters the military alliance was necessary. Through use of the Soviet's veto power, he said, "The United Nations isn't working and the sooner we know it and get out of it the better."

The controversy raged around an ERP amendment backed by Wherry, Sen. Ball of Minnesota and several other GOP "revisionists."

Under the proposal, the U. S. would seek to establish outside of the UN an alliance of states willing to act against "Aggression or subversion" on the majority vote of a supreme council. No one big nation would have a veto.

### Boy Scouts To Put On Paper Drive In April

Fred Ellis and H. A. Shockey, scoutmaster for Troops No. 10 and No. 12, announced today that the boys of the two troops are going to stage a waste paper drive and have asked the cooperation of the people of Ranger.

At the suggestion of Mayor Lee Dockery the boys will make a house to house canvas of Ranger asking that the waste paper be saved for the drive which will be put on about the middle of April.

It was also stated that if the paper that is saved cannot be conveniently kept until that time for the drive, if the Scouts are notified they will pick it up at once, and store it until time for the drive.

### More Die In Helv Land Fighting

JERUSALEM—Jewish officials reported that the Arabs cut off a 23 man Haganah patrol north of Jerusalem today, captured 17 of its men and killed them when British forces approached to intervene in a running battle.

Six survivors of the Haganah dawn patrol into Arab territory near Ataroth along the Nablus Road reported that all of their comrades were slain by Arabs identified as Iraqi volunteers who surrounded and overwhelmed them.

Arab headquarters at Ramallah, in a report on the battle, said 15 Jews were killed in a four-hour fight.

## One Work Of Art Nazis Didn't Get

GLENDALE, Cal. (UP)—Hidden under the noses of the Gestapo during the war, the eight-ton statue "The Christus" stands today in Forest Lawn Memorial Park.

The statue, a replica of the Danish sculptor Bertel Thorvaldsen's work in a Copenhagen church, was unveiled here by the Danish-born film actor, Jean Hersholt.

More than 11 feet tall and made of Italian Carrara marble, it was ordered carved in Italy in 1938. It was not heard of during four war years, and only with post-war delivery here did the story come out.

The statue was discovered by the Nazi Gestapo after it already had been erected and stood ready for shipment on an Italian dock, according to Forest Lawn officials. But Italian underground workers boldly labelled it for delivery to Hermann Goering, who was then looting European art treasures, to forestall seizure. They later hid it for more than three war years.

BOSTON (UP)—A Boston manufacturer has announced a nationwide drive to thwart the "impending threat" of prohibition.

"No, relax. Not scotch or bourbon—bubble gum. It seems it's that bad. The industry faces a crisis. Groups of parents and teachers have formed angry anti-bubble gum cliques, he said. One Pittsburgh dentist even went so far as to say the ballooning confection caused buck teeth. "This is absurd," scoffed Thomas G. Wilder, vice president of Gum Products, Inc. "Everyone knows that if you huffed a hard puffed hard enough to distend your teeth you'd make very inferior bubbles. That is common knowledge."

"But," he admitted, "there are a few things that must be remedied. Kids have to stick to chewing bubble gum and stop wearing it. Also, this business of popping bubbles in school and church must stop. Those things are getting on people's nerves."

If the youngsters of America aren't taught bubble-gumming etiquette, said Wilder, "the next thing we know there'll be a law against the gum."

"There's no reason why bubble blowing and popping shouldn't be accepted on the Park Avenue, the Beacon Hills and the Nob Hills of this country—once the young are taught gum manners."

"The industry is trying to do just that. Clubs are being formed in the large cities," he said. "The youngsters will be given rings and badges and lapel buttons in exchange for solemn vows not to chew gum in the wrong places."

"They'll have to promise not to make a thunderous din while chewing—and not to discard the stuff on the living room floor. Things like that."

"The bubble gum business also has an answer to charges made by the Pittsburgh dentist," Wilder said. "Seeing is believing, so we have arranged for two Brooklyn, N. Y., children—Howard and Ann Ruskin—to tour various cities and show people their teeth. "Both chew bubble gum. Neith-

er has buck teeth. And, what's more," said Wilder in a final triumphant flourish, "their father is a dentist."

## Russian Royal Jewels Still Held In Pawn By Irish, Valera Admits

 DUBLIN (UP)—As pawn broker to the Soviet Union since 1920, tiny Ireland still holds a trove of Romanoff jewels worth an estimated 40 times the amount for which it was hocked.  
 The collection is said to include a magnificent tiara, a diamond necklace intertwined with pearls, and earrings and pendants with a total estimated value of \$400,000.

The jewels rest solidly in the vaults of the Bank of Ireland, still as beautiful as they were before twilight eclipsed the Russian royal family, claiming their lives as well as their possessions.  
 The story of the jewels, now almost a legend to those in Ireland who knew of the transaction, has reached the public because of politics.  
 Premier Eamon de Valera, fighting for his political life, was forced to reveal that Russia had never redeemed the jewels. They had been given to representatives of the Irish Republic in the United States as security for a loan estimated at between \$8,000 and \$10,000.

De Valera was answering Dr. Patrick MacCartan, who opposed him in the Irish general elections early this month.  
 Only a handful of Irishmen, mostly members of the old Irish Republican Brotherhood, knew of the deal whereby a mission of the the dollars it wanted desperately in exchange for the jewelry.  
 It was said that the collateral was valued at the time of the transaction at around \$400,000. While the collection was not part of the crown jewels, it had belonged to members of the Tsar's family.  
 The jewels reportedly were turned over to the Irish mission in New York. De Valera was a member of that mission.  
 With the greatest secrecy, the jewels were smuggled into Ireland in upholstered furniture.  
 The most believable account of how the jewels reached the government coffers was disclosed by Mrs. Kathleen Boland O'Donovan, whose brother, Harry Boland, was Ireland's representative in the United States at that time.  
 Boland reportedly was the actual recipient of the Russian security. In 1922, during the civil war,

he was found mortally wounded in the Dublin mountains.  
 Brought to his mother's house, according to his sister, the dying Boland directed that the jewels should be held and entrusted to DeValera when he returned to power, which he did in 1932.  
 De Valera told a recent political gathering that as far as he knew there had never been an attempt to redeem the pledge, or to obtain any expert assessment of their value.  
 Highly placed sources here said that the transaction was shrouded with secrecy to keep it from being used as propaganda to injure the young republic.

NEW YORK (UP)—Some 3,900,000 babies were born in the United States in 1947 to set an all-time record, the National Industrial Conference Board reports.  
 The first two years after the war produced far more babies than the first two years of the war, when births jumped to a new high, the board said. In fact, the second year of the war, 1943, produced 1,000,000 fewer babies than were reported for 1947.  
 The increased number of births had boosted the population by 13,000,000 since 1939. However, 1948 births are expected to fall below those of last year because 300,000 fewer couples were married in 1947 than in 1946.

governor has no right under the law to interfere," he said "I have a very definite and positive feeling that the purpose of the commission is primarily to interpret the needs of the public and when it fails to do so, it certainly is not serving the full purposes for which its appointment was intended."

Frank C. Hilton, Pennsylvania department commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, made a speech in Allentown two days later, declaring that the decision "borders on the despotism of dictatorship."

"I charge the commission with making a mockery of the term 'free enterprise'." Hilton said.

An organization of women's clubs condemned the PUC as acting "against the interests of Philadelphia residents."

Attorneys for the GI Taxicab Association, which sought unsuccessfully a year ago to obtain licenses as a unit, announced that the case would be appealed to the State Superior Court.

## Good Posture, Spinal Hygiene, Aids To Health

Good posture and spinal hygiene are factors which lead to a healthy body. Dr. James W. Parker, president-elect of the Committee for Chiropractic Education, said today.

Certain precautions can be taken to keep the spinal column in a straight position and here are five suggestions for proper sleeping facilities, sitting positions and walking up stairs:

1. When lying on a couch, with head on armchair, proper use of a cushion should be made to support the spine between the head and hips.

2. Mattresses should have extra springs in center to hold heavier parts of the body in erect posture while sleeping.

3. Proper seat adjustment to permit erectness of spine is made possible by placing hips well back in seat and holding shoulders back. Slouching causes lower back pain, and many times is the cause of various aches and pains in the groins and legs.

4. Climbing stairs should be accomplished by placing most of the weight on the ball of the foot in stead of the heel, with shoulders and head back.

5. The raising of windows and lifting objects should be done by flexing the knee and hip joints, keeping the spine straight, shoulders back, head up and lift with arms and legs and not the back.

A healthy spine leads to a healthy body, Dr. Parker said.

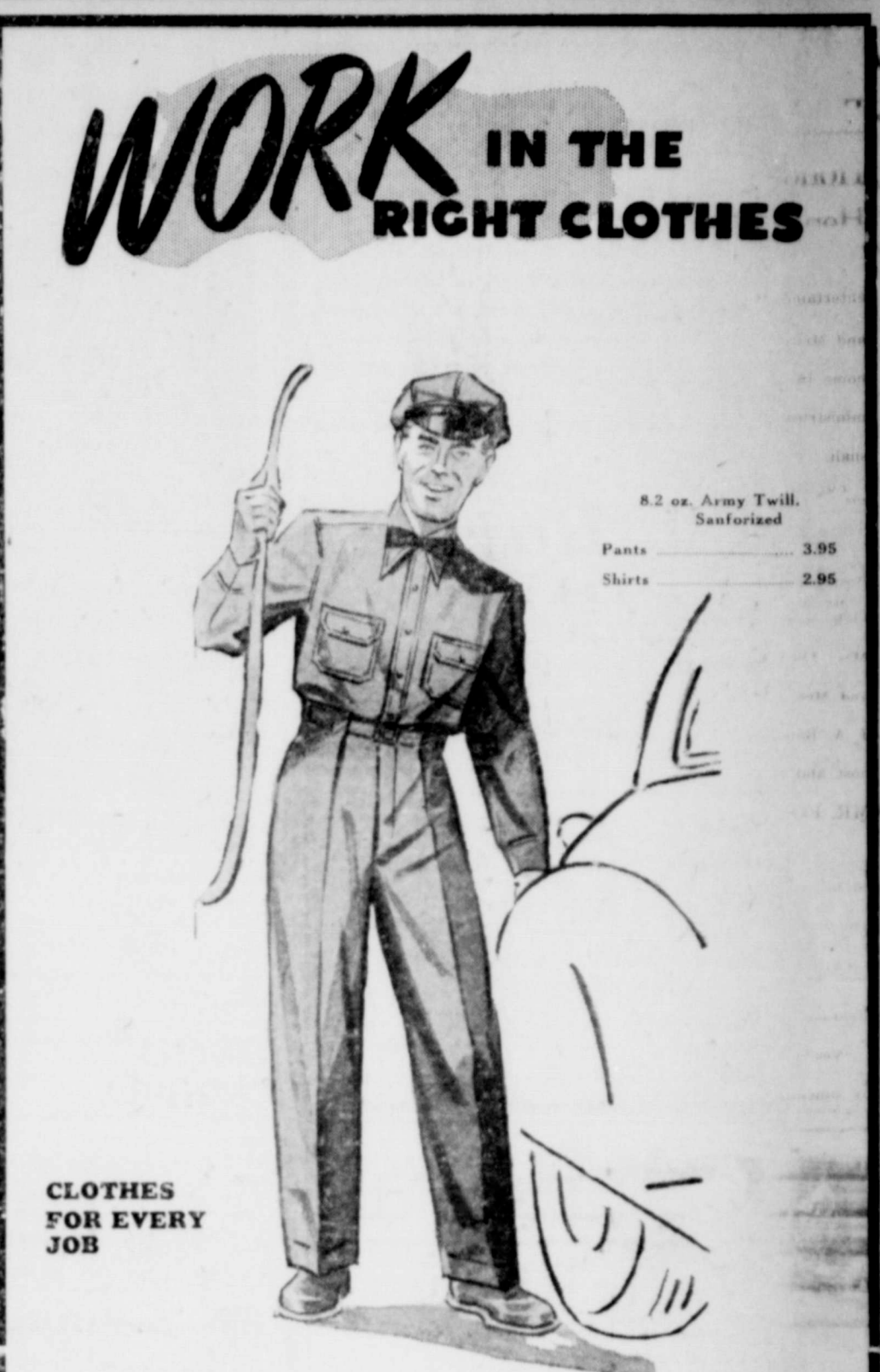

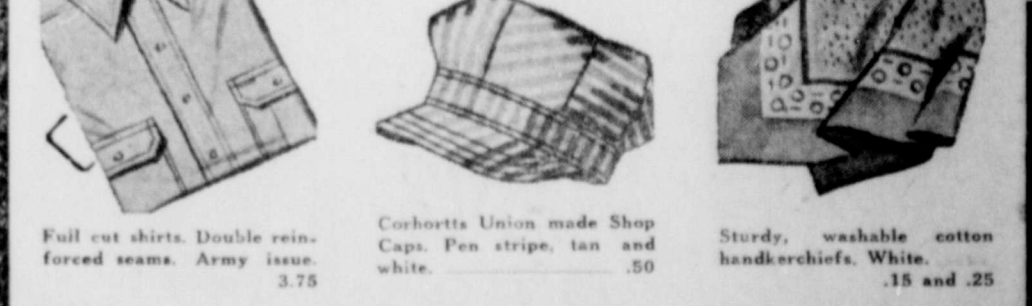

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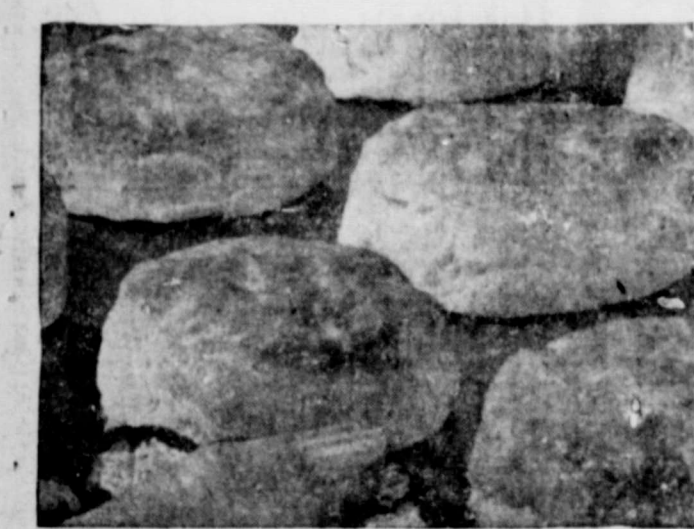

### Rising Living Costs Hitting Working Girls

BERKELEY, Cal. (UP)—It costs an unmarried working girl living in San Francisco \$180.40 a month to meet her basic needs, the University of California reports.

The university's Heller Committee for Research in Social Economics based its estimate on price levels in San Francisco during September, 1947.

The items which cost a working girl \$1,127.47 a year in 1941, based on March prices of that year, now cost \$2,164.8 a year on the September, 1947 level, the committee said.

Largest relative increase was in the federal income tax which, in 1941, cost San Francisco's Kitty Foyles only \$8.53 but which nicked her budget for \$275 in 1947.

Other costs were up, too. Board and room, budgeted at \$377.76 in 1941, soared to \$1,058.21 in 1947, the survey showed. Clothing costs jumped from \$95 a year in 1941 to \$262.63 in 1947—and there was no provision in that for a Parisian frock or a silly hat with lots of gee-gaws.

Other budget items, based on the September scale of prices prevailing in San Francisco, included \$66.16 for care of the person, including all cosmetics; \$85 for savings, for emergency use only; \$117.92 for recreation; \$68.17 for car fare; \$16.91 for gifts; \$21.94 for association dues; \$3.43 for stationery and postage; \$14.50 for charity and church; and \$19.24 for incidentals.
