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### PETITION ASKS LIGHTS FOR INTERSECTIONS

Petitions are being circulated in Ranger requesting the city commission to take immediate action to secure traffic stop lights at the Highway 80 and Main Street intersection and the Blackwell Road and Highway 80 intersection.

The necessity of such lights has been brought to the attention of the town through accidents occurring at these intersections and the move is being made to stop such accidents.

Petitions are at the Ranger Furniture Exchange, Ogden's Laundry on Backwell Road and Heppard's Service station on Blackwell Road and Highway 80.

Following is the text of the petition:

Hon. Lee Dockery, Mayor, and Members of the Ranger City Commission:

Since every town and community in the nation is making every effort to cut down the enormously increasing amount of traffic accidents which are taking the lives of more of our citizens than any war, and also maiming and crippling our children for life, we, the undersigned citizens and taxpayers respectfully request and petition your honorable body to immediately take steps to cut down the hazards of two railroad crossings in our town, namely the Highway 80 and Main street crossing and intersection and the Highway 80 and Blackwell Road crossing and intersection.

In our opinion traffic signal lights should be placed at these hazardous intersections and by so doing we believe traffic accidents will reduce to almost nothing.

We also respectfully petition your honorable body to place traffic signs along Highway 80 inside the city limits, compelling traffic to slow down to 30 miles per hour and ask that this law ordinance be rigidly enforced every day in the year.

Our neighboring towns have taken similar precautions and we believe that this should be done as soon as possible, as we have living evidence in our little city of the results of fast traffic through Ranger.

Colonel Brand, Inspector General of the 4th Army with headquarters at Fort Sam Houston, will be the inspecting officer.

### TEXAS SAFETY CONFERENCE MARCH 19-20

AUSTIN, Mar. 18.—The Texas Safety Association will hold its ninth annual Texas Safety Conference in conjunction with the Governor's Highway Safety Conference at the Baker Hotel, Dallas, March 19-20. Charles A. Miller, The Texas Company, Houston, vice-president of the Association, is general chairman of the conference program.

Miller will preside over the opening session of the joint conferences Friday morning. Major General Albert Sidney Johnson, Dallas, chairman of the Governor's Highway Safety Conference, will introduce Governor Jester.

Reports of the Governor's committees on laws and ordinances, engineering, enforcement, education, public information and public support will be presented Friday afternoon.

Traffic safety and school safety programs will be held Saturday. Industrial sessions will be held, beginning Thursday prior to the conference with a regional meeting of the American Society of Safety Engineers, and will be climaxed with a banquet Saturday evening. An industrial luncheon will be held Friday.

F. S. Pearsall, superintendent of Warehouses, Texas & Pacific Coal & Oil Company, will participate in a panel discussion on the industrial program Friday afternoon.

The annual Award Banquet, scheduled Friday evening, will feature the presentation of scrolls of commendation to the Fiftyeth Legislature in recognition of the enactment of safety legislation and industrial awards to winners of the 1947 Texas Industrial Safety Contest, sponsored by the association.

The Board of Directors of the Association will meet Thursday preceding the conference to elect officers for the new fiscal year.

### U. S. May Sign Pact With Five

PARIS, Mar. 18. (UP)—Highly informed diplomatic sources said today that the United States might sign a limited military pact with the Anti-Communist bloc of Western Europe within three months.

Any such alliance was described as aimed at helping to implement President Truman's demand for support of the country's striving to hold off Russian pressure.

Informants said the pact would pledge American arms and planes, but not troops, in the light of Western Europe against Communist encroachment.

Regarding vandalism, out seats have been cut with either knives or razor blades, some beyond repair. Rest rooms have been mistreated, and many objects stolen. We have received excellent co-operation from all police and school officials, but have been unable to cope with the situation and it is gaining momentum weekly.

The management employed a man recently, known only to the theatre employees, to sit at different places around the theatre during every show in an effort to find out who was responsible for the whole trouble. His report was amazing in the fact that it was discovered that most of the damage was being done by the sons... and DAUGHTERS of some of the leading families of the business, civic, social and church organizations of Ranger.

Frankly we were shocked and had to personally check on several of the children and found it to be true.

To talk with the parents in some instances proved satisfactory but in others the parents were furious... refusing to believe that their children would do such a thing, despite the fact that they have been absolutely caught misbehaving.

We are appealing to the parents of the children of Ranger to please talk with their children and help us operate a theatre that can be enjoyed by those who come to be entertained by the screen offering.

### DR. KIMBLE DIES; RITES FRIDAY P.M.

Dr. E. W. Kimble, 87, pioneer Eastland county physician, passed away last midnight at a hospital in Gorman, his home, following an illness of several days. All members of his family were at the bedside when the end came.

Funeral services will be held at the Gorman Methodist church at 2:00 p.m. Friday, conducted by Rev. W. F. Smith, pastor of the Gorman church, assisted by Oran Stephens, superintendent of the Cisco District of the Methodist church, of Cisco, and Rev. A. W. Franklin, pastor of a Methodist church at Cleburne and formerly pastor of the Gorman Methodist church.

Burial will be in the cemetery at Eastland.

Edwin Walker Kimble was born April 29, 1860, at Clarksville, Tennessee. When a small child he moved with his parents into Kentucky, Logan County, from there he moved, in 1881, to Texas, settling in Eastland County.

His father, H. S. Kimble, was secretary of the convention that wrote the Declaration of Texas Independence on March 2, 1836. H. S. Kimble returned to Tennessee where he engaged in the practice of law and was serving as Circuit Judge at the time of E. W. Kimble's birth.

Dr. Kimble graduated from the College of Physicians and Surgeons at Keokuk, Iowa, in 1890, and began the practice of medicine in Eastland county near Gorman. In 1894 he moved to the town of Gorman where he resided until his death.

### Moscow Labels Truman Speech Party Politics

LONDON, Mar. 8. (UP)—Moscow charged today that President Truman is deliberately creating a crisis in the interests of party politics, and in Rome a Catholic cardinal issued the church's strongest denunciation of Communism.

Vigorous reaction to Mr. Truman's call for firm measures to block the spread of Communism came from high quarters around the world.

The Russians edged cautiously into a report to Mr. Truman's message to Congress, first reporting its main points in a broadcast from Moscow and then going into charges that it had provoked sharp criticism from "progressive American politicians."

In a broadcast based largely on reaction by the domestic opposition to Mr. Truman, Moscow said: "According to reports, many Republicans consider Truman deliberately creating a crisis in the interests of party politics."

### Brother Of Local Man Dies In Kilgore Saturday

Ed Hadley has returned from Kilgore where he attended funeral services for his brother, Oscar L. Hadley, formerly of Ranger, who died at his Kilgore home Saturday night following a heart attack. Services were conducted at the First Baptist Church there Tuesday afternoon.

The deceased came to Ranger in 1918 and was employed by John M. Gholson until 1922 when he moved to East Texas. He had been a resident of Kilgore for 17 years and an employe of the Tide Water Associated Oil Company for 25 years at the time of his death.

In addition to his brother, he survived by his wife, Mrs. Lavera Hadley, of Kilgore; two sons, John L. Hadley of the U. S. Navy in China, and Arthur M. Hadley of Kilgore; one daughter, Mrs. Martha Howell of Texas City; one sister, Mrs. John Houchin of Okmulgee, Oklahoma; and one granddaughter.

Rev. Ham has been pastor of the Ranger church for two and a half years. He is Associational R. A. leader, associational Sunday School superintendent, vice-moderator of the board of the Association, and was recently appointed to the executive committee of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

Coy Sims, educational and music director of the church, will be in charge of the music for the revival. For the evening services Betty Reuser will be organist and Gloria Graham pianist. Mrs. F. P. Brashier, Jr. will play the organ for morning services.

Two services will be held each day throughout the week. Times for the services are, Sunday mornings, 11:00; Sunday evenings, 7:30; week-day mornings, 9:30; week-day evenings, 7:30. The public is being invited to attend any or all of these services.

### Battleship Texas On Way To New Berth In Texas

The Battleship Texas, which Ranger Jaycees helped to buy for the state, has left its port at Portsmouth, Va., and is enroute to San Jacinto where it will be towed to a permanent berth as an historic monument.

The 34 year old ship is a veteran of two wars and will be presented to Texas by Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, a native Texan.

As the ship left its port in Virginia it carried seven officers and 66 men as compared with the wartime complement of 1,530 officers and men.

### Strike Sending Meat Prices Up

CHICAGO, Mar. 8. (UP)—The nationwide packinghouse strike sent wholesale meat prices spiraling upward today in the biggest boom since the one that followed removal of OPA ceilings.

The strike, which cut meat production in half, pushed the price of pork loins up as much as 12 cents a pound on the Chicago wholesale market in the last three days.

The National Association of Retail Grocers appealed to housewives to buy as little meat as possible "so that there will be enough for everybody."

Meanwhile, the big packers and the CIO Packinghouse Workers dug in for a prolonged work stoppage. President Truman's fact-finding board summoned witnesses from both sides to appear at hearings on the issues beginning today.

### SECRETARY OF DEFENSE SAYS PRESENT QUOTA INADEQUATE

WASHINGTON, Mar. 8. (UP)—Secretary of Defense James V. Forrestal advised Congress today he will recommend increases in the present authorized strength of the Armed Forces.

Forrestal told the senate armed forces committee that the present authorized strength was based on assumptions, made two years ago, that had failed to materialize.

Forrestal proposed no specific figures but said exact recommendations must await further studies.

The Army's present authorized strength is 669,000. It is 119,000 men under strength. The Navy is 159,000 men short of its authorized strength of 552,000 and the Air Force is authorized to have 401,000 men, but has only 259,000. The Marine Corps' present authorized strength is 110,000, but the Marines have only 90,000.

Forrestal appeared before the committee to back up President Truman's request for universal training and a temporary revival of the draft. Republican Congressional leaders indicated continued coolness toward universal training but were not closing the door on re-enactment of the draft.

Forrestal warned the committee that "the pressing needs of the regular military establishment can not be filled through voluntary enlistments."

### Says Draft Could Be In Effect In 45 to 60 Days

WASHINGTON, Mar. 18. (UP)—Top selective service officials said today they could start inducting men into the armed forces within 45 to 60 days if Congress passed a new draft law.

Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, director of the office of selective service records, estimated that new induction machinery could be set up within that time if President Truman's draft request is approved.

Col. Daniel O. Omer, Hershey's assistant, said he believes selective service could have the first draftees in uniform "in possibly 60 days" from the time the law is passed.

Omer, who emphasized that he was expressing his own opinion, said he thinks a new draft law would necessitate a brand new registration of eligible manpower.

### Grand Jury Takes Recess; To Return On March 23

The 91st district court grand jury impaneled Monday morning recessed that afternoon until March 23.

A petit jury summoned for Wednesday, March 17, were notified not to report as they would not be needed.

# WE CAN'T EXPLODE EARTH, ATOM SCIENTIST DECIDES

ROME (U.P.) — Prof. Giovanni Giorgi, Italy's foremost authority on atomic energy, has concluded that there is no danger of an atomic chain reaction which might cause the explosion of the earth.

He believes, however, that a real danger of poisoning the sea and killing all marine life exists. Author of many books on physics, mechanics and mathematics and originator of the Giorgi electrical unit system, the scientist said the explosion of huge uranium bombs in the ocean would release deadly radiation. Poisoning of the sea and death of sea life, if carried out on a large scale, would have grave consequences on all life, he warned.

Giorgi, who is probably the world's greatest collector of sea shells as a hobby for relaxation from hard scientific studies, said:

"The oceans are the only source of life against which man, who destroys everything on earth, has not yet made any attempts. But this source, too, immense and fruitful, will be threatened on the first occasion by a potent poison."

He added that scientists have not devised any means yet of preventing this possible poisoning of marine life by uranium, radiation. He paused a moment, nodded his head and said:

"I see only one remedy—all other animals should come to an

agreement to hinder the human species from destroying life."

Giorgi recalled that when the first experiments in nuclear physics were made in Berlin for war purposes, the "most fantastic" precautions were taken to prevent the atomic flame in a laboratory from setting afire all the adjacent atoms, setting off the world like a great atomic bomb.

The French physicist and Nobel Prize winner, Frederick Joliot, wrote several articles to allay the alarm resulting from false reports and denied the possibility of a planetary explosion. Joliot maintained that the explosive phenomenon of the elements which constitute the atomic bomb cannot propagate itself to the other elements of the planet.

Giorgi said another illustrious scientist, Maurice Karach, denied Joliot's theory and brought still more confusion into the matter. Karach claimed that science cannot exclude with certainty the possibility of the explosion of the earth, because it had only limited knowledge of the elements within the terrestrial planet.

"As you see, these two scientists disagreed only on absolute certainty," Giorgi said.

Giorgi, who maintains close contact with American atom bomb scientists and with Albert Einstein, continued:

"The danger that man may cause a planetary catastrophe must be considered insufficient. It could happen only when a large part of the terrestrial nucleus consisted of uranium. Such an existence could be imagined only at very great depth. But how could we set it when we cannot go into the bowels of the earth deeper than three kilometers?"

Giorgi said modern science teaches that the earth consists of a mass of non-metallic sediment for hundreds of kilometers. Under the latter rind, there is a central nucleus whose density is five times

that of water.

"From this degree of density," he said, "it must be deduced that the great block of uranium does not exist. We know that inside the earth planet is a stratum of silicon and magnesium. There follows in depth a large nucleus of ferric nickel, which is held to be in a solid state with a temperature of 300 degrees centigrade.

"Let us suppose, however, as a hypothesis, that the block of uranium exists. Could the explosion

occur? Yes, but under the absolute condition that it is a compact and pure block. The ordinary uranium does not explode. Hence it would be necessary for laboratories and colossal plants, with a population of workers, to descend into the depths of the earth and proceed to purify the uranium.

"But let's be precise," the scientist concluded. "No body can give the absolute mathematical certainty that the event will not happen. Whoever has read the ar-

icles on high mathematics knows that the calculation of the probabilities does not give the finding as absolutely sure that even the sun will rise tomorrow, although there exists a probability, extremely near to certainty, that it will.

## Paper Pulp Fodder Held Suitable For U. S. Cattle

CHICAGO (UP)—The nation could solve the grain shortage by feeding paper pulp to livestock, but there is a catch to it—there's a shortage of paper pulp, too.

The American Veterinary Medical Association says experiments in Sweden during the war proved that cattle, horses and sheep thrive on a paper pulp diet, with certain additions.

In the Swedish experiments, 2,000,000 head of cattle and 800,000 horses were fed largely on paper pulp for three years with "excellent results," the association said.

The paper pulp was mixed with molasses, soybean protein and a mineral mixture of salt, calcium carbonate, dicalcium phosphate and sodium phosphate. But paper pulp comprised 91 per cent of the ration.

The veterinary association said coffee bean pulp has been used experimentally as cattle feed in South America, and that wood pulp was used for feed in Norway during the war.

Swedish veterinarians who reported on the paper pulp feeding program said it was "probably the biggest feeding experiment ever carried out in the world."

In a paper presented to the Royal Veterinarian College at Stockholm, Dr. F. Hoffund said the paper pulp mixture "proved to be acceptable, digestible and of feeding value equal to oatmeal."

"Three generations of sheep were raised on the supplemented paper pulp ration with complete success, although dosing with yeast cultures was necessary at regular intervals," Hoffund reported.

He said, however, that if the molasses or sodium phosphate were omitted, the effect on animals was bad.

The association said that experiments with coffee pulp, the fleshy covering of the coffee bean, have been made in El Salvador, and that the U. S. Department of Agriculture has received a shipment of the pulp and plans to conduct similar feeding experiments in this country.

Potentially wasted coffee bean pulp could be used for livestock feed to effect an annual saving of 34,000,000 bushel of corn, the association said.

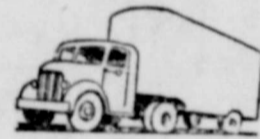

### How To Meet Living Cost Stumps Even Uncle Sam's Budget Experts

WASHINGTON (UP)— In an eastern city an elderly man sat down and wrote to the government people in Washington.

"I am retired, and have an income of \$60 a month," he wrote. "Is there any place in this country where my wife and I can live on that?"

From a midwestern city a mother of two children wrote in to complain that her husband was fighting with her all the time. "He doesn't understand why I can't make ends meet now on \$50 a week," she said. "What can I do? How do other people do it?"

The two letters are typical of several received by the government every week. Most of them are from city folks. Many are from people who had no trouble

getting along on their income a few years ago. There were 142 such letters last year, only 78 in 1946.

All ask the same question: Isn't there some way of budgeting my income so I can beat the inflation squeeze?

If there is, the government experts who answer the letters don't know about it.

Most of the letters come addressed to the Departments of Labor and Commerce and to the Library of Congress. Some are addressed to the Bureau of the Budget. Presumably the writers figure that experts who handle billion-dollar budget problems surely ought to know how to work out a family-sized one.

All the letters eventually end up on the desks of Rita Holmes and Mollie Orshansky of the agriculture department's bureau of fam-

ily living. All of them are answered. "But there really isn't any answer sometimes," Miss Holmes said. "We send them pamphlets about keeping a budget and about planning low-cost and moderate cost meals. We point out that careful budgeting can reduce the money that dribbles into 'non-essentials.'"

"But," said Miss Orshansky, "they really want to know how to continue the same style of living with the same income when the cost of living has gone up."

"You can't do it. Something has to give way."

For example, said Miss Holmes, there was the man who wrote for budget advice. He said he was supporting a family of four adults and six children with an income of \$65 a week. "We sent him the low-cost meal planning pamphlet, but those meals would cost more than \$10 a week alone for his family of 10."

All of those who write in are told there isn't any magic budget-

ing formula that will fit all needs. You can't "arbitrarily" apportion 25 per cent of income to rent or 30 per cent to food, they are informed. It depends on the family and the circumstances.

"Making a budget is really a process of weighing values," said Miss Orshansky. "Suppose a family with \$50 a week income is running into debt at a rate of \$5 a week. They've got an automobile. That's simple, you say. Give up the automobile! But, maybe they need the car for transportation—or maybe they'd rather have the car than new clothing. . . We don't tell people what to give up. We just show them how other people are spending their money and how to prepare a budget."

What about the elderly retired man? He was sent the lowest cost meal planning and budget pamphlets. But where can he live on \$60 a month?

"I don't know," said Miss Holmes sadly. "I don't think you can anywhere."

### Battleship On Last Voyage To Name State

HOUSTON, Tex. (UP)—The battleship Texas, a naval veteran that has seen action in two wars, is scheduled to begin her last voyage March 15—a voyage to the San Jacinto, Tex., battlefield near here.

Naval authorities said the 34-year old fighter, now outmoded for further active service, will be towed behind a tug from her present anchorage at Norfolk, Va.

She is scheduled to arrive at San Jacinto April 21, the anniversary of the day Texas achieved its independence from Mexico.

The transfer of the ship to her name state results from a request by the people of Texas. The transfer will be an outright gift to Texas, but the Lone Star State must maintain her in "appropriate condition" and pay all expenses of establishing her as a monument.

The USS Texas first saw service with the Atlantic fleet at Vera Cruz, Mexico, in 1914. Later, after the United States entered World War I, she was transferred to

European waters with the British Grand fleet. On her fifth day in that assignment, she fired one shot at a German submarine, missing as the U-boat submerged. A few seconds later, she ducked a torpedo fired by the German craft.

That was her only direct engagement with the enemy in the war 30 years ago.

In World War II the Texas saw action in every theater of war, starting in the summer of 1940 when she took part in the so-called "neutrality patrol" in the North Atlantic.

During 1942 the Texas conveyed merchantmen to Europe, Africa and Panama. In the North African invasion, she was assigned to ground troop support in the Mahdia-Port Lyautey area, where

The value of fertilizers on certain crops has been proven many times at the State Agricultural Experiment Stations but the information thus obtained is often "too far from home" to be taken at its face value; so, Mr. H. C. Wilkinson of the Oakley community has been doing a little private experimenting.

contrary to recommendations of some Vetch growing areas. However, if the freeze damage is not too severe, Mr. Wilkinson feels certain that the 0-20-0 plot will show the greatest growth before harvest time. One lesson was proven again by the freeze. On a plot of Vetch and Rye, neither the Rye nor Vetch was hurt; but barley and wheat and speltz on other plots were severely bitten by the cold spell. This fact has been demonstrated many times; and is a strong point favoring the use of Rye as a nurse crop for Vetch. On a somewhat tighter piece of land, 3 1-2 acres of wheat was sown with 200 lb. 4-12-4 per acre and another 3 1-2 acres without any fertilizer. The fertilized area showed almost twice as much growth up to the recent freeze. All of this fertilizing was done with a home made distributor that is a "dilly," according to the folks around Oakley. This distributor is reportedly capable of spreading 15,000 lbs. of fertilizer a day and that is quite a record for any machine of this kind. I intend to keep checking on this experiment and will give a report later if any definite conclusions are reached.

Call For Better Health Made To 75,000 Clubs

A substantial increase over the 200,000 who took part in the work last year is expected.

Awards for the program, given again in 1948 by Kellogg, include a certificate to the winning club within a county and \$20.00 cash to the 10 best 4-H Health Clubs in each state. The outstanding individual in a state will receive an educational trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago and national winners, both blue and red award groups, are to get special merit ribbons.

County extension agents will furnish complete information regarding this program.

Fish Desert Black Sea, Glut Turkish Market

ISTANBUL, (UP) — Even the fish are fleeing from Russian domination, according to Turkish fishermen, who claim they "never had such luck."

Within three days, Istanbul fishermen pulled in more than 1,000,000 pounds of anchovies and the sudden glut hit the market, the wholesale price of anchovies dropped from 25 cents a pound to nine cents in one day. The next day, when prices dropped to less than a cent and a half a pound, fishermen disgustedly began throwing their anchovies back into the sea.

Experts said storms and unseasonable weather changes in the Black Sea apparently sent billions of anchovies in a mad dash through the Bosphorus.

### New Device Gives Altitude Warning



Two pilots examine the cigar-like forward antenna, arrow, of a new radar altimeter and warning device being installed on Pan American World Airways Clippers. ### U. S. Railroad Network Found Diminishing

WASHINGTON (UP) — The nation's network of railroad lines has been diminishing steadily for the past 30 years, according to records of the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Since World War I, the country has lost 27,800 miles of main line railroad track. It resulted from

authorized abandonment of certain sections of line no longer considered profitable or necessary operations.

In 1916, railroad mileage in the United States reached its peak with 254,251 miles of main line track. It dropped 11 per cent during the next 30 years to 226,438 miles last year. The trackage lost equals a railroad-line greater in length than the circumference of the earth.

### Sunken Ships Menace Inland Navigation

CHICAGO (UP) — Sunken ships in the Chicago River are creating a menace to navigation on that link between the Great Lakes and the Mississippi River, according to a city official.

Harbor Master W. L. Lynch says there are at least 15 wrecks that are dangerous to shipping.

Difficulties arise because jurisdiction over river waters is shared by the city and the federal government, with the city being responsible for the area 20 feet out from shore. Owners of ships that sink in the city sections are charged with their removal but the public works commission is seeking ways to make that regulation stronger.
