

WASHINGTON, Mar. -8, (UP) Secretary of Defense James V. Forrestal advised Congress today the present authorized strength of

the Armed Forces. Forrestal told the senate armed forces committee that the present authorized strength was based on assumptions, made two years ago, that had failed to ma-

Forrestal proposed no specific figures but said exact recommendations must await further stud-

The Army's present authorized strength is 669,000. It is 119,000 men under strength. The Navy is 159,000 men short of its authorized strength of 552,000 and the Air Force is authorized to have 401, Marines have only 90,000.

Forrestal appeared before the committee to back up President Truman's request for universal training and a temporary revival of the draft. Republican Congressional leaders indicated continued coolness toward universal training but were not closing the door on

Forrestal warned the committee that "the pressing needs of the regular military establishment can not be filled through voluntary

Says Draft Could Be In Effect In 45 to 60 Days

Red Coup Clouds Future of U. S.-Czech Trade Relations

VASHINGTON-(NEA)-Communist selzure of power in Czecho-U. S. foreign trade with a country that makes its exit behind the iron

The subject is timely in view of the move by Senators Wherry of Mebraska, Ball of Minnesota, Reed of Kansas and other Republicans to revise the Marshall Plan. These revisionists want guarantees that no Marshall Plan goods will find their way to Eastern Europe. This idea runs counter to the firm U. S. State Department belief that Europe never will recover until normal trade relations are resumed between the East and the West.

The volume of Czech trade with the U.S. has never been great. It would a peak of \$26,000,000 in exports and a like amount of imports in 1938. Resumption of trade after the war was slow to get started. Many Czech factories had been bonfoed out.

Representatives of the Czech nationalized industries came to the L.S. to place orders for new equipment. They made some deals. The zechs needed dollars to pay for this equipment. They tried to get ome of their luxury export items back on the American market to come of their luxury export items back on the American market to find the needed exchange. Inflation handicapped both countries. From the end of the war to the end of 1947, Czech exports to the l.S. have amounted to \$48,000,000. U.S. exports to Czechoslovakia meaning the another \$48,000,000. nounted to another \$48,000,000.

CZECHOSLOVAKIA also got \$17,500,000 worth of surplus American war supplies for \$8,000,000, on credit. The Czechs originally got a gredit of \$50,000,000 for the purchase of war surplus items, but, when it was discovered they were planning to resell \$10,000,000 worth to Romania at a profit, the credit was canceled.

At the same time—October, 1946—the State Department ordered the U.S. Export-Import Bank to drop plans for another \$50,000,000 loan to Zechoslovakia for rehabilitation. Ex-Im Bank did, however, advance the Czechs \$20,000,000 worth of cotton and \$2,000,000 worth of toucco. Repayment is scheduled to begin this year.

That all these credits and applications for loans reveal is the Czechs' great need for capital, for production magchinery and for raw materials.

Since the end of the war, all U.S. exports have been under government is abroad. It has prevented the sending of any strategic materials behind the iron curtain.

W that the Marshall Plan seems near adoption, export shipments to non-Marshall Plan countries will be under still tighter control. The 16 Western European countries will get priority on everything. This does not necessarily mean that the Czecha will be left out in the cold on American supplies. Since American policy is to restore rade between East and West, a complete severing of trade relations with Czechoslovakia is not anticipated.







United Press Staff Correspondent Giorgi, Italy's foremost authority on atomie energy, has cencluded that there is no danger of an atomic chain reaction which might cause the explaion of the earth.

He believes, however, that a real danger of poisoning the sea and killing all marine life exists.

Author of many books on physles, mechanics and mathematics and originator of the Giorgi electrical unit system, the scientist said the explosion of huge uranium bombs in the ocean would release deadly radiation. Poisoning of the sea and death of sea life, if carried out on a large scale, would have grave consequences

on all life, he warned. Giorgi, who is probably the world's greatest collector of sea shells as a hobby for relaxation

from hard scientific studies, said: The oceans are the only source of life against which man, who destroys everything on earth, has not yet made any attempts. But this source, too, immense and fruitful, will be threatened on the first oceasion by a potent poison."

He added that scientists have not devised any means yet of preventing this possible poisoning of marine life by uranium, radiation. He paused a moment, nodded his head and said:
