

BERLIN, April 1 (UP) - Russian-controlled radio Berlin tonight announced that the Soviet sector of Berlin would be barred to all traffic between 11 p.m. and 6 a.m.

Russia cut off all rail traffic from Berlin to the American, British and French zones of Germany today, but abandoned after two hours, road-blocks set up on the boundaries of the Russian zone of the German capital
