Judge Refuses To Dismiss Lewis Case

Army's Leaders' Schools Open To High Graduates

Young men about to graduate from high school are eligible to select training in one of the Army's new Potential Leaders' Schools before they enlist, S-Sgt. James Hendrick, of the Eastland Recruiting Station, said today.

Four schools have been established to train selected new recruits who show promise of real leadership potentialities. Some 6000 leaders will be graduated each year from courses at Ft. Jackson, South Carolina; Ft. Disc, New Jersey; Ft. Knox, Kentucky; and Ft. Ord, California.

Consideration for admission is given to all high school graduates. Once they have started the courses, the students learn to lead by leading groups in classroom study, patrol work and athletics. Subjects studied include leadership problems, psychology of leadership, training methods, public speaking, organization of instructor groups, and how to conduct demonstration.

Graduates are promoted at once to Private First Class and are eligible for more rapid advancement than otherwise would be the case. In addition to the leadership school opportunities, high school graduates are eligible to pick their own field of specialization in advance of enlistment. If qualified and accepted, the graduates are assigned to a school teaching this specialty following completion of basic training.

Miners Shun Pits Protesting Lewis' Situation

PITTSBURGH, Apr. 14, (UP)—More than half of the nation's 400,000 soft coal miners stayed away from the pits today. They hinted their 31-day-old strike would continue indefinitely if John L. Lewis was sent to jail for contempt of court.

The United Mine Workers voted in local meetings throughout the coal states to ignore the back to work orders of their union chief pending the outcome of today's court case in Washington against Lewis and the UMW.

In the Pittsburgh district, 10 mines, employing 4,000 men, reopened today, but the Western Pennsylvania Coal Operator's Association reported at least one mine which had been working yesterday was closed today. Only 14,000 of the district's 56,000 miners were working.

U. S. Steel reported only one of its 14 Pennsylvania mines had reopened.

Former Ranger Resident Dies; Funeral Pending

Mrs. Ven White received word Tuesday night of the death of her brother-in-law, O. L. (Skinny) White, of Tulsa, Oklahoma and formerly of Ranger.

Mr. White died Tuesday in a hospital in Springfield, Ill. Funeral plans had not been completed when Mrs. White left Ranger today for Tulsa. She was joined in Fort Worth by her daughter, Miss Betty White and her son, Ven White, Jr., of Houston.

During Mr. White's residence in Ranger he had been employed as a draftsman with the Lone Star Producing Company.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. A. White of 1632 East Admiral Blvd., Tulsa, Okla.

Move Indicates Reds Consider Election Lost

ROME, Apr. 14, (UP)—Responsible Italian newspapers agreed today that the Russian refusal to return Trieste to Italy signifies that the Soviets have given up hope of a Communist election victory in Italy.

Rome's two biggest independent newspapers, Il Tempo and Il Messaggero, agreed that Russian announcement of the Soviet decision during the last week of the turbulent election campaign indicated that Moscow considered the election lost.

Premier Alcide De Gasperi met for an hour with Foreign Minister Count Carlo Sforza to consider officially the Russian attitude. It was believed they planned full exploitation of the strange Russian liddown of the Italian Communists.

He also urged that all persons who have been made area chairman check their areas for clean-up needs before the meeting of the Chairman at the Chamber of Commerce Monday morning at 10 o'clock.

U. G. Kinard Died Tuesday At His Home

Information has been received in Eastland of the death of U. G. Kinard, 79, Tuesday at his home a few miles south of Eastland. The Kinard family are Eastland county pioneers.

No particulars were available here at press time today.

Truman Will Launch Loan Drive Tonight

President Truman will speak over four major radio networks from 9:30 to 9:35 (CST) Wednesday night, April 14 to officially launch the Security Loan campaign for the sale of U. S. Savings Bonds, Nathan Adams of Dallas, chairman of the Treasury Department's advisory committee for Texas, was informed today.

Over 400 Mutual stations, including many in Texas, will follow the President's address with programs devoted to the Security Loan.

The Security Loan drive officially begins Thursday (April 15) and will continue through June 30, with the objective of establishing a sound national economy.

"The drive is to urge every citizen to provide financial security for himself and his family by investing in Savings Bonds," Mr. Adams said. "If the individual citizens of America will achieve personal security for themselves, we will have economic security for the nation. These bonds are anti-inflationary because they remove money from competition for scarce goods and, by providing individuals with deferred spending power, they can delay or even prevent possible depression."

An estimated 150,000 volunteer workers, organized by counties, will conduct the drive in Texas.

Three Students From Ranger On Dean's List

DENTON, Tex., (SPL) Apr. 14—Three Ranger students are listed among 524 junior and senior students at North Texas State College who have been named to the dean's honor list for the spring semester.

To qualify for the honor roster, students must have a "B" average, with no grade lower than a "C", on at least 12 hours of work a semester. Inclusion on the dean's list exempts students from the usual penalties for class absences and gives them special library privileges.

Those from Ranger on the list are Rosemary Bruce, daughter of L. L. Bruce, 814 Cypress; James Metcalf, 220 E. Main; and James Pepper, son of Mrs. J. E. Pepper, 810 Walnut.

All three students are seniors at the college.

U. S. Police Deny Traffic Block Report

VIENNA, Apr. 14, (UP)—U. S. military police reported today that traffic was unimpeded on the road to the American-operated Tullin Airport, contrary to a report by Austrian police that Russian guards had begun stopping military vehicles.

The Austrian police reported by telephone that two Russian guards were checking army traffic between Vienna and the airport 14 miles to the northwest.

Army authorities said later that military police found workmen erecting signs reading "stop" in English and German at the check-point.

They said Austrian police were on duty but they found no signs that the Russians intended stopping military vehicles. Officials said they would frequent patrols on the highway until they determine the reason for the check point. The station was set up yesterday.

Russia Denies Agents Aided Colombia Revolt

LONDON, Apr. 14, (UP)—Russia denied today that any of its agents were involved in the bloody Bogota rioting as charged by the Colombian government.

Dispatches from Moscow also quoted a diplomatic official as saying that no word of Colombia's reported diplomatic break with the Soviet Union has been received.

Radio Moscow broadcast the Soviet denial of implication in the Bogota rioting, declaring that these reports were "absurd fabrications—disseminated for purposes hostile to the Soviet Union."

Man Wanted On Forgery Charge Now In Custody

Lester Eugene Harrison, who according to the Eastland County sheriff's office, is wanted in this County in connection with charges of check forgeries, was picked up by officers in Weatherford Tuesday.

Since the Eastland County sheriff holds warrants for Harrison, the Parker County authorities advised the Eastland officers that they had him in their custody and would turn him over to Eastland county if it was desired.

Eastland officers said Tuesday afternoon that Harrison would be returned to Eastland County.

It was understood that Harrison is wanted in connection with the forgery of a number of checks on a Wichita Falls oil company back in 1946.

Would Restrain Taft Faction

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. Apr. 14, (UP)—An injunction to restrain the Taft Republican faction in Texas from appointing GOP county chairmen was issued in 37th District Court today.

District Judge Robert W. W. Terrell rendered the decision two minutes after court reconvened at 9:30 A. M., saying "I see no reason to hear further evidence."

CLAIMS NINE DAY DELAY IN ORDER IS CONTEMPT

WASHINGTON, Apr. 14, (UP)—Trial of John L. Lewis on contempt charges began today with Judge T. Allen Goldsborough over ruling a motion for dismissal of the charges.

The government contends that Lewis ignored on April 3 court order directing him to call off the soft coal strike "forthwith". Lewis is called off the strike Monday nine days after the order was issued.

The government took the position that Lewis' action came too late and that he thus was in contempt.

Lewis, accompanied by his lawyers strode to a seat in almost the same spot he occupied 17 months ago. His face was drawn and pale.

The courtroom, with a capacity of less than 150 persons, already was filled when Lewis arrived. About 75 persons were lined up outside waiting for a chance to get in.

Assistant U. S. Attorney General H. Graham Morrison and his assistants were in the court room before Lewis arrived.

Except for an occasional aside to an aide, Lewis sat impassively as his trial proceeded—without a jury.

Says Colombia Has Not Broken With Russians

BOGOTA, Apr. 14, (UP)—Colombia has not broken diplomatic relations with Soviet Russia, yet a government source said today.

The ninth Inter-American Conference, interrupted six days ago by a revolution, resumed formal sessions at 10 a. m.

It met in the gymnasium of a secretarial school, three miles from the original downtown conference headquarters.

The decision to continue the conference in Bogota despite week end rioting that cost some 800 lives was approved formally yesterday by all top delegates meeting during the afternoon at the Honduran embassy.

Meetings will be held in the school gymnasium until conference headquarters in the capitol, wrecked by a raging mob last Friday afternoon, are restored.

Escaped Prison Farm Convict Surrenders

SWEETWATER, Tex. Apr. 14, (UP)—Harvey Lee Glass, escaped Barrington Prison Farm convict, voluntarily surrendered to Sheriff Will Sample early today after arranging a dramatic midnight rendezvous.

He had been at large for nine weeks after escaping from the Gulf Coast Penal Institution with two companions under cover of a heavy fog.

Most of the time since then, Glass had been employed as a carpenter at Brownwood, Tex.

Texas Rangers disclosed that they wanted to question Glass in connection with a Feb. 9 holdup, and shooting.

CISCO CONTINUED

Lodge No 556 lost its charter and most of its records in a fire which destroyed its Lodge building.

A temporary meeting place was secured for a few months during which time the Lodge purchased a "Sky" deed and erected a hall over the Maxwell property at Ave. D, an Fifth Street, the individual members again giving their notes to finance its construction. This hall was later sold and the present Masonic Building erected in 1906.

This property is fully paid for and is owned jointly by the Blue Lodge, Royal Arch Chapter, and Knights Templar. A conservative value of the property being around \$15,000.

The Lodge has always been foremost in the character of its degree work, never having been reprimanded for infraction of Masonic law. held regular election and installations of officers, and has conferred a total of 1314 degrees. During the fifty years of its existence it has had thirty three different Masters, John F. Patterson being its first.

The Cisco Chapter of Royal Arch Masons was organized December 9, 1881. A. S. Bunting was its first Most Excellent High Priest. Other officers were B. W. Rose, Excellent King and J. H. Calhoun, Excellent Scribe.

Cisco Chapter No. 461, Order of the Eastern Star was organized October 26, 1921. Its principal officers were Graed D. Bettis, Worthy Patron and Ava Green, Associate Patron.

Soon after the cessation of hostilities in the first World War, the John William Butts post of the American Legion was organized at Cisco, it was so named in honor of John William Butts, son of the late John J. and Burnie

Butts, long time residents of Cisco, who was killed in line of duty in an air plane accident while carrying the mail.

The Veterans of Foreign Wars, whose membership is made up of those who have seen service in the armed forces of the United States outside the limits of its home territory, have a camp at Cisco. This organization, and others of like nature, do much to keep the fire of patriotism burning and the spirit of national service alive in our citizenship.

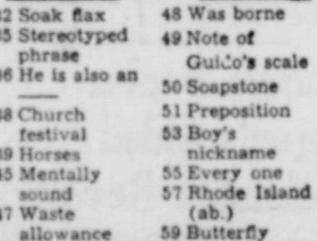
Lunt was speaking. He stopped, waited till the late arrivals were seated and then said, "So nice of you to come."
