FRESH BRITISH TROOPS POUR IN TO FORCE

JERUSALEM, May 3 (UP)-British reinforcements poured in-to Jerusalem today and silenced Arab and Jewish guns in the Holy City under a tough "cease fire"

"Plenty" of fresh British fight-ing men already have entered Je-rusalem to "control the situation," a high British official said, indicating that the government had determined to enforce peace here at least until the May 15 expiration of

the British mandate. The city itself was quite, only an occasional single shot sounding during the day, and the British were talking with Jewish and Arab officials in an effort to acheive a solid truce.

Sir Henry Gurney, chief secretary of the Palestine government, an-nounced the arrival of the British reinforcements. The swiftly deve-loping chaos in the Holy City had forced reversal of the British withdrawal tactics.

It was understood that consider able units of men were being flown directly to Palestine from Cyprus, where the British have been gaurding 30,000 Jews who were iterendwhen they sought to

enter Palestine illegally.

The British spokesman said that all 12 members of the Arab higher committee have left Palestine for neighboring Arab states. The last man left only today for Amman, capital of Trans-

U. S. Aims at Tangier-Type Government for Palestine

BY PETER EDSON NEA Washington Correspondent

WASHINGTON-(NEA)-Gradually the Truman administration policy on Palestine is beginning to emerge and make a little more sense. For a time, trying to follow that policy was a little bit like wandering with Moses through the Wilderness of Mt. Sinai. It took 40 years to get the Chosen People out of that one.

The United Nations has had the Palestine problem before it only

one year. Whether it will take another 39 years remains to be seen. But the basic policy of the United States is to have the United Nations

find the solution and make it work.

So for, this has turned into something of a buck-passing game The UN Security Council and General Assembly are inclined to let the United States take the lead. Nobody else has come up with any bright ideas at all. And the United States wants good constructive sugges-

tions from others.

President Truman, Secretary of State Marshall and amba President Truman, Secretary of State Marshall and ambassador to the United Nations Warren Austin all say that the United States is still for the United Nations decision to partition Palestine—eventually. But it can't be done till the Arabs and the Jews stop fighting. So until they do stop fighting, the United States has proposed setting up a temporary trusteeship.

A month ago, President Truman was asked at a press conference whether the United States would send troops to Palestine if the United Nations decided a trusteeship was necessary. The President replied that we—meaning the United States government—would cross that bridge when we came to it.

THE bridge was in plain sight when the President pulled this nifty

But there seemed to be some hesitancy about putting foot on the bridge, as though fearing it wouldn't hold.

Now, however, "we" have taken that step. In two recent state-Now, however, "we" have taken that step. In two recent statements, Ambassador Austin has indicated a willingness to let American troops cross the bridge over into Jordan. It isn't a full-fledged plan. It is described as a working paper. The difference is that whereas a plan is supposed to be prefty complete, a working paper is just a lot of rough ideas which it is hoped can be polished.

Austin's working paper was first presented to members of the Security Council—less Russia and the Ukraine—at an informal meeting in Austin's office on April 7. In 15 points it outlined a provisional government for a temporary UN trusteeship.

In short, the way was being paved for an international police force. The difficulties which this presents are obvious. Russia has blocked creation of any kind of UN police force. If the force is to be one of these three- or four-power occupations such as set up in Germany.

Austria or Trieste, it can't be expected to work any better.

MOREOVER, no country would relish sending its troops to replace the British in Palestine and try to put down civil war. The Russians might, if they could do it alone.

But in his statement of April 21 to the General Assembly 58-nation Political Committee, Ambassador Austin has amplified on his original paper by saying that the United States would furnish troops, "along with other members who are willing to carry out only a page." with other members who are willing to carry out such a task.

The United States... is not prepared to act alone in this matter."

So here we go, crossing the bridge.





Queen's College. Educated at Queen's, Sir Oliver was a fellow of that college for 10 years. He spent a year as a visiting professor at Chicago University, before being appointed professor of moral philosophy at Glasgow University in 1937.

During World War II, he was permanent secretary of the ministry of supply and returned to Queen's to become its provost af-

ter the war. Almost immediately after his return, Sir Oliver was named chairman of the European Economic Conferences in Paris and Washington, returning to his beloved academic seclusion early this year after eight years in the governmental limelight.

Able, energetic, Sir Oliver wants to shun publicity as long as possible. Early in February, he addressed the Oxford University American Association on European recovery and the United States, but asked that there be no press reports of the speech.

"I want to keep out of the public eye for a while," he said. He commented privately: "My wife and I are no strangers to America. Apart from Washington and the eastern states, we have also seen much of the west and the middle west and have many friends in different parts of the country. I shall be particularly happy to return to the United States, for I like the American people very much."
