U. S. Delegation to Havana Pleased Over ITO Charter

WASHINGTON-(NEA)-When representatives of 58 nations met

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—When representatives of 58 nations met at Havana last November to adopt in final form the International Trade Organization charter, delegates from the 23 nations that had been in on preparatory draiting work at London and Geneva knew all the answers. Delegates from the other 35 nations knew little of what it was all about, and they wanted some changes made.

In the first week, over 600 amendments were introduced. The number rose above 1000. Some 200 were of a kind that would have wrecked the charter. But, by sheer perseverance, the U. S. and other delegations stuck it out for four months. In the end they came up with a charter 54 were able to sign. Finland and Siam had sent only observers. Poland and the Argentine refused to sign. Soviet Russia, of course, wasn't there.

The Argentine delegation under Diego Molinari took the lead in opposing everything. Wise Will Clayton, head of the U. S. delegation, was patient. Molinari went on talking. Soon other Latin American nations began to tire of him. Ultimately he got called home.

In general, the U. S. delegation believes it came home with a better charter than it had at the end of the prior Geneva conference. On basic principles, the U. S. stuck to its ideas, and, in the end, won out.

THERE were three principal sticking points:

THERE were three principal sticking points:

First was on finding a formula under which the more backward countries—wanting to raise their standard of living—would afford protection to foreign investors. This was settled by an agreement to write the terms in separate commercial treaties between developed and underdeveloped countries.

Second most point was over "quota restrictions" by importing countries, limiting the amount of materials that might be brought in from other countries. Underdeveloped nations took the position that the U.S. grew strong by tariff barriers, so others should be permitted to have quota restrictions now, on some items.

quota restrictions now, on some items.
compromise reached on this point was that any importing country could impose a quota limitation in order to develop a new industry—if it first obtained approval from the new ITO. Approval would be given under two principal conditions, and for limited times. First, if the new industry was a war baby, started during the last war. Second, if the new industry was to process raw materials whose export to foreign markets had been shot off by other governments.

THE third most troublesome question at Havana was over granting


THE third most troublesome question at Havana was over granting trade preferences to neighboring countries. Chile led a movement to permit any country to make new trade preference agreements without prior approval from ITO. The Arab countries, thinking of their Tuture development, also wanted to grant each other trade preferences. This drive was staved off.

Customs Unions were approved. They permit groups of neighboring countries to lower tariffs to each other while maintaining outside barriers. This brought Arab and Central American countries to support the U. S. position. But restrictions were written into the charter to prevent ITO member-pations from granting more favorable trade conditions to non-members than to members.

These were not the only articles under dispute. Getting agreement

were not the only articles under dispute. Getting agreement ons against cartels and monopolies, against trade ; and in favor of export subsidies, was touchy business. The U. S. has always indulged in some of these questionable trade practices to which it objects in others.

• One major U. S. delegation achievement was getting into the charter an escape clause, which permits withdrawal of tariff concessions when they threaten injury to this country's domestic producers.

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

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
