Wallace, Thomas Fight Communist Bill

WOULD DEFY BILL IF PASSED; CLAIM IT WOULD CURB FREEDOM

WASHINGTON — Two presidential candidates — Henry A. Wallace and Norman Thomas — today denounced the Communist control bill as a "declaration of war" on American rights and an action to make "Martyrs" out of Communists.

Wallace, third party presidential candidate, said his party would defy the Communist-curbing Bill if it became law. He said it "reeks with hypocrisy" and destroys the basic guarantees of free speech and free assembly.

Thomas, perennial Socialist party candidate, said the Mundt-Nixon bill actually would be a "blessing to Communists." He said it would make them martyrs and is a "dangerously mistaken way" of dealing with the party.

The Senate judiciary committee heard the views of Wallace and Thomas. The committee is considering the bill which would put tight new restrictions of the Communist party. It would force the party to sever alleged ties with Russia and make it mandatory for the party and its members to register with the justice department.

Under the bill, Wallace said, he and his political followers would be liable to fines and jail sentences because they advocated "Peace Talks" between Russia and the United States.

"Because we insist on seizing this opportunity for peace and stopping the drive to war," he said, "The Mundt bill would empower the attorney general to prescribe our party and visit criminal penalties upon its members, in the event that it refused—as it most certainly would—to register with him."

The Anti-Communists bill would force the Communist party and its various "front" outfits to register with the Justice Department and file a list of officers. William Z. Foster, head of the communists party in this country, told the Senate committee yesterday that the party would refuse to register.

Wallace said "it is obvious that no such organization could register and continue to live."

"For registration would brand organizations engaged in the peaceful advocacy of social change as members of a world-wide conspiracy to destroy American democracy," he added.

B. W. Patterson Makes Statement On Candidacy

Judge B. W. Patterson of Eastland, some weeks ago announced his candidacy for the office of Judge of the 91st district court, though this newspaper, stating at the time he would later make a formal statement, has issued the following statement:

"In 1944 there existed two judicial districts in Eastland County, the 88th and the 91st. By your favor I served as judge of the 88th court for twelve years, and in 1944 you elected me to serve another term of four years beginning January 1, 1945 and ending December 31, 1948. The 88th court having been abolished by the Legislature in 1945, my services as judge of that court ended September 3 of that year.

The court records show that while judge of the 88th court more than 900 civil cases besides criminal, juvenile delinquency and tax cases in that court were disposed of by trial or dismissal; that during the last years of my service, by assignments I presided as judge in other judicial districts of the state, at Abilene, Anson, Haskell, Aspermont, Archer City, Graham, Breckenridge, Palo Pinto, Stephenville, Brownwood, Coleman, Angleton, Athens, Henderson, Longview, Tyler, McKinney, Dallas, and Fort Worth, at least

Memorial Day, 1948, brings new solace to the families of thousands of American fighters who gave their lives in World War II. For this is the first Memorial Day since the war's end that finds the bodies of heroes who fell on foreign soil resting in their homeland, near their loved ones. Widow of one such hero is Mrs. Collette Gerity, kneeling with her children after decorating the grave of her husband, the late Pvt. Albert T. Gerity, killed in action in Germany, Sept. 21, 1944. Undoubtedly she expressed the feelings of most families who had their war dead brought home when she said: "I am glad I had him returned to his home city. The last feeling I had when he was buried so far away in Belgium is gone now."

BODY OF PVT. NANTZ DUE IN RANGER JUNE 2

The body of Pvt. Albert Nantz of Ranger who was killed in action in World War II will arrive in Ranger Wednesday, June 2 and will be met by an honor guard from the Ralph McKinley Post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the Carl Barnes Post of the American Legion.

Funeral services will be conducted Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the First Baptist church with Rev. David C. Ham officiating. Interment will be in Evergreen cemetery with Killingsworth in charge of arrangements. Military honors in the service will be paid my members of the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars. The body will be at Killingsworth's Chapel until shortly before funeral services.

Pvt. Nantz, the son of Mrs. Susie Nantz of Ranger, was killed in Barnville, France on June 17, 1944. He was born in Jacksonville on December 18, 1918 and prior to entering service had resided in Ranger for 21 years and attended Ranger High School. At the time he entered service he was employed by the King-Ball Motor Company in Eastland.

He went into service on January 23, 1941 and was sent to Camp Wolters. From there he was sent to Fort Bragg, N. C. and then overseas in October 1942. He took part in the North African campaign and in the invasion of Sicily. From Sicily he was sent to England and participated in the invasion of France, in which he was killed.

Besides his mother he is survived by six sisters, Mrs. Leo Hise, Mrs. Pearl McNurten, Mrs. C. W. Blackney, all of Ranger, Mrs. J. E. Mangrum of Harington, Mrs. L. J. Lemons of Kerrville and Mrs. Myrtle Garrison of Mineral Wells; four brothers, Mose Nantz of Ranger, Elihu Nantz of Jacksonville, John Nantz of Graham and Colonel Nantz of Graham.

Pallbearers will be members of the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Well... I Dunno, But...

Today is Memorial Day, the day on which we pay tribute to the men who gave their lives in wars in which our country has fought. And just one week from today is the fourth anniversary of the invasion of France, a day that spelled death to so many of our men in the armed forces. Coincident to these days is the return of the bodies of men from Ranger who gave their lives for the effort which we have not completed, a cause which we have not carried to achievement.

Though the guns have ceased firing so far as World War II is concerned, the battle for peace still goes on. And our statesmen have been fighting the "cold war" longer than it took our armed forces to push the Germans to the wall.

That's something to think about. Evidently, our statesmen are not as effective with their diplomacy as our armed forces with their guns. Our diplomatic strategy seems not so well planned as our military strategy nor the tactics so telling in results.

Where is the difference? Is it in the brains that direct these strategies and tactics, is it in the difference of preparation and training of those that had and have tasks to do, or is it a difference in the problem itself? Of course, the war required both mental planning and physical combat, while the "cold war" is one of mind and nerves.

But if we consider the significance of this day how can it be that we will stand idly by and see our country forced to the brink of another war?

If we recall the grimness of June 6, 1944 and its portent, how can we fail to carry through our end of the task as nobly as did the men who fought on the battlefields?

Of all our memories of the late war, the invasion of France is the most poignant one. It was the event that had been awaited. It released a tension, the tension of wondering when and where our forces would strike at the heart of Germany. We remember how closely by radio, newspaper and teletype we followed the progress of events that, despite the cost, led to a glorious victory.

Now, four years later, on Memorial Day, there is a different kind of tension. And the easing of that tension is up to us, not to the men we honor today.

ABDULLAH HAS JERUSALEM UNDER SIEGE

JERUSALEM, May 29 (UP) — King Abdullah's Arab Legion placed modern Jerusalem under siege today, blasting its strong points with mortars and artillery after capturing the old walled city in an 11-day campaign of house-to-house fighting.

Other Arab forces dug in at Latrun on the Tel Aviv-Jerusalem road to insure the complete isolation of Jerusalem and prevent desperately needed supplies from reaching its battered defenders.

Arab tanks, guns, mortars and troop reinforcements poured into the Latrun area while Egyptian bombers blasted Jewish concentrations in Hulda and Abu Shusha, four miles west.

Abdullah's troops appeared to assault modern Jerusalem with the same tactics that won the old city, which was isolated from outside help and beaten into submission.

Official Arab sources said some 2,500 Jews surrendered in the old city, including 500 fighters and 2,000 women and children. The fighters were taken in trucks and buses last night to prisoner-of-war camps in the desert near Amman, capital of Trans-Jordan. Women and children were placed in the custody of the Red Cross.

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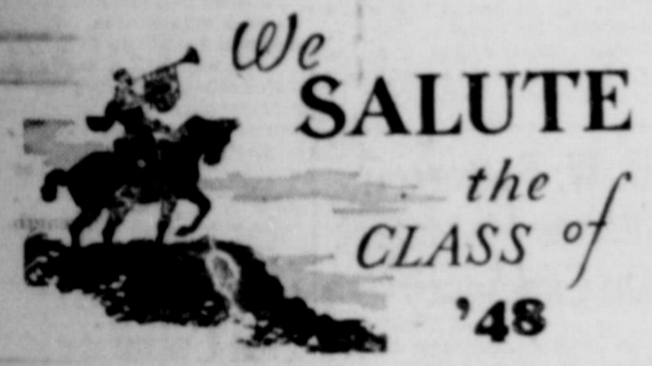

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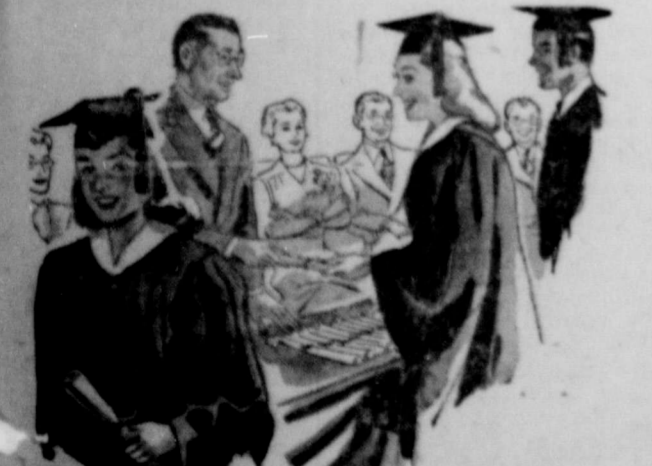

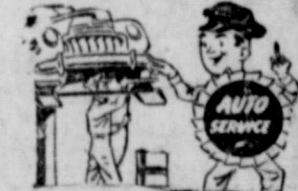
