Announcement has just been received by Mrs. Cora Hazard, and family of Ranger, of the coming graduation of her grandson, Thomas W. Hazard, Jr., at the United States Military Academy at West Point on June 8th.

Cadet Hazard is the only child of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas W. Hazard, who reside in California, where he received his education prior to his entrance at the academy.

He did preparatory work at the Drew School in San Francisco, where he received his appointment to West Point and the Coast Guard Academy, having obtained the latter by placing 20th in a nationwide competitive examination. Preferring the Army as a career, however, he declined the Coast Guard Academy appointment and entered West Point in 1944.

Besides his several other attainments while there he won his letters in boxing and in soccer, and served as captain of the varsity boxing team during his last year at the academy.

NEW WATER EQUIPMENT PURCHASED

Water Commissioner A. L. Stiles announced today that the city commission has purchased new water treating equipment for the city water supply and that it will be installed immediately upon arrival.

The order for the equipment has been placed and the equipment company representative stated that the order will be delivered within 45 to 60 days. He stated that every effort will be made to deliver it earlier but a promise to that effect could not be made.

One of the most important items of equipment purchased is a chlorinator. It is called a visible vacuum chlorinator and has all of the latest devices for keeping an equalized chlorination of the water in process at all times. Dials indicate the operations and a glass globe on top of the chlorinator permits the process to be observed.

Another piece of equipment purchased is a comparator which determines the amount of chlorine needed and being used and permits the operator to control the amount of chemicals used.

Two dry chemical feeders were purchased and will treat the water with lime and alum as it flows into the main for delivery to the standpipe.

Mr. Stiles in speaking of the equipment, stated that it has long been needed for the water works and will assure the town of the purest water possible.

D. K. Scott Dies At Cisco; Funeral Sometime Friday

Judge D. K. Scott, veteran Cisco attorney and former Eastland County Judge, passed away at his home in Cisco Wednesday night at 11:30.

Funeral arrangements were pending this (Thursday) morning, but it was stated that they doubtless would be held sometime Friday.

Survivors include three daughters: Mrs. W. S. Charles, Charlotte, North Carolina; Mrs. Sam G. Hines of Dallas and Mrs. Sam P. Baugh, eight grandchildren, seven great-grandchildren and one great-great-grand child also survive.

Judge Scott's wife passed away Oct. 2, 1947.

Born at Jefferson, Ohio, on August 7, 1855, Judge Scott came to Dallas in 1872. He later came to Eastland County where he engaged in the mercantile business. He was elected Eastland county judge in 1888. He formed a law partnership with the later Homer P. Breisford and located at Cisco where he was in charge of the firm's office. Breisford remained in the Eastland office of the firm.

American Freed After Russians Detain Him

BERLIN, June 2, (UP)—Dr. Harry L. Franklin, deputy chief of the Civil Administration and Political Affairs of the American military government here, was freed today after being detained by the Russians for 16 hours while they checked his identity.

An American military detail went to Russian headquarters at midday and Franklin was turned over to it. He was weary and grimy, but said he had not been mistreated in any way.

"The Russians treated me with indifference," he said. "They did not appear to be interested in me."

He was confined to a room at Soviet district headquarters in midtown Berlin. There was no bed in the room, but he got some rest on a table.

Lilienthal Fails To Persuade AFL Not To Strike

WASHINGTON, June 3, (UP)—Chairman David Lilienthal of the Atomic Energy Commission said today he had failed to persuade AFL unions not to strike next week at the Atomic Research Laboratory at Oak Ridge, Tenn.

"But I still can't believe the men will strike, in spite of the fact that they feel they are in the right," he said. "We will have to keep the plant going."

Lilienthal talked to reporters as he emerged from a two-hour conference with AFL president William Green and president of the 14 international unions representing the 875 workers in the laboratory.

Atomic bombs are not made at the laboratory, operated for the government by the Carbide and Carbon Chemical Corp., nor does the plant make fissionable material from which atomic bombs are made. But the Oak Ridge laboratory is the only place where radioactive isotopes are produced for research.

House Group Cuts Foreign Spending Appropriations

WASHINGTON, June 2 (UP)—The House Appropriations Committee today hacked \$553,000,000 from the administrations overall foreign spending program.

It allowed \$5,980,710,288 for seven key foreign programs, including the critical European Recovery Program, but warned that the money will have to do for 15 months instead of 12 because—

"The gradual but steady depletion of this country's resources makes it mandatory that Congress take every reasonable precaution to safeguard the dwindling assets and domestic economy of this nation."

In effect, the reduction amounts to about 25 per cent—consisting of the actual cut and the fact that the money will have to stretch three months longer.

FOR WORTH, Texas, June 3.—Dorothy M. Henry, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry L. Henry, Ranger, is among the 219 students receiving degrees at TCU's 75th anniversary commencement exercises, on June 6. She is a member of the largest graduating class in TCU's history, and the commencement exercises at 8 p. m. Sunday, on the campus in Fort Worth—are a part of TCU's 75th anniversary celebration.

Four major events will mark the graduates last day at TCU. In addition to the usual commencement activities, one of these will be one of the major events of the university's Diamond Jubilee program—an all Gillis concert at 2:30 p. m. Sunday in For Worth's Will Rogers Memorial Auditorium.

Don Gillis, TCU graduate and former director of the Horned Frog Band, now director of serious music for the National Broadcasting Company, New York City, has written "Symphony No. 7, Saga of a Prairie School" and dedicated it to TCU's 75th anniversary. Its world premier performance will be at the concert, which also marks the first time that any of Gillis' serious works—which have been featured numerous times by the N.B.C. Symphony, the Los Angeles Symphony, the Cincinnati Symphony and others—have been played in his home town.

Other events on the commencement day schedule include: Baccalaureate services at 11 a. m., a tea honoring the graduates and their families at 5 p. m. and the graduation at 8 p. m.

Miss Henry graduated from Ranger High School in 1941. She also attended T.W.C. in Fort Worth before transferring to TCU. While at TCU she participated in several dramatic productions and is a member of the Falls Players.

WASHINGTON — Sen. Chan Gurney, R., S.D., today asked the Senate to pass the 19-through-25 draft as a "peace measure" because voluntary enlistment programs have failed to provide enough men.

Gurney is chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee. He opened Senate debate on the draft bill.

"If America is to be influential in the peace councils of the world, we must lead from strength and not from weakness," Gurney said. "We must build up and maintain military forces capable of breaking up any attack against us."

A possible fight over civil rights proposals hung over the bill as the Senate started its debate.

Pvt. Nantz who was the son of Mrs. Susie Nantz of Ranger, was killed in action at Barnville, France on June 17, 1944. He was born in Jackboro on December 18, 1918, and had resided in Ranger 21 years. He attended Ranger High School and just prior to entering service was employed at the King-Ball Motor Company in Eastland.

He entered the service of the Army on January 23, 1941 and received his first training at Camp Wolters. From Fort Bragg he was sent overseas in October 1942, and took part in the North African campaign. He was in the invasion of Sicily and from there was sent to England to take part in the invasion of France, in which he was killed.

Besides his mother, he is survived by six sisters, Mrs. Leo Hise, Mrs. Pearl McNurten, Mrs. C. W. Blackney, all of Ranger, Mrs. J. E. Mangrum of Hartington, Mrs. Y. J. Lemons of Kerrville and Mrs. Myrtle Garrison of Mineral Wells; four brothers, Mose Nantz of Ranger, Elsie Nantz of Jackboro, John Nantz of Graham and Colonel Nantz of Graham.

Pallbearers will be members of the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Mrs. Dunham died in Caddo Wednesday, June 2, 1948. She was born in Adams county, Illinois on November 18, 1857. She grew to young womanhood at Lawrence, Kansas and was married to the late Mr. Dunham June 2, 1870 at Fredonia, Kansas. She had resided in Caddo for 48 years and was a member of the Baptist Church there.

Sen. J. Howard McGrath, D., R.I., who heads the Democratic National Committee, made it clear that the Administration opposed the seven civil rights amendments which Sen. William Langer, R., N.D., wants to tack onto the draft bill.

Langer's amendments, if passed, would be certain to provoke a Southern Democratic filibuster and thereby jeopardize chances for approval of the measure.

McGrath said he had no objection to civil rights amendments when they "logically" were related to a bill but that a defense measure was not the place.

"The security of the country comes first," he told reporters, "and Congress should be allowed to deal with the draft bill without it being encumbered with any other controversial matters."

Another administration spokesman said he believed there was no question that the Langer amendments would be killed. It may be done summarily through a simple motion to table, which is not debatable.

Langer's amendments would carry out Mr. Truman's civil rights proposals as they could apply to the armed forces. They would make it a federal crime to lynch a serviceman, forbid poll taxes for servicemen and forbid racial discrimination in employment by defense contractors.

Vacationers Warned Of Woods Hazards

KENT, O. (UP)—Vacationers campers and picnickers are advised to admire but not to touch the unknown woodland trees that may enthrall them.

If you don't know your trees, keep a careful hands-off policy or you may be uncomfortably sorry, warns Martin L. Davey, Jr., president of the Davey Tree Expert Co.

A few kinds of trees have bark, foliage, blossoms, fruits, seeds and even sap poisonous to skin contact, although some people are immune to at least some of the hazards. Trees notable in the "poison ivy league" may give cause to regret carelessness.

Among the barks that pack a poisonous "bite" are the poison sumac and devil's walking stick. Foliage to avoid includes that of the allanhus, common box eastern red cedar, common oleander and the northern catalpa. Severe cases of poisoning are possible from handling the fruit of the common pawpaw and the fruit or seeds of the inevitable poison sumac and the ginkgo.

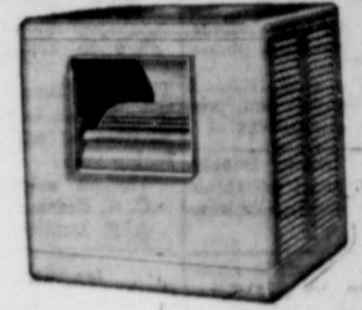

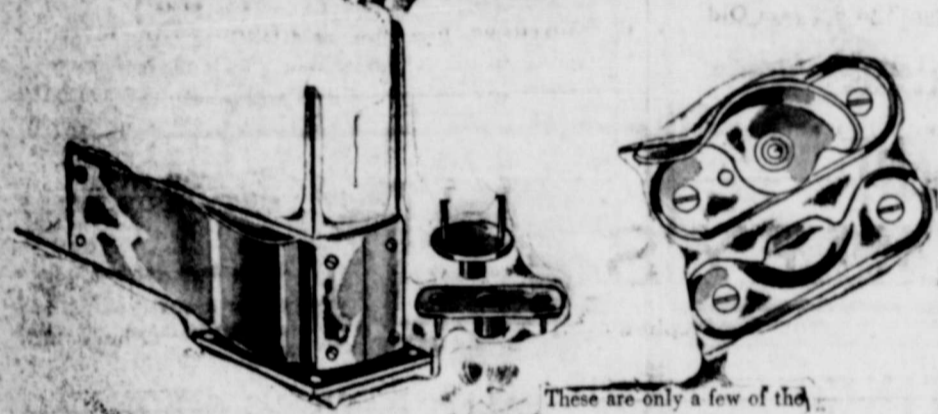

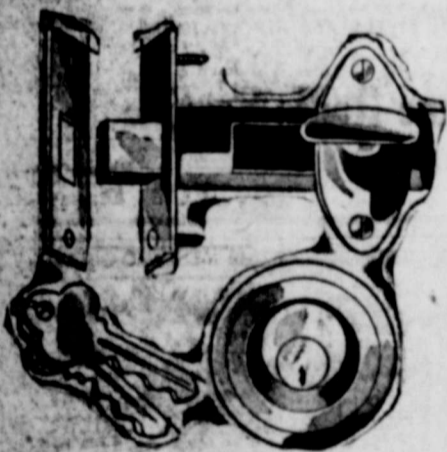

Huge Feed Mill Nears Completion At Fort Worth

FORT WORTH, Texas. — It was two days before Christmas in 1946 that a crew began work out on a prairie north of Fort Worth. Today, nearly a year and a half later, construction is almost completed on one of the largest and most modern feed mills in the world.

The new plant, owned by Burrus Feed Mills, is of solid concrete and steel, representing an outlay estimated at \$2,000,000. The central structure is 11 stories, including basement, and rises to a height of 180 feet.

In the graphic words of Wiley Akins, general manager, "the new mill is almost a push-button operation."

Its labor-saving and time-

saving mechanisms are a far cry from the back-breaking methods of former days when men unloaded freight cars with shovels and others workers pushed hand-trucks, which carried five sacks of feed.

At the new mill, a car containing 100,000 pounds of cotton seed meal can be unloaded and the contents conveyed by air suction to the tenth floor in half an hour. To unload a car of grain and transport the grain to storage bins will take only four minutes.

Power for the new mill will be provided by 242 electric motors. The sifting, grading, weighing

and packaging will be done entirely by machinery.

The warehouse is immense, being 800 feet by 200 feet—7½ acres under one roof. Thirty-two box cars can be loaded at one time inside the building while eight of the largest type trucks are being loaded at the freight dock.

The mill can operate 24 hours a day and has a capacity of 2,400 tons, or 80 carloads, in 24 hours.
