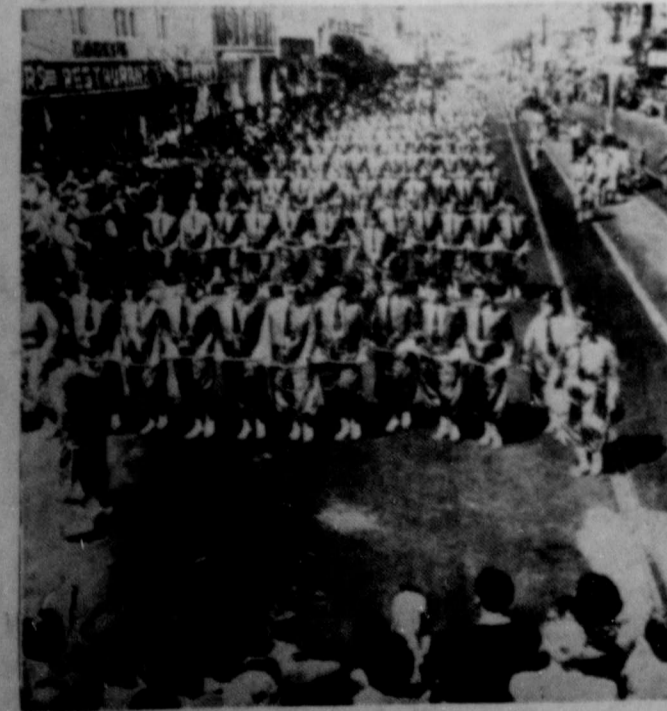

Kirk Was . . .

old hard work and planning. That man was Frank Kirk.

When interviewed about his part in the development of the Kirk Pool, Frank Kirk would start off with "Well, we got a 1200 acre block together, to start with—then Mr. McKissick . . ." Or "We thought there might be oil near an old well which had been drilled 20 years before on the Mears property and then Arnold . . ." Or "We got Erin Mears to go out with his 'Doodle Bug' and work around the area of the first Mears well, and then Erin . . ." Or "Erin Mears is the one who really should have his picture in the paper. He really plotted out the first location of the well and getting the facts out of the originator of our present Gorman field, namely, Frank Kirk for whom Bob McKissick suggested that this field be named.

According to Frank Kirk, he had very little to do with the whole thing—he just happened to be there when the rest of the people were blocking up the acreage, when the contractors were being skeptical and leery since it had been worked, after a fashion, and abandoned back 20 or 25 years ago. Yes, Frank Kirk just happened to be passing when it took all faith and the courage to stand up and tell people with the big money, the kind of money it has taken to develop this and any other field, that there was oil here, and to make them believe in the "Doodle Bug Geology" of Erin Mears when all the best geology and geological records of the old days disapproved that faith and mocked that courage.

A short running account of the early beginnings of our present "boom" here in Gorman, includes the following facts. Frank Kirk and his associates had talked and mulled over the possibilities of revamping some of the old diggings hereabouts for several weeks. Finally Frank Kirk decided he would do something about the matter. He blocked up leases totaling approximately 1200 acres and let the contract to L. W. Choate who drilled the first well, back in January of 1948. Mr. Choate is in the field, one drilling for Bob McKissick on the No. 1 T. N. Seay at the present, and the other drilling for Bob McKissick on the No. 2 Mears Estate about 900 feet from the good well which Mr. McKissick brought in last. The second well on the field is drilled by Kirk and McKissick on the Westmoreland lease. It is a good well, but it had to be put on pump because pressure was insufficient to bring up the oil.

R. H. Patterson came into the field because he had been here way back in the other boom as a kid out of high school and because he and Arnold Kirk had some rigs which they owned jointly. Their outfit drilled the third well in the new field, the first well for the Skelley Oil Corp. in the field, and the No. 2 well on the Mears Estate Property, on the Skelley lease. Mr. and Mrs. Patterson have been a part of the development since the very beginning and have lived at the hotel almost from the start. Mrs. Patterson has said from the start that they are going to live in Gorman from now on, and she has insisted over and over that the Gorman people, the owners of the land on which the wells are being drilled and all who have had a chance to help should be commended highly for the wonderful way in which they have cooperated to make the going easier in breaking into the new venture.

Summing up: The news report of June 1st listed 22 producing wells in the area, and only 7 dry, abandoned, and plugged holes up to that time. We have at least two producers to come in since then, and have had only one dry hole. The percentage is still high according to oil men who are old at the game. One made the statement "Sure that's good. I made my money from a venture in which I got 25 dry holes stacked up against 26 good wells." (I found out later that he sold one block of holdings in the East Texas field for well over a million dollars.)

And this is the thing that our friend and neighbor, Frank Kirk, by the force of his will power, vision, and determination has brought to us. By this article has been asked for by a number of people who feel that we should give Frank Kirk this small token of our appreciation and esteem. Frankly, he is as embarrassed at having his picture in the paper as an 11-year-old boy giving his first recitation, which makes us appreciate him all the more, since he so evidently is not seeking the limelight and scarcely recognizes that he has done anything out of the ordinary in spending his energies in this venture, from which we all are profiting, and from which we shall benefit for years to come.

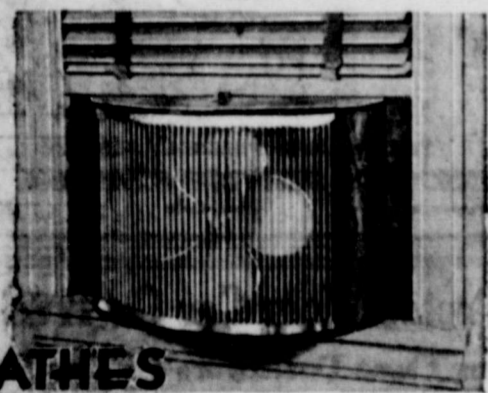

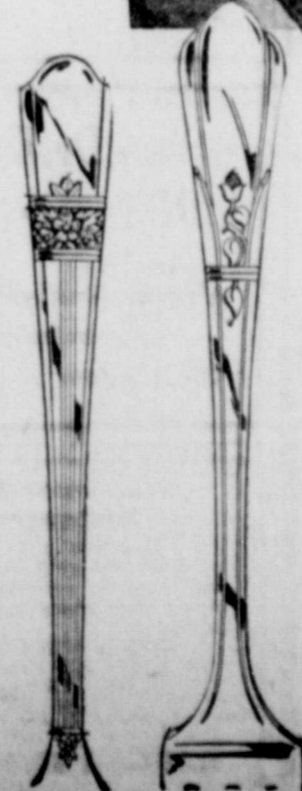
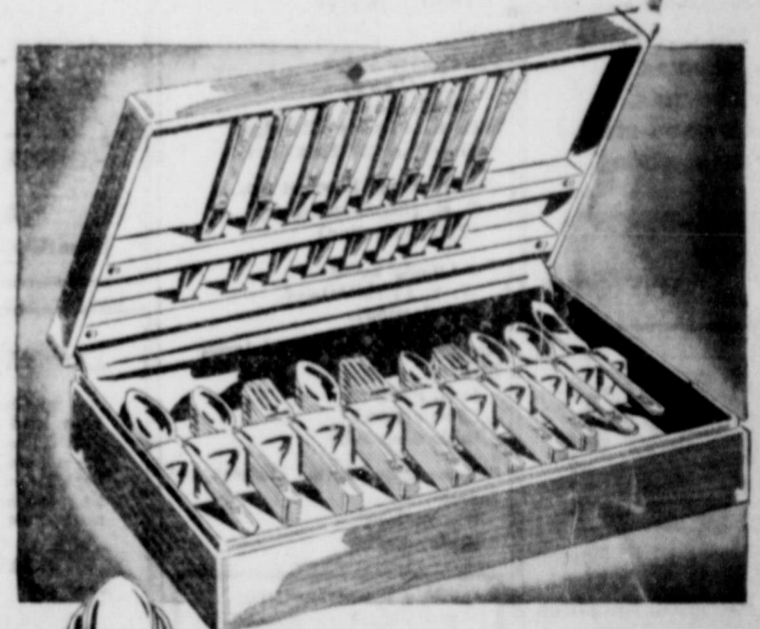

WORLD BISHOPS TO MEET ON POST-WAR PROBLEMS

LONDON (UP)—The largest gathering of bishops ever held in the British Isles will meet here in July to apply their "tremendous persuasive power" to such tropical problems as "modern conceptions of the state."

More than 320 bishops from five continents will attend the Lambeth world conference of the Anglican Community, including 73 bishops of the Episcopal Church of the United States.

Russia will not be represented at the meeting, although it was invited by the Archbishop of Canterbury. The Orthodox patriarch, Alexy, pointed out that the Orthodox church conference in Moscow is scheduled for approximately the same time.

American troops in Japan are helping pay the expenses of a delegation of Japanese bishops invited to the conference.

There will be no Roman Catholic guests either, but an Anglican church spokesman said at a press conference that there had been a gradual improvement of relations between the Anglican and Roman Catholic churches since the last Lambeth conference in 1930. The improvement, he said, did not find its expression in official acts but in an increase of personal contacts, due particularly to the outstanding personalities of the late Archbishop of Canterbury.

A considerable number of European church leaders have agreed to come to London during the Lambeth conference as visitors and will participate only in the social events connected with it.

Scandinavia will be particularly strongly represented by the bishop of Copenhagen, Fuglsang-Damgaard; the bishop of Strangnas, Dr. G. Aulen; the bishop of Ireland, Siguriger Sigurdson; the archbishop of Abo, Aleks Lehtonen, and a representative of the church of Norway.
