Major increases contributing to the overall gain were recorded by: Illinois up 2,000 barrels to 171,-800 barrels; Kansas, up, 7,700 from the north and east lines o ba-rrels to 308.050, a new high section 33 D&DA survey. for the state this year; Oklahoma, 1,350 to 428,450, also a new high; Mississippi, 3,920 to 118,505; Wy-1.920 to 148:160 and Montana 680 to 25,030.

The 24th Republican National Convention was thrown into an uproar by a series of pro-Dewey declarations punctuated by announcement that enemies of the New York Governor are regrouping to stop him if possible.

Heading the drive to kill off Thomas E. Dewey's chances of a first ballot nomination are Sen. Robert A. Taft and Harold E. Stassen with assists from Gov. Jammes H. Duff of Pennsylvania and other yet unamed "leaders."






