R. L. Schultz Of Rising Star On FHA Committee

Appointment of Robert L. Schultz, Rising Star, to a three year term on the Farmers Home Administration county committee for Eastland County was announced today by L. J. Cappie, State Director.

Mr. Schultz succeeds Mr. Roland M. Earp, whose term expires June 30. Also on the committee are Mr. Tillman L. Wheat of Eastland and Mr. James E. Spencer, of Cisco. A committee of three serves in each agricultural county throughout the nation in which the agency makes farm ownership and operating loans. Appointments are scheduled so that a committee always has two experienced members.

The Eastland county committee has an important place in making supervised credit available to local farmers, according to Mr. George L. Lane, County Supervisor.

Before any money can be borrowed through the agency an applicant must have the approval of the county committee. In the case of farm ownership loans, the farm to be purchased, enlarged or improved must also be approved by the committee. "The members know the agricultural conditions in the county, are often familiar with the farm the applicant plans to operate," Mr. Lane explained.

In addition to approving loans the committee cooperates with the county supervisor in overall administration of the program in the county. Periodically they review the progress of the borrowers to determine whether they have reached a financial position that would enable them to refinance their loans through private lenders. A farmer who is eligible for credit from regular lending sources is not eligible for a loan from the Farmers Home Administration.

"Using this system of operation, the agency has helped many families in Eastland County toward better farming and better living with farm purchases and farm operating loans," Mr. Lane said. In the past 12 months 275 applications have been received for this type of credit.

Health Officers Give Ranger A Good Report

Inspectors Flannery and Posey of the State Department of Health were in Ranger Friday for an inspection of various types of businesses and on completion of the inspection, reported that taken all around, the businesses were the cleanest found in any town that they have inspected.

Included in the tour of inspection were drug stores, grocery stores, restaurants, the locker plant and slaughter house. They were accompanied on the inspections by Police Chief W. G. Pounds and Policeman Johnnie Boyd, and complimented the officers on their efforts toward keeping Ranger up to the standards of the Health Department.

Wheat Receipts Make Record In Kansas City

KANSAS CITY, July 10 (UP) — A new all-time weekly record of wheat receipts was established here today when 1,500 cars of grain were received at the Kansas City terminals, boosting the total for the week to 11,877 cars. The previous record total for a week was established the week of July 5, 1938, when 9,618 cars were received at the Kansas City market.

Rainfall For Two Days Totals .66 Of An Inch

Showers which fell in downtown Ranger Friday afternoon and Saturday afternoon netted a total of .66 of an inch of rain at press time Saturday.

Though the showers were heavy both days down town, and the fall each afternoon measured .33 of an inch, some sections of town reported little more than a sprinkle.

The fall in the last two days gives Ranger a total of 6.16 inches of rain since the 13th day of June, the date when the long drought was broken.

U. S. CLAIMS BLOCKADE OF BERLIN ILLEGAL

WASHINGTON, July 9, (UP) — The United States claimed today that the Soviet blockade of Berlin is illegal and pointed to a long-secret Truman-Stalin exchange to prove it.

Secretary of State George C. Marshall cited the June, 1945, exchange in a stern note to Moscow protesting Soviet curbs on highway and rail traffic into the former German capital. The American protest was made public last night along with those of the British and French. Moscow has not yet replied.

Marshall said flatly that this country "will not be induced by threats, pressure or other actions to abandon" its right to remain in Berlin, which it asserted was an international zone.

Says U. S. Will Not Submit To New Red Order

BERLIN, July 10 (UP) — An authoritative American spokesman said today that the United States would not submit to a new Soviet order calling for Russian inspection of any automobile leaving Berlin.

The expected western rejection of the somewhat absurd Russian traffic ruling appeared to shut off in advance any chance that it might have opened in the land blockade of the city.

The baby was born July 9 and is survived by his parents and a sister, Rosie Gray of Caddo.

Churchill Hints Disagreement In Soviet Ranks

WOODFORD, Eng. July 10 (UP) — Winston Churchill said today that he believes the "13 men in the Kremlin" have disagreed on Russia's foreign policy.

Speaking in his home constituency, the wartime prime minister suggested the possibility of a difference of opinion within the Soviet Politburo, the ruling body of Russia, and said—

"There is no rational process by which we can understand the quarrel with Tito at the same time that the Berlin crisis is forced to a head."

He praised the firm stand of Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin in the Berlin dispute over the Russian blockade of the German capital.

PHA RELEASES HOUSING UNITS TO COLLEGE

Dr. G. C. Boswell, president of Ranger Junior College, stated today that the Public Housing Administration of Fort Worth is releasing to Ranger Junior College all of the housing units which have been brought to Ranger.

He stated that he was in Fort Worth yesterday getting final instructions on the procedure that the college must take in order that it may be given these buildings, and just as soon as final papers are signed complete title will be turned over to Ranger Junior College.

According to his story this is quite a financial gain for the college, and he feels sure that the citizenship of Ranger will appreciate this gift from the Government to the college.

"It is very difficult to get exact cost, but it will run into several thousand dollars since the apartments that were constructed on Cypress Street cost the Government more than \$70,000 and the gift included these apartments together with those that have been recently moved into Cooper addition," he said.

Total value of all buildings received from the government is estimated to be more than \$100,000.

The college now has housing facilities for 31 families and 18 boys.

Dr. Boswell stated today that the housing units on Cypress Street will be painted white in the very near future and he hopes to have that work done before the opening of the fall term.

PHILADELPHIA, July 9, (UP) — New Deal Democrats under command of former OPA Chief Leon Henderson took over leadership today of the lost stop-Truman campaign.

But the forces opposed to the President's nomination were retreating on almost every other front. The Democratic National Convention meeting here is scheduled to name him for president Wednesday night.

Henderson announced after a meeting of the Americans for Democratic Action executive committee that the organization would continue its effort to obtain nomination of supreme court Justice William O. Douglas. Henderson said he would urge James Roosevelt, California state chairman, to join in an anti-Truman caucus tonight.

The anti-Truman movement folded in today's Democratic national committee meeting when Sen. Olin D. Johnson of South Carolina decided not to offer his motion to ask the president to withdraw.

Mediterranean Fleet To Back Foreign Policy

CHAUTAQUA, N. Y. July 10, (UP) — The Navy's powerful Mediterranean fleet is being kept on the move to back up American foreign policies in that troubled area, the vice chief of naval operations said today.

In the event of sudden war with a European power, it is this same fleet with its control of the sea, which would enable us to reinforce and supply American troops and civilians, or to evacuate them," Vice Adm. Arthur W. Radford said.

Reciting the Navy's role in diplomacy, Radford told the diamond jubilee celebration of the Chautauqua institution that the job is done very simply—"by showing the flag" in foreign ports.

Radford's strongly worded review of the Navy's role and strength also included these points—

1. The Navy is not "lop-sided" although carriers will deliver "Sunday punches" in any future war.
2. The Navy has improved on Germany's wartime submarines.
3. Experiments with submarines indicate that the best defense against a submarine attacker may be another submarine battling under water "like giant fishes."
4. Push-button warfare "still belongs in the realm of fantastic magazine stories."

HOUSE TAKES TO WATER POULTNEY, Vt. (UP) — A house sailed across Lake St. Catherine here. The two-story, five-ton structure was mounted on a raft and towed by motorboats to

the national committee meeting when Sen. Olin D. Johnson of South Carolina decided not to offer his motion to ask the president to withdraw.

"But I am still for Ike," Johnson said, "I haven't thought of a second choice. If Mr. Truman is nominated I wouldn't be surprised if the South puts up its own candidate."

Southerners were angry for a new reason. They have learned that some of Mr. Truman's top leaders are trying to get the vice presidential nomination for Douglas. He is a veteran new dealer and Southern conservatives don't like his politics.

Gov. J. Strom Thurmond of South Carolina made a final appeal to the President to withdraw. He said Mr. Truman should help select a ticket "which will help the Democratic party to win in November."

Thurmond said Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower still was his candidate and that he thought the General might still be persuaded to run. Thurmond stands almost alone among the anti-Truman Democrats.

Mr. Truman will be nominated Wednesday night for a full White House term of his own according to revised Democratic National convention plans.

Some of his opponents have surrendered and are calling for Mr. Truman's nomination. Others are talking—mostly to themselves—about the possibility of nominating anyone of the following men:

Sen. Alben W. Barkley of Kentucky, Chief Justice Fred M. Vinson of Kentucky, Supreme Justice William O. Douglas of Washington, Secretary of State George C. Marshall or Former Speaker Sam Rayburn.

Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower statement yesterday that he would refuse the Democratic Presidential nomination if it tended to him killed the stop-Truman movement so far as control of this convention was concerned. It looks like nearly six months and more than 1,500 words in a series of statements and letters to say "No." But when he took himself out yesterday it was for keeps.

Frozen Food Analysis Shows Beautiful Onion

Would you believe an onion looks beautiful?

It does under a polarized microscope in the University of Texas engineering research laboratory where geological analysis methods are being applied to the study of frozen foods in what has been described as the first new development in frozen food analysis in 30 years.

Assistant Professor James M. Le Beau wrote his doctor's dissertation on the unique method, acclaimed by Rudolph Plank, internationally known refrigeration expert, as a revolutionary development.

Objectives of the research are determination of the most effective method of freezing food and of reasons for frozen food spoilage. The process is this:

An onion (especially adaptable because the skin is one cell thick) is frozen, placed under a polarized microscope in a room where the temperature is below zero, and photographed.

The microscope views ice crystals in the same manner that it sees mineral crystals in geological substances, and it sees all of them in color.

are an amazing blend of varied rainbow hues, showing the tiny cells and the ice crystal formations.

Those photos allow the researcher to determine the best freezing methods for the particular type food, because they show the effects of the ice crystal formation on the cell structures after various methods of freezing.

In addition to onions, Le Beau has photographed various fish and fruit specimens in his research. He has worked in virtual Eskimo dress in the cold laboratory in order to accomplish his research, and has recorded methods learned by experience that will simplify future research.

New Developments in Old Age Voting By Supreme Court

Old folks in the city will have the same voting privileges in the July 24 Democratic primary as the old folks in small towns and rural areas of Texas.

This in effect was the ruling of the Texas Supreme Court in an opinion handed down last week (week ending June 26). By a vote of 6-3, the State's highest tribunal held that all persons over 60 years of age who failed to obtain poll tax exemption certificates before Feb. 1 may vote in the elections this year.

Voting on the sides of the old folks were Chief Justice J. E. Hickman, Associate Justices Graham B. Smedley, James P. Hari, W. St. John Garwood, John H. Sharp, and W. M. Taylor.

The case originated in Howard County, and involved the legality of an amendment to the exemption law, passed at the last session of the Legislature.

The lawmakers had passed a bill that required all persons over 60 must renew their permanent exemption certificates annually, if they lived in cities of 10,000 population or more. The amendment did not change the exemption procedure of old folks living in small towns and rural areas, who are not required to make renewals.

The Supreme Court in ruling in favor of the old folks said that the Legislature did not intend to deprive any qualified voter of his right to vote, and reversed lower court opinions by holding that the amendment failed to set out a penalty.

Thousands of old folks in Texas would have been unable to vote if the Supreme Court had not ruled as it did.

Tipsy Judge Aroused Civic Ire Back In '23

UNION, S. C. (UP)—The scales of Justice were slightly tipsy during a term of court here in 1823, according to records newly brought to light.

His honor was recommended for impeachment by the grand jury on charges of being "in a continual state of intoxication and unfit for the transaction of business to the jury of our citizens and disgrace of this state."

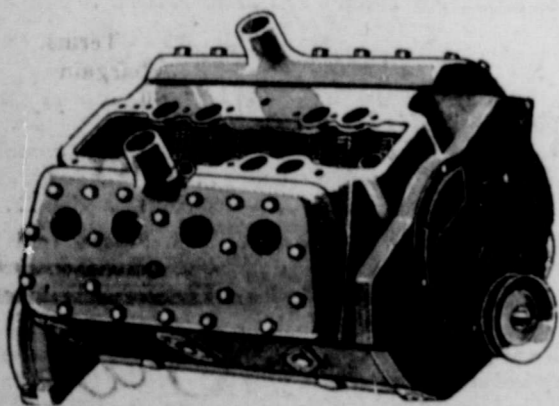

If the practice continues, more stringent border controls will be instituted, thus penalizing thousands of bona fide American

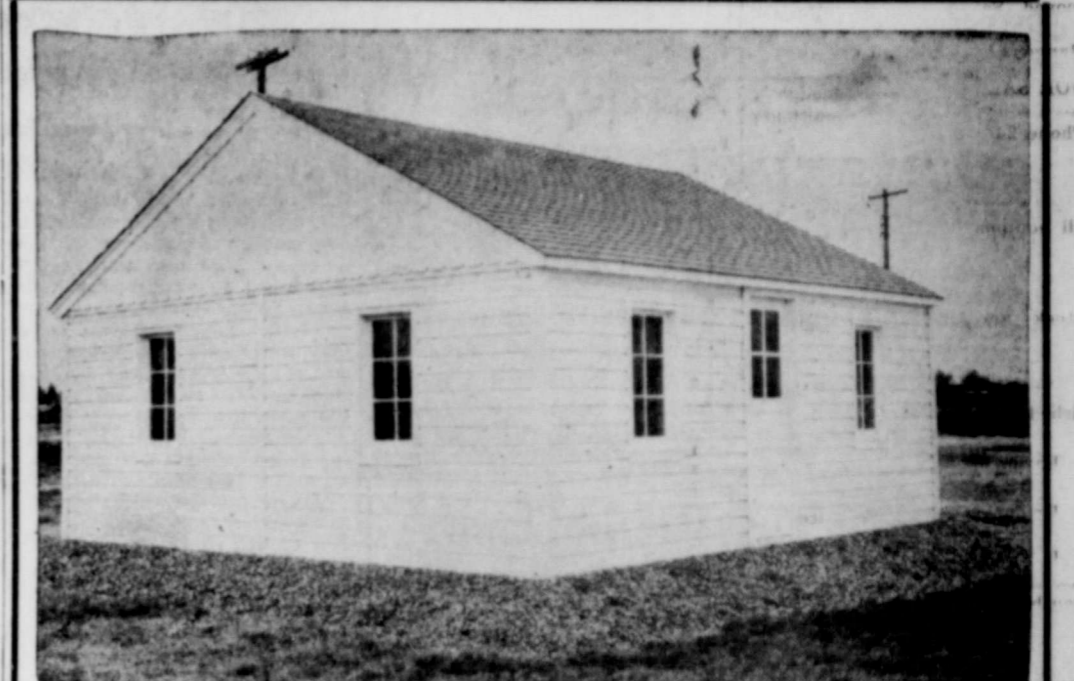
tourists the California State Automobile Association reported. Mexican authorities are now pursuing an policy aimed at easing border restrictions in an effort to stimulate traffic.
