Tank, Tear Gas Used To Break **Dayton Strikers**

Dayton, O. - (UP) National guards used a German tank, bnyonets and tear gas today to break up a crowd that surged up to the gates of the strikebound Univis Lens Co. Plant as some employes

began going back to work. A crowd estimated at some 400 men and women who had bee booing the non-strikers, broke a line of Ohio guardsmen and push ed to the gates of the plant.

Reinforcements were rushed to the gate and the crowd was pushed back by the tank and soldiers marching side by side with fixed bayonets. An army six-by-six truck, loaded with a tear gas detail, cut into the crowd, firing gas that brought jeers from the strikers.

Guardsmen, ordered to the scene to preserve order, were apparently being very careful not to injury anyone but dterermined to clear the area.

WASHINGTON Aug. 3 (UP)-Sen. Robert A. Taft, R., O., conthe Soviet generalissimo still were ceded today that it would be "abbeing coded and transmitted from solutely impossible" to break the Southern anti-poll tax filibuster. But Republican Senate leaders shooting for Saturday adjournsment of the special session, scheduled a Senate meeting tonight to dispose of other items.

Taft told reporters after a meeting of the GOP policy committee that it would be impossible to smash the "Dixiecrat" talka thon without amending Senate rules. That would be impossible

until next year, he said. But the GOP leaders said the Senate will be held in session until 10 o'clock tonight in an effort to clear the decks for limited action on high prices and housing.

The Republican policy leaders called a conference of all GOP Senators tomorrow to discuss their tentative plans to tighten up on credit inflation, pass a modified long-range housing bill and adjourn for the year on Saturday.

The conference tomorrow, he said, will consider action on constitutional amendment outlawing the poll tax as a voting requisite in federal elections.

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British Scientists Build Super X-Ray Krupp Convicted

LONDON (UP)-British atom researchers have built a 80,-000,000 volt X-ray synchrotron.

The announcement was made by the electronics group of the atom c energy research establishment. It was cautiously hinted that the new machine might give re lief of cancer sufferers. The Xrays from the machine are 83 powerful that they make it possible to treat tumors too deep inside the human body for present machines.

The synchrotron also is to give British scientists a model for even more powerful synchrotrons. One is planned to produce 300,000,000
