

# **CLAIMS NAVY** TRIED TO GET

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (UP)-The accused head of a Soviet spy ring said today that the Navy tried to get him fired from the government during the war but that he was cleared through intervention by Lauchlin Currie, administrative assistant to the late President Roosevelt.

He said that after this intervention, he was cleared in a letter from the then Secretary of War,

Robert P. Patterson. The alleged spy, Russian-born Nathan Gregory Silvermaster, refused to tell the House Unamerican Committee whether he is a Communist. But he denied the espionage charges as "false and fantastic' 'and called his accuser, Elizabeth T. Bentley "a neurotic liar"






