This will be a regular Thursday night feature and the idea originated with two local citizens and has been copyrighted by them. On the screen each Thursday night will be flashed the silhouette of some prominent Ranger business man. And who is he will be the question you are asked.

It sounds like a lot of fun and a preview of it this morning was entertaining.

### Much Activity Followed Kirk Pool Discovery

Stimulated by the discovery early this year of the rich Kirk pool along the border of Eastland and Comanche counties, the quest for new oil fields in this territory has widened out.

Two wildcats are included in the latest report.

Three miles southeast of Gorman, Heshaw Bros. and Mitchell & Smith have made location for No. 1 T. W. Pittman, 330 feet from south and west lines of Sec. 50, Blk. 2, H. & T. C. Survey, 3-200 foot rotary test.

Twelve miles northwest of Comanche, W. C. Estes of Brownwood and associates, have made location for No. 1 J. K. Ward, 3,300-foot rotary test, 330 feet from east and 660 from north line of Carls Hynes survey.

### F. P. Brashier Sr. Vice-President Of C. Of C.

It was also announced at the meeting that a membership drive will be conducted in the near future under the leadership of the vice-president.

R. V. Galloway, manager, reported on the recent meeting of the Highway 80 Association held in Fort Worth and the local board has taken a membership in the national organization.

Galloway also reported that the state highway department has already completed some repair work on the Caddo Road and that is now in much better condition for travel.

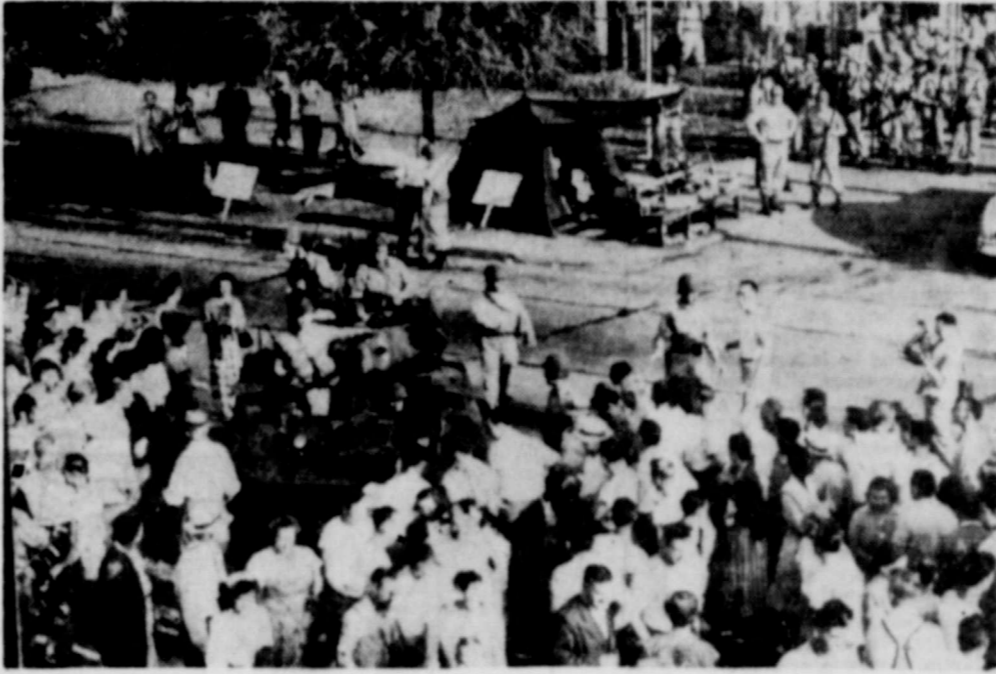
### Oil Tests Closely Watched

The Lone Star Producing Company is completing its No. 7 Calloway, a little northwest of Cisco. There are three shallow gasers and three deep wells on this lease. Two of them producing from the Caddo and the other from the Ellenburger.

The new well struck oil in the Caddo and gives every sign of being the best on the lease. Pay was found at 3,348 feet and went to 3,400 feet.

The Sam Killingsworth well on the George Fee, about half a mile southeast of the Kleiner pool, is swabbing some oil and is to be given further acid treatment. The Fee is not a Mississippi lime well

### EXTRA PRECAUTIONS TAKEN FOR PROTECTION OF SOVIETS IN BERLIN

**BERLIN, Aug. 4 (UP)**—New barbed wire road blocks and extra forces of armed guards have been thrown around Russian military headquarters and housing areas for Soviet soldiers families as a result of increased tension in Berlin, it was reported today.

Germans living in the Karlshorst area of the Russian sector, where troops and their families are housed, said that all street entrances have been blocked and guarded since Monday's attack on Soviet sector police by German civilians. One Communist-dominated police-

man was injured in the attack, launched by the Germans on suspicion that the Soviet police were trying to abduct one of their number. The Soviets said the Germans were being arrested in a black market raid.

At the same time the Russians intensified the East-West struggle in the German capital by serving demands on the Berlin city assembly which would be tantamount to complete financial and economic control of Berlin and its government.

Unofficial sources said the Russians told the city assembly that blocked funds of the Western sector would be released if authorities in western Berlin agreed to grant financial authority to the Soviet-dominated German note bank.

The Russians froze all Soviet east deutsche mark accounts of the city government and private industry in the western zones as of Aug. 1. These funds are deposited in the central bank in the Soviet sector.

### Report of Stalin Conference Kept In Close Secrecy

**WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (UP)**—The State Department today placed its official report of the recent Stalin conference under the tightest cloak of secrecy it has imposed since the end of World War II.

Informants who are usually willing to discuss international developments with reporters, adamantly refused to talk about the Moscow meeting between Premier Joseph Stalin, Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov and representatives of Great Britain, the United States and France.

### Charlie Cox Active In Oil Development

Active in oil developments in Eastland County is a veteran oil man, Charlie Cox, who was born in the county.

During the Barkburnett boom, Cox had four rotary rigs running. He operated at Pioneer during the boom of 1922 and at Byrd's Store and has been busy in this area every since. He got up the acreage on which Roy King of Wichita Falls drilled, four miles southwest of Eastland, on the Bransford. The flow of this well, in new territory, even without acid treatment has been such that considerable activity is expected to result.

A block of 700 acres was gotten up by Cox, adjoining the Bransford on the west, and a deep test will be drilled by Bob Reynolds of Wichita Falls and Veri Hughes of Abilene.

Cox's home is in Wichita Falls but he was born at Rising Star and grew up in this county. He speaks of an interesting tradition concerning Coyote Peak, five miles northwest of Rising Star. In early days so it is said, two men were hanged on the top of the mountain.

### Mrs. Anderson Of Ranger Dies; Rites Thursday

Funeral services will be conducted Thursday morning at 9:30 o'clock at Killingsworth's Chapel for Mrs. Mary Susan Anderson, 90, of Ranger, who died Tuesday afternoon at the home of her daughter, Mrs. S. R. Black, East Main Street, Ranger.

M. H. Bobo will be in charge of the services in Ranger after which the body will be taken overland to Stanton. Services will be held there at 5 o'clock at the Church of Christ with Wesley Mickey of Odessa, formerly of Ranger, officiating. Interment will be in the Stanton cemetery.

Mrs. Anderson had been a resident of Ranger for 18 years and was a member of the Church of Christ.

Besides Mrs. Black with whom she had been making her home she is survived by three other daughters, Mrs. D. A. Thomas of Toyah, Mrs. M. L. Wilson of Midland, and Mrs. Guy Holden of Monahan. Three sons, Hugh Anderson of Dallas, Dudley Anderson of Stanton and C. M. Knowton of Mertzon and two brothers, A. D. Byrd of Bangs and Ben Byrd of Brownwood, also survive. Mrs. Anderson's husband preceded her in death a number of years ago.

Palbearers will be four grandsons, Charlie Black, S. R. Black, Jr., and John Anderson and two nephews, Roy Byrd and Earl Byrd.

### SENATE WILL ABANDON ANTI-POLL TAX BILL

**WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (UP)**—Senate Republicans today abandoned efforts to pass the anti-poll tax bill, now surrendering to a determined Southern filibuster and to the top GOP desire to adjourn the special session quickly.

**WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (UP)**—Republican leaders came up today with their own anti-inflation and housing bills which they hope to push through Congress before adjourning within the next week.

The bills bear little resemblance to President Truman's sweeping recommendations for curbing high prices and relieving the housing shortage. Only two of the President's anti-inflation proposals—controls on consumer credit and on bank lending—are included in the GOP measure.

That bill was slated for approval today by the House Banking Committee. The House probably will stamp its okay on it tomorrow.

### Rebellion On High Meat Prices Is Spreading

The housewives rebellion against high meat prices was spreading across the country today.

In city after city women were organizing to force meat prices down by refusing to buy. Men folk were joining the battle by setting up their own buyers strikers or lending moral support.

In some cases, meat dealers pitched in, too.

The campaign appeared to be having some effect. Wholesale meat sales fell to the lowest point in months yesterday at New York, although prices remained steady. The Safeway Stores at San Francisco reported an "unexplainable" drop in purchases of certain high priced cuts.

The fight was waged strongest at its point of origin in Texas, one of the nation's biggest meat-producing states, where Mrs. R. D. Vaughn of Dallas first set out to show that the law of supply and demand works in two directions.

### Atty. General Rules On Voting Requirements

**AUSTIN, Aug. 4 (UP)**—A person need not be able to read, write, speak or understand English to vote in Texas, Attorney General Price Daniel ruled today.

The Attorney General said, in an opinion requested by Live Oak County Attorney R. E. Schneider, Jr., of George West, that there is no requirement in Texas laws that a person who offers to vote shall have any facility with the English language whatsoever.

The ruling added that election judges are not permitted to mark or assist in marking the ballot of a person between 21 and 60 years of age.

Thus, Daniel said, assistance cannot be given a voter, even though such person be unable to mark his ballot because of illiteracy or because such person cannot read or write the English language.

### Storm Kills 30; 100 Injured

**CARACAS, Venezuela Aug 4 (UP)**—More than 30 persons were killed and upward of 100 were injured when a tidal wave whipped up by a storm at sea hit Puerto Lagunera and neighboring coastal communities, authorities reported today. Damage was reported heavy.

### CLAIMS NAVY TRIED TO GET HIM FIRED IN WARTIME

**WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (UP)**—The accused head of a Soviet spy ring said today that the Navy tried to get him fired from the government during the war but that he was cleared through intervention by Lauchlin Currie, administrative assistant to the late President Roosevelt.

He said that after this intervention, he was cleared in a letter from the then Secretary of War, Robert P. Patterson.

The alleged spy, Russian-born Nathan Gregory Silvermaster, refused to tell the House Un-American Committee whether he is a Communist. But he denied the espionage charges as "false and fantastic" and called his accuser, Elizabeth T. Bentley, "a neurotic liar."

In refusing to say whether he is a Communist, Silvermaster said he was standing on his constitutional right not to give evidence that might incriminate him.

He did testify, however, that naval intelligence protested his war time employment by the board of economic warfare.

The Navy charged that he was a Communist. A copy of the charge was sent to him, he said. Silvermaster said the protest was "unjustified." He called it a "smear letter."

Silvermaster said he asked Currie and C. B. Baldwin former farm security administrator and now campaign manager for Henry A. Wallace, to intervene in his behalf.

"I didn't ask to be cleared," he said. "I only asked that someone with an unbiased mind look into my record."

He said he was eventually cleared by the letter from Patterson. He presented the letter to committee counsel Robert Stripling who did not immediately release it for publication.

**WASHINGTON Aug. 4 (UP)**—High Justice Department officials said today a three-year half-million-dollar investigation failed to turn up evidence that would justify prosecution of the Communist espionage case now unfolding before Congressional committees.

These officials made their comments in response to a question of what the Justice department has been doing about the accusations voiced by ex-Communist Elizabeth T. Bentley and Whittaker Chambers. Both told their stories to the FBI long before they testified at Congressional hearings.

### Rangers Lose In Cisco Tournament

The Rangers long line of victories in softball was broken Tuesday night when in the second game of the Cisco tournament they were defeated by Boyd Construction Company of Cisco.

Boyd scored four points to the Rangers' five score with Littlefield allowing five hits and the Rangers scoring four errors to Heathington's two hits allowed and three errors made by Boyd.

D. C. Arterburn scored one of the Rangers' hits while Willard Seymour scored the other. A misunderstanding over the type of ball used was brought to head and after that the Rangers are reported to have held Boyd's team to only one hit.

The four umpires that officiated at the game were satisfactory to both teams.

## U. S. Doctors Fight Against Tropical Disease

CLEVELAND (UP)—Search for a drug to fight the dreaded tropical disease schistosomiasis is going forward at Western Reserve University medical school here.

The world-wide case toll of the disease now numbers more than 200,000,000, about one out of every 11 persons, school officials said.

Supporting the research with a \$30,150 grant is the U. S. Public Health Service.

A weapon to combat schistosomiasis may be found through use of 400 back Puerto Rican snails, Drs. Ernest Bueding and Lawrence Peters, leaders of the research, said.

They said a new approach is being made to the disease. They are seeking a drug to prevent the parasite from using food essential to its survival.

Snails are the key to mass infection of human beings with schistosomiasis, since the disease can't spread from man to man. A fast-swimming parasite is bred by the snails that finds its way into the water supply.

The parasite then wriggles into the victim's blood stream after infected water is used and develops into a fat worm whose eggs injure either the intestines, bladder or the liver.

The parasitic disease is not a problem in the United States itself, Drs. Bueding and Peters said. But they added, the federal health agency became interested in it in Egypt, China, Japan, the Philippines and Central America.

### Goodbye Car

ROCHESTER, N. H. (UP)—Fined \$73 in municipal court for driving an unregistered automobile, Raymond Beaulieu sold his car to raise money to pay the fine.
