Truman Signs Republican Housing Bill

SAYS BILL INADEQUATE BUT WILL HELP SOME

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10, (UP) — President Truman today signed the Republican-sponsored housing bill but said "it falls far short" of what should have been enacted. "The Congress in enacting this bill has deliberately neglected those large groups of our people most in need of adequate housing — the people who are forced to live in disgraceful urban and rural slums," Mr. Truman said. The President disclosed his action on what he termed

Eastland County Buys \$275,080 Worth Of Bonds

Total sales of U. S. Savings Bonds in Eastland County during the Security Loan Campaign were \$275,080.00 according to Cyrus B. Frost, County Savings Bonds Chairman. He received state figures today from state savings bonds headquarters in Dallas.

The county's quota was \$275,000. The Security Loan Campaign was launched on April 15 and continued through June 30, with sales through July 15 being credited to county quotas. Of the county's total sales, Series E Bonds accounted for \$220,469.00.

Final sales for the state as a whole were: Series E, \$41,404,000; Series F and G, \$24,462,000; total, all series, \$65,866,000. Total sales for the nation were \$2,796,183,000.

Interest On Securities Uped To Fight Prices

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10, (UP) — The administration, rebuffed by Congress in its bid for strong anti-inflation laws, tried a new approach today to the problem of high prices.

Secretary of Treasury John W. Snyder announced that the interest rate on short-term government securities has been raised by 1/8 or one per cent.

He said this should help fight inflation by encouraging the general public to put more ready cash into government securities. In this way, he said, money would be diverted from the "usual spending stream."

Candidates Get Ready For Stump

By United Press President Truman and GOP nominee Thomas E. Dewey, were mapping the final details of their campaign strategy today, but both were mum on just when and where they will take the stump.

White House advisers were said to be urging Mr. Truman to accept a bid to address a Labor Day gathering in Detroit. They feel he should renew his attack on the Republican Congress while the record of the special session is still fresh in the voters' minds.

The President's special bullet-proof railroad car is being overhauled at the Navy gun factory in Washington, presumably in preparation for the campaign trip. Mr. Truman's tentative itinerary calls for him to visit New England, parts of the South and Midwest and possibly the West coast again.

21 Special Stamps Being Issued By U. S. In Current Six Months

WASHINGTON (UP) — Twenty-one new commemorative postage stamps are being issued within the current six months by the Post Office Department.

Robert Fellers, head of the department's stamp division, said the new stamps have been authorized by Congress and the designs have been completed.

"Though this is an unusually large number, we'll get them out," he said.

The stamps commemorated modern celebrities, historical figures and all sorts of anniversaries.

They include a "Century of Friendship" stamp, between the United States and Canada, issued at Niagara Falls on Aug. 2; a William Allen White stamp, issued at Emporia, Kans., July 31, and a golden anniversary stamp to celebrate the joining of the five boroughs into the city of New York on July 31.

At Seneca Falls, N.Y., a commemorative stamp celebrating the "progress of women" has just been issued in honor of the first woman's rights convention held in 1848. What Fellers termed "the most important" stamp of the group will be a Francis Scott Key stamp to be placed on sale at Frederick, Md., on Aug. 9.

All the commemorative stamps are of large size, 6.84 by 1.14 inches, Fellers said.

The initial printing is about 100,000,000 and unless the stamp is especially popular, no new issues are printed. Fellers said it was "department policy" that once a stamp has been removed from sale no reprints were made.

The commemorative differs from the regular stamp in several ways. The regular stamp is smaller in size, and reprints are being made continually. He said they are kept on sale for 10 or 12 years. Only a change in postal rates causes a new regular stamp to be issued.

"But regular stamps are printed all the time," Fellers said. "Right now the department is printing 1 1/2-cent stamps for Christmas."

Fellers said the cost of issuing a stamp averages 18 to 20 cents per 1,000, "which includes all costs of production—designing, paper and printing."

The country's "boss philatelists" said the stamp hobbyists had their biggest year in 1947. The post office sold approximately \$2,000,000 worth of stamps to collectors.

"There has been a steady increase in first day covers and sale of commemoratives," Fellers added.

He said stamp collecting had taken an upturn when Franklin D. Roosevelt became president in 1932 and has been on the increase ever since.

Chicago Devises System To Meet Emergencies

CHICAGO (UP)—A systematized plan for calling all the aid needed to meet any emergency from an unruly citizen to an atomic explosion has been devised by Chicago police.

The plan, based on a similar system long used by the city's fire department, contains five numbered designations. If an officer calls for "plan one" he may expect immediate assistance from three squad cars and a patrol wagon.

When "plan five" is flashed over the radio, 24 squads from adjoining districts go to the scene and other cars from outlying districts move up to fill the gaps.

Ex-Spy Claims She Had Hint About Oak Ridge

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10 (UP) — Elizabeth T. Bentley, self-confessed ex-Soviet spy, said today that in October, 1944, Duncan Lee, an OSS official, told her there was something "super-secret" at Oak Ridge, Tenn.—site of a major atomic energy plant.

But she added that Lee was unaware of what was going on at Oak Ridge. The Tennessee plant where uranium 235, an atomic bomb explosive, is separated from non-explosive kinds of uranium.

"He told me that he had heard that there was something secret going on at that location," Miss Bentley said. "He said it must be super secret because it was so highly guarded."

Miss Bentley followed Lee before the House Un-American activities committee after he had denied under oath her previous charge that he gave her wartime secrets for Russia.

Lee was a lieutenant colonel in the super secret OSS. He said he never was a Communist and never gave Miss Bentley any confidential information.

Meat Strikes Are Spreading

By United Press New meat strikes were declared in cities throughout the country today as housewives spearheaded their fight against the high cost of living with a drive on butchers' prices.

One of the latest groups to join the battle was the New York Tenant Councils on rent and housing with 150,000 members in the metropolitan area. The councils said their members had agreed to stop buying meat for the remainder of the week.

Members of the Cincinnati Consumer Conference were calling every housewife in the city, asking them to stop buying meat for a 10-day period beginning today.

Mrs. Dennis E. Jackson, conference president, said a similar price strike last year didn't work out very well but that was "because we advocated buying cheap cuts instead of no meat at all."

In Texas, where women in 19 cities were "on strike," Dallas housewives and butchers were carrying on a "war of propaganda." The strike leaders said people were buying meat. Some butchers said they were selling more than ever.

Over 200 entries have been received in the Fifth Annual Show and Sale of the West-Cross Timbers Sheep and Goat Raisers Association to be held in Ranger on Aug. 20-21, according to H. C. Wilkinson, the secretary.

Such outstanding breeders as Marvin Skaggs of Junction; W. S. Orr of Rock Springs; Robert Kirby of Goldthwaite; Owen Bragg of Talpa; Leroy Nichols of Leaky; Hamilton Choate of Oney; Joe Le May of Valera; and T. R. Hinton of Keller, and many others have entered animals. Some of the best sheep and goats in the State will be shown and sold during this sale.

A feature of the show and sale will be a Border Collie sheep dog exhibition and jackpot goat roping contest which will be held on the night of Aug. 20. Six of the outstanding sheep dogs of Texas will take part, including two imported dogs from Scotland, owned by Louis Ragland of Junction.

Joe Lemay of Valera and Guy Powell of Kerrville will also have their dogs perform.

Pete Gulley of Uvalde will judge the goats and act as auctioneer, and Guy Powell of Kerrville, will judge the sheep. Over \$300 in prizes will be awarded in the various classes.

Expect Stalin's Approval On Final Agreement

MOSCOW, Aug. 10 (UP)— Generalissimo Josef Stalin is expected to give personal approval to any final agreement on Germany after major details are worked out between the western envoys and Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov, it was reported today.

Observers believed that U. S. Ambassador Walter Bedell Smith and his Anglo-French colleagues will hold another conference with Stalin after their current series of negotiations with Molotov is completed.

Results of last night's three-hour meeting, the third of the series remained as secret as the first meeting with Stalin and Molotov 10 days ago and the second meeting with Molotov late last week.

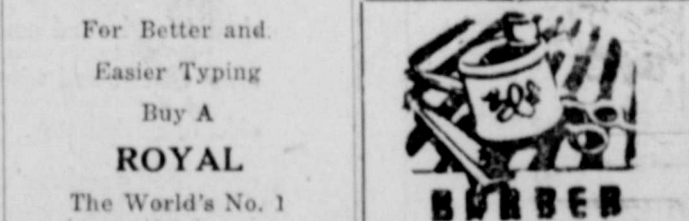

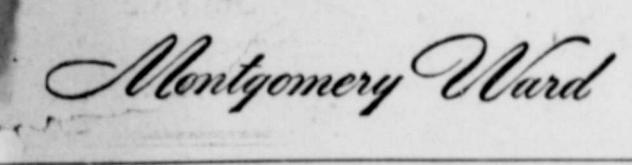

Kansas Wheat Puzzles Even Farmers

NESS CITY, Kan. (UP)—The amazing Kansas wheat crop is mostly out of the fields now. Side-light stories of the crop which came from the dust of last fall and winter are popping up much as did the wheat itself when the rains came.

They are stories both of money in the bank and of heartbreak in misjudging the capacity of wheat to bounce back.

Take the case of Ted Groendycke of Medicine Lodge, who owns considerable land in Ness County. He prepared 400 acres for seeding last fall. It was dug. So he never planted his 400 acres. In May he returned to look at the land.

A wheat crop was growing on it, volunteer wheat. The crop he never planted made him \$11,000.

On the other hand, there was the \$30,000 mistake made by Frank, Mike and Bill Polcyn of near Russell. They dusted in 600 acres of wheat last fall. Early in the spring they decided it was a colossal bust. They plowed up the wheat while their neighbors left theirs in the dry ground and prayed.

The neighbors got wheat, 20 to

23 bushels to the acre. The Polcyn brothers figured their hasty plowing cost them \$30,000 worth of wheat.

Australians On Trail Of New Oil Supply

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—Extensive drilling for oil in the Kimberly district of Western Australia will start soon, according to a broadcast by Radio Australia.

Government geologists have almost completed surveying the area and making tests near rock formations which indicate likely deposits.

Private oil concerns are reported planning to sink many more wells within the next year. The exhaustive search for oil has been carried out on a joint co-operative basis by government and industry.

In Queensland, the Shell Co. has localized its search in the southern part of the state, where all experimental drillings have been completed. The company also plans to produce a lin Dutch New Guinea next year.

Spade the ground at least 6 inches deep, then work an addition at 2 pounds of Velvetgreen per 100 square feet into the top 2 inches while preparing the seed bed. Wet down thoroughly, let the ground stand 24 hours, then sow a good quality rye seed at the rate of 10 pounds per 1,000 square feet. Water thoroughly, and daily thereafter until seed has germinated.
