Friona man dies in one-vehicle rollover

A Friona man was killed early Saturday northwest of Dimmitt when the truck he was driving ran off the road, according Department of Public Safety Officers at the scene, Ron Morgan and John Piper.

Trent Shelton, 20, was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Marshall

Shelton was northbound on FM 1057 3.7 miles north of Tam Anne at about 7:30 a.m. Saturday when he lost control of his 1980 Ford pickup coming off of an S-curve, Morgan said. Shelton reportedly went off the road on the curve, corrected and came back across the road, corrected again and the pickup rolled 1 1/2

Shelton was thrown from the pickup as it rolled and was then pinned under the wreckage, according to Morgan. He was not wearing a seatbelt.

Funeral services for Trent Shelton were held Monday at 3 p.m. at the First United Methodist Church of Friona with Rev. Archie Echols

Burial was in the Friona Cemetery under the direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home in

Shelton was born in Lubbock and was a 1985 graduate of Friona High School.

He was a sophomore at Texas Tech University, a member of First United Methodist Church and a member of Friona Future Farmers of

Shelton's father is the Friona Elementary School Principal.

Survivors include his parents, Jerry and Beth Shelton of Friona; two sisters, Trista Shelton and Tara Shelton, both of Friona; one brother, Tate, of Friona; his grandmother, Ione Deaton of Friona; his great-grandmother, Emily Pickens of Spur, and his uncle, Donald Shelton of Dimmitt.

The family requests memorials be made to the Trent Shelton Scholarship Fund at the Friona State Bank.

The total Motor Vehicle Sales Tax received for 1986 was \$254,-000. The 1986 License Fees totaled \$437,000. The \$5 County Tax Fee amounted to \$40,500. The Beer and Liquor License netted the County over \$2,600. There are approximately 4,300 registered voters in Castro County which includes 239 new voters and 192 cancelled vo-

Rhynes announces bid for sheriff's seat


County Sheriff Lonny Rhynes has announced his intention to seek re - election to another four - year term.

Now you know what it's like to set out your Christmas decorations in April!

I doubt that any university in the country has developed as memorable a Christmas tradition as Texas Tech has.

We've been on hand several times for the Carol of Lights-a public gathering in the science quadrangle for Christmas carols led by the combined choirs and orchestra, the turning on of all the holiday lights on the campus buildings at the same time, and Christmas concerts by all the university choirs in the University Center's Hemmle Auditorium.

This year we attended the first night's performance of the annual Madrigal Dinner. The university's Madrigal Singers (12 of them, in medieval English costumes) are accompanied by musicians playing period instruments (harpsichord, recorders, fanfare trumpets and brass). They host the crowd at a lavish Christmas banquet of "brawne of boore" (roast pork), wassail (hot spiced apple cider) and plum pudding. Large coat-of-arms banners hang from the ceiling of the Great Ballroom in the University Center, and the young musicians fill the ballroom with Madrigal music (early English folk music) and traditional carols. While the crowd enjoys the excellent dinner, young magicians, jugglers and caroling groups wander among the

Sesco brings sesame to area

There was a new crop making an appearance in the county last summer — its first in about 20 years.

Sesame seeds were grown by some local farmers in an attempt by Sesco of Yuma, Ariz. to make sesame a viable crop option for this

Locally grown sesame crops were handles by Bruegel and Sons Elevators.

Sesame is planted in mid-June and reaches maturity in about 100 -120 days, with harvest starting in late September or early October.

Sesame is a food crop used primarily for oil extraction. It is believed to have some value as a soil purifier.

Yields usually average 500 to 2500 lbs. per acre, similar to sunflower yields, and the crop price this year was 15 cents per pound.

One of the positive aspects of the crop is low maintanence. Sesame can be irrigated, though it doesn't require irrigation. The crop only has to be plowed one time and it does not require fertilizer. There are no bugs to spray for and it needs very little herbicide, only a small amount of Treflan early in the growing season.

Sesame is highly susceptible to all herbicides, taking care of the volunteer problem the next year.

Sesame is a self-defoliating crop. The leaves turn down and change to a golden color upon maturity. The mature seed pod is about 1 1/2 inches long with four rows of seeds in each pod.

The crop involves a two-part swath and wind row the plants laying them in piles in the field to dry. It takes 10 - 14 days for the seeds to reach the desired moisture

level of 6 %.

Then, the piles are harvested by a combine with a special pickup attachment.

The Gilbreath brothers, Coby, Matt and Hal, took a chance on a sesame crop on their land northwest of Sunnyside in an attempt to recoup some losses on a cotton crop which had fallen prey to hail and heavy rains last spring.

There were some problems with the crop, due primarily to weather patterns and freeze patterns in the area, according to Coby Gilbreath.

Varieties of sesame better suited to this area need to be developed in order for the crop to be a success, Gilbreath said.

The Gilbreaths had some problems with the crop early-on in that they were told to plant without using press wheels and the first patch they planted tended to dry

Then they let the planter down a little deeper and got a better stand.

There were also problems with the seeds shattering at harvest. "It is vital that all the plants emerge at the same time to insure

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

CRPGRASS SELECTIONS

By Drs. Bill E. Dahl and John R. Hunter, Department of Range and Wildlife at Texas Tech University.

Finding one plant that fits all the objectives of a land manager in a seeding program generally is not possible. They usually desire that the chosen species: grow well on a variety of soils: survive during extremely cold winters: live indefinitely under a variety of climate and management situations: tolerate drought: control erosion; be of high quality for grazing while growing and while dormant; produce at a high level; provide food and cover for wildlife; establish easily; and be easy to plant. Of the native species commercially available, sideoats grama fits these requirements better than any other. It survives and produces well on soils from gravels to clay loams and is winter hardy. Some accessions have rhizomes so they tend to fill in bare areas for excellent erosion control. It tolerates close grazing and extended dry periods. It is a preferred species during summer and because of its short stems is next to blue grama and buffalograss in usefulness for dormant winter forage. It is the easiest of the chaffy seeds to plant, and stands are more easily established than other warm season native species. Sideoats grama responds well to fertilizer and makes good cover for wildlife. Its only minor detractions are that its seed is little used by upland game birds for food and it has not withstood extreme drought on the heavy clay soils. But then neither have other well adapted natives. Thus, it should receive high priority in any CRP mix planted in the Texas High Plains. Haskell, Vaughn, El Reno, Niner, and Premier are commercially available varieties. Some are sod forming and some bunch grasses. Check with your local seed dealer and Soil Conservation Service Technician for the appropriate one to use in your situation.

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

The short audit period was needed to cover a shift in the fiscal year for the city.

Conders said that when the city consulted the firm for aid in shifting the fiscal year, recommendations for changes were made between the two reporting periods. He noted that the five - month audit already reflected improvements in the city's accounting procedures.

Killough told the aldermen that the Texas Water Commission is working toward issuing a waste disposal permit to the city that would allow the city to abandon the wastewater clarifier and use oxidation ponds, sludge drying beds and an oxidation ditch, along with a playa basin used as storage for evaporation and irrigation.

The current limit of 30 mg per liter of Biological Oxygen Demand (BOD) will be increased to 100 mg per liter, with samples being taken from the discharge into the playa lake, rather than from the clarifier, as now required. Also, samples will only be taken once a month, instead of the current weekly.

Killough said the city will have to maintain the two rotors in the oxidation ponds, although they will only be used occasionally. He also noted that the permit, if approved, will be for a 10-year period, unless any changes occur.

Notice concerning the changes in the wastewater treatment will be published in the newspaper, with a 30-day period set aside for public comment. If any requests are received for a public hearing on the matter, a hearing will be set. After the hearing or after the 30-day period passes with no requests for a hearing, the proposed permit will go before the water commission for
