

Marshall Sounds Solemn Warning At UN Opening

United Press Staff Correspondent PARIS, Sept. 23 (UP)-Sec retary of State George C. Marshall pledged the United States to day to do everything possible to end the international tension, but he warned Russia that it would be a "tragic error" to mistake the patience of others for weakness.

Speaking at the start of debate n the United Nations General Assembly Marshall served solemn otice that present generation is threatened with another war.

He vowed that the United States would refuse to compromise on essential principles, nor would the Americans barter away the rights and freedoms of other peoples.

In an unmistakeable reference to the Soviet bloc, Marshall criticized nations which deliberately seal off their people from the rest of the world. Pointedly he added: "It would be a tragic error if,

because of misunderstanding, the patience of others should be mistaken for weakness." But Marshall's speech setting the tone of American policy at the

been disclosed heretofore.
In Berlin itself, German police removed all newspapers and per-iodicals licensed by the Western powers from news stands in the soviet sector in systematic raids The raids marked the first offical action to eliminate such pub-

ications from the Soviet sector. Earlier it was revealed from Amman that an Israeli fighter plane shot down an Arab transport plane on Trans-Jordan soil today, causing the deaths of two British newspapermen and one Arab passenger.

The Arab reports said the Jewish fighter plane, said to have been of the Russian Yak type, intercepted the Arab transport cepted the Arab transport plane near the Palestine-Syrian border. followed it for several miles over Trans-Jordan territory, and chot it down in flames.
