Washington, I was particularly impressed by the Class III, and IV airports at Baker and La Grande, both towns somewhat smaller than Eastland and neither of which had the benefit of having taken over former army air fields. Empiric is not presently landing at Pullman since the airport there is being paved with nine inch thick Jayer of back top. I looked up a member of the airport board and asked him how this was being done—how had these small towns done the line managed airports which would meet the year around requirements of airline operation? He told me it was being done through federal aid funds when such are available. Pullman, a town not as large as Eastland, he said, raised the matching funds by subscription, the contributions of air-minded towns, people and farmers who see future benefits in airport improvement and in having regular airline service linking eastern Washington's commercial center, Spokane, directly to the major lines running from Boise into the southwest and to the east. Just how much good can be done in the raising of funds by subscription is shown by the fact that Pullman is spending nearly two hundred thousand dollars on their airport. It wasn't any overnight project—an active airport board has been working and looking for the ways and means for

From the number of calls I have received at the Eastland Airport this past spring and summer requesting information on stopping points and time schedules of Pioneer Airlines, there is a considerable number of folks around who would like to be able to travel from Eastland by air to any point in the United States served by airline service. For lack of it I spent nine hours getting from Eastland to Amarillo. It took less than nine hours to go from Amarillo to Lewiston, Idaho, some thirty miles south of Pullman, Washington.

## Couple Held For Kidnapping

HOUSTON, Tex. Sept. 24 (UP)—A Portsmouth, N. H., couple was held here today on a kidnapping charge, but tearfully admitted they would rather "spend the rest of our lives in jail" than give up 9-year-old Catherine Elizabeth Pendercast.

The child was allegedly brought south by her uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Michael Rice Titus,

after lengthy litigation in New Hampshire courts that left Catherine Elizabeth's status unsettled.

It all started back in 1941, the 41-year-old Mrs. Titus told detectives.

The child's parents brought her to the couple to "leave her for the winter." But they did not return, Mrs. Titus claimed.

"We grew to love her and wanted to keep her," she added, "and then in 1947, my brother came and asked us to pack her clothes. He said he'd return for her the next day."

That was when the court battle started, Mrs. Titus said. "We just couldn't give her up."

After losing a lower court decision, the Tituses appealed to the supreme court of New Hampshire, but were advised that "rulings in that court always resulted in decisions in favor of the parents," the couple told officers.

"We told a lawyer we'd run away with her rather than give her up... and he said the only charge we could face would be attempt of court," Titus said.

Detectives made the arrest here yesterday after a wire from Sheriff Sims Frink in Portsmouth stating that the Tituses were wanted for kidnapping.

Questioned in jail here, they said they would not willingly return to Portsmouth.

## Cafe Closed For Serving Horse Meat

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. Sept. 24 (UP)—City Health Officer Austin E. Hill revealed today that one cafe had been closed for serving horse meat but said that a preliminary investigation by the health department disclosed no legitimate packers were involved.

The Bexar County grand jury began an investigation yesterday of reports that horse meat was being served in some San Antonio cafes.

Dr. A. E. Wharton, chief veterinarian for the city health department, said that horsemeat had been sold to at least one downtown cafe.

Dr. Hill said that only one cafe had been closed, but that "60 to 100" tests still were in the laboratory stage.

Chairman Homer Ferguson, R., Mich. of the Senate investigating committee accused the attorney general of trying "to excuse the inefficiencies and delays in the operation of the loyalty program."

Rep. F. Edward Hebert, D., La., a member of the House un-American activities committee, said Clark is "derelict in his duty" if he has all the espionage data uncovered by House investigators and still does not prosecute.

In another skirmish of his running battle with Clark Ferguson criticized the attorney general for his recent statement on an interim report of the senate committee. Clark had said the report contained "incorrect and misleading statements" about the loyalty program.
