ARTERBURN LEADS RANGERS TO SMASHING WIN OVER T. M. C.

Coach Boone Yarbrough told his Rangers to cut the string on their bag of tricks and give the hometown fans a show. And obedient Ranger Junior College used practically every caper known to gridiron followers to steamroller an outclassed Texas Military Academy, 45-0 last night at the high school field.

It was quarterback Junior Arterburn who put on a dazzling first period, one-man show to put the Bulldogs on the run and keep them there. The man who is touted to be primarily a passer surprised even his team-mates with long scoring dashes. His premier effort of the evening was a 30-yard touchdown gallop with a Bulldog punt.

Junior tossed but five times throughout the game and it must have been one of his off nights for his did miss one. Three of the five heaves went for touchdowns while understudy Jake Wright tossed one completion in two attempts.

The Bulldogs from Terrill kept sending in their shock troops but the Rangers had too many guns and shot them too often. The Military lads never threatened the Ranger double stripe although they recovered a fumble deep in Ranger territory in the first half.

The Rangers took Donald Davis' opening kick-off back to the 47 and five plays later had their first tally. After Claude Neeley and Jimmy Crawley ground out a first down in two cracks the locals launched their scoring thrust.

Just as soon as you could say Regulation W it was a third down when Arterburn took the snap-back, faded off to Crawley and faded back. He threw diagonally to Ben Blitch on the 10 and big Ben trotted over untouched. Recovering his wind, Ben booted a perfect placement to make it 7-0.

But it was all Junior's show for the next six-point after a minute later. The man-under teck Cliff Williams punt on the 10, made as if to hand off to Neeley running the opposite way and then set sail down the right sidelines. After Johnny McClendon blatted out a Bulldog defender on the 20 it was a lovely 90-yard jaunt in complete solitude. Blitch was wide with his conversion attempt leaving the count 15-0.

Stopping the Bulldogs without trouble, Ranger clicked off their third score moments later. From the T.M.C. 26 that fowlie Arterburn pulled off a bootleg play, laying the ball on his hip and moving down to the one where he was pulled down. Crawley smashed over on the first try and after Blitch's conversion it was 20-0.

It was defensive football for the remainder of the half with some lengthy Bulldog punts throtling the home attack.

Then early in third stanza Junior took some of the wrappings off that arm and the result was another touchdown. A pair of chucks to Blitch and Howard Frazier moved the ball to the Bulldogs 42. With Claude Neely lying in sleeper position on the opposite side of the field, the Rangers lined up without a huddle sending the cadets in a terrible

state of confusion. Junior threw without hesitation and there was Neely looking like he was in another ball game. Claude walked over for a 41-yard scoring maneuver and this time Blitch was successful giving Ranger 27 points.

The boys ceased scoring activities with three rapid fire tumbles in the final session. With Wright handling the T the Rangers drove 46 yards with Wright running over from the seven for the score.

The Rangers increased the count to 39-0 seconds later when reserve center Joe Neel partially blocked Perry's punt and Bill Spivey scooped it up on the 36, running through half the cadets for the touchdown.

After Candy Walker recovered the kickoff fumble on the T.M.C. 20, Arterburn threw his last pass and of course it was a good one. Rookie back Frankie Ford gathered it in deep in the end zone and that wrapped up the jail game, 45-0.

The Tulsa Oilers squared the final round of the Texas Shaggy playoff series today and if they can keep up the heavy stick work they displayed against Fort Worth Cat hursers last night, it could be a very short series.

The Oilers slaughtered starter Willard Ramsdell and reliefs George Brown, Gene Costello and George Dockins for 21 hits—and those blows augmented by five Fort Worth errors and 10 walks brought an 18-7 victory.

The clubs play the third game of the series to determine who will represent the league in the Dixie Series at Tulsa tonight with Dwan Sloat scheduled to hurl for the Cats against Everett Lively.

The Cat pitchers silenced the big bat of Tommy Tatum, the league's leading hitter, but the Oilers didn't need any of Tatum's help.

They broke in front with three runs in the opening inning on Billy Capps' three-run homer, picked up five more runs in the second and another in the third before the Cats could muster their first runs. Oiler hurler Harry Perkowski pitched seven innings for the victors and was nicked for all seven of the Cats' runs, but was never in serious danger.

As the Cats tried to catch up with four more runs in the sixth the Oilers went on two more aprees for four runs in the seventh and three in the eighth.

BULLDOGS READY TO FACE ALBANY IN BATTLE OF UNDEFEATED TEAMS

In what Coach Stubby Warden considers the "make or break" game of the infant season, the Ranger Bulldogs buck up against the undefeated Albany Lions tonight at 8 P. M. at the high school field.

Warden and his Bulldogs managed to sneak a look at Albany the other night over in Eastland and perhaps they saw a trifle too much. The big, powerful Lions punished Eastland to the tune of 26-0 and appeared to be pulling their punches.

Strongest one-two wallop on the Albany club are a pair of high stepping backs who re-

fuse to be halted once on the loose. The wheelhorse of the Lions is A. V. Jones a 170-pound halfback of the rough and tough school who tore off three touchdowns against the Mavericks. Just a trifle behind in running efficiency is 180-pound Ronnie Miller who does most of the passing from his quarterback role.

But the Bulldogs have some backfield men who can do tricks with the ball on their own roster. R. C. Smith grows more deceptive each day in his man-under spot and is a top hand at the short passing game.

For running chores Warden has hard-working Kenneth Williams who was unstoppable in scrimmage sessions and who sprang loose for a 25-yard touchdown in the Olney contest. Rounding out the backfield will be the Comacho boys, Raymond and Jimmy. Raymond is the power boy who's good for three or four yards at a crack while tiny Jimmy is the scooter type, doubling in as an extra point kicker. And a successful one.

Although the Lions are unscored upon their forward wall looked anything but impregnable in the Eastland game. Those midget Maverick backs ripped through time and time again.

The Lions feature a troublesome shift which tends to throw the opposition off-side. They line up in a T, then suddenly shift into a double wing formation. But the fooler is that many times they distort the shift and run off the T-formation. Warden has been drilling his defensive line tediously to combat this move.

The Bulldog forward wall will see one change with 130-pound Jimmy Patterson moving into the left guard spot replacing Charles Wheat. On the opposite guard will be Dean Elder weighing in at 148.

The remainder of the line will see Keith Mannerlyn and Jimmy Lee at the wing spots, E. P. Simpson at center and Frog Langley and big Marvin Wilson at tackles.

Coach Elwood Turner will probably start Cloyd Knight and Ronnie Macon in the backfield with Jones and Miller. One switch in the forward wall will find David McGaughey taking over for Bud Mitchell at the right end spot. Turner's line will be bolstered by two massive tackles—210-pound Bill Webb and 155-pound David Lewis.

About the only thing that Warden is downhearted about is the fact that his Bulldogs haven't had a tough game under their belts for two weeks. The locals have been idle since the Olney fray. Past records bring out that it usually isn't a winning policy to face a powerful opponent after an open date.

ALCOA Charges Politics In Suit
PITTSBURGH, Sept. 24 (UP)—Roy A. Hunt, president of the Aluminum Company of America, today accused the Department of Justice of playing "pure election year politics" in filing a monopoly suit against Alcoa.
Hunt said that Alcoa has been involved in anti-trust litigation for 11 years and that the Justice Department has "maneuvered" to avoid a trial to wait until the "eve of elections to revive and renew these old monopoly charges."
Hunt said Alcoa filed a petition 18 months ago seeking to wind up the anti-trust suit. A trial date was set by agreement with the Department of Justice over a year ago, Hunt said.

TEMPLE, Tex., Sept. 24, (UP)—The herd belonging to Dr. Paul M. Bassell of this city dominated all classes of the Hereford breeding cattle show at the Central Texas Fair yesterday. Bassell showed both the grand champion cow and bull in the Hereford show.

Aberdeen Angus breeding cattle will be judged today. The fair is to continue through Saturday.

WACO, Tex., Sept. 24, (UP)—Funeral services were held today for Jim E. Green, 61, of McGregor, who died yesterday of injuries received when struck by a car Wednesday night.

He was McLennan County's 24th traffic victim of the year.

WACO, Tex., Sept. 24 (UP)—The state was expected to present closing arguments today in the murder trial of former Constable A. L. Trollinger.

Trollinger, charged in the fatal shooting of Francis Wetzel last May 22, has claimed self defense.

HOUSTON, Texas, Sept. 24, (UP)—City Councilman Clyde Fitzgerald, candidate for mayor, declared open war today on Houston health hazards after blaming Mayor Oscar Holcombe for "generally neglecting" his job.

In a radio address last night Fitzgerald charged that while Holcombe "made frequent trips to California" health hazards in the city had been piling up.

The councilman claimed he would alleviate that situation by summoning all the agencies at his command if voters elect him mayor Oct. 16.

"I will declare an emergency pertaining to health hazards," said Fitzgerald, "and call a special city council session, inviting our Harris County Representatives and Senator, certain health authorities and engineers and the mayor's of adjoining towns."

Assassination Plot Broken Up In Argentina

BUENOS AIRES, Sept. 24 (UP)—Argentine police arrested 13 persons early today on charges of plotting to assassinate President Juan D. Peron in a conspiracy which government officials said was directed by a former United States embassy official, John F. Griffiths.

Police said Senora Eva Duarte Peron, Argentina's first lady, and several cabinet ministers also were slated for assassination. They reported finding a number of documents relating to the alleged plot.

Among those arrested were Cipriano Reyes, former deputy in the National Assembly and a well-known labor leader, two naval chaplains and one woman.

Police swooped down on a fashionable apartment building in the Avenida Quinana this morning, officials said, and arrested the 13 alleged conspirators.

They are identified as: Reyes, Senora Spangenberg De Garcia Velloso, Luis Garcia Velloso, Naval Chaplain Horacio Moreno, Father Carlos Grande, Na-

val Chaplain Victor Farias, Ernesto Vila, Hector Ernesto Gomez, Avila Leon, Emilio Frank, Simon Walter, Manuel Allende and Hector Reyes.

All those detained were taken to the heavily-guarded national penitentiary, police said.

Griffiths, former cultural attaché during the tenure of Ambassador Spruille Braden, was ordered expelled from Argentina last spring for associating with foes of the government.

The charge against Griffiths and the other alleged conspirators was made at an early morning press conference by the chief inspector of the federal police, Gen. Arturo Bertollo.

Nurse, Embalmer Named To Boards

AUSTIN, Tex., Sept. 24 (UP)—Two appointments to the State Board of Nurse Examiners and the State Board of Embalming have been announced by Governor Beauford Jester.

Sister Catherine Elizabeth was named to the State Board of Nurse Examiners where she will fill the unexpired term of sister Antonio O'Donoghue, who resigned.

Sister Elizabeth is now education director of St. Joseph's Hospital School of Nursing at

Fort Worth.

Thomas Schier, president of a Houston firm of funeral directors, was named to the State Embalming Board. He fills the unexpired term of the late George W. Loudermilk of Dallas.
