United Press Staff Correspondent PARIS, Ot. 4, (UP) - Russia theatened to boycott the United Nations Security Council on the Berlin question today, but United States delegate calmly replied that the western powers would press their charges that Russian actions threaten the peace anyway.

Soviet Delegate Andrei Vishinsky set the stage for a Russian boycott - possibly even another dramatic walkout such as that of 1946 over the Iranan issue-in a table pounding, arm-waving speech in which he asserted the Security Council has no right to intervene.

American delegate Philip Jessup quietly repied that: "The Soviet government still refused to list the block-
