### Three New Wells Being Started In Eastland County

Three new wells are being started in the northern part of Eastland county by the Lone Star Producing Company, which maintains its district headquarters in Eastland.

Two of the wells could have considerable significance. One is a mile northeast of present production in the Kleiner pool and on the Kleiner "B" lease section 75, center of northwest quarter, H. & T.C. survey.

Another is between the Kleiner pool and the farthestmost well to the east, the Killingsworth on the Fee, completed as a moderate producer some weeks ago. The Lone Star's new location is its Fee No. 4, there having been three Lake sand producers drilled on the tract years ago. The Mississippi lime, from which the Kleiner pool produces, will be the goal of the No. 4 Fee.

In the Kleiner pool, Lone Star is drilling the Kincade A-5, one location due east of the No. 4. Kleiner of the Hickok, which gauged 409 barrels through half-inch choke.

Lone Star has just completed a big gasser in the Santa Anna gas field in Coleman County—No. 3 H. O. Norris, 15,000,000 feet a day total depth 2,148 feet.

### Troop Carrier Wing Ordered To Europe Duty

AUSTIN, Tex., Oct. 4 (UP)—The 313th Troop Carrier Wing, heavy, had orders today to move to Europe for permanent assignment.

The move will take place within 30 days, according to Col. R. Baez, commanding officer. The wing will supply the maintenance service for aircraft of the Berlin airlift.

Bergstrom Field at Austin has been the permanent duty station of the wing. The number of men involved in the transfer was not disclosed.

### Nation Observes Fire Prevention Week Oct. 3-10

Fire Chief Charlie Isabell today called the attention of Ranger to the fact that this is Fire Prevention Week and urged that residents observe the week with every precaution to prevent fires.

He urged precaution in burning trash and pointed out that a national survey shows that 38 per cent of the fires in this country are in homes.

"Continued precaution will have to be exercised," Chief Isabell said, "if we're to cut the annual loss to the country which is estimated at \$709,839,000. "Aside from this loss, 10,000 lives are claimed by fire annually.

He pointed out that while Ranger has been relatively free of major fires, that the conditions are ripe for them now because of the extreme dryness.

### Three New Tests Of Ellenburger Are Going Down

ALBANY, Tex., Oct. 4 (UP)—Three new Ellenburger tests were scheduled today in western Stephens county in the southeast hex area, with a new wildcat slated at Roeser & Pendleton, Inc.

The wildcat is No. 1, Celia A. McRea-O'Loughlin 330 feet from east and 660 feet from south lines section 64, Blind Asylum lands, 1 1/2 miles northeast of the Wild pool of Phillips Petroleum Co. The test is on a 4,400-foot contract.

Carter & McCamey No. 1, J. W. Castleman is a new Ellenburger test drilling in northeast corner west half section 28, Orphan Asylum lands, a half-mile south of the Loving-Compton pool producing in the Caddo time. It also is a wildcat for the Ordovician series at 4,350 feet.

L. C. Harrison of Dallas, No. 2-B Henry Compton, has started drilling for Ellenburger in southwest northwest quarter section 12, Orphan Asylum lands. This is a location north of Harrison's No. 1-B on the same farm which rated 119 barrels of initial production daily to open a new pool from 4,350 feet Ellenburger, over a mile south of the Wild-Compton pool.

### Seek To Buy Rio Grande Bridge

D. L. RIO, Tex., Oct. 4 (UP)—The U. S. Public Roads Administration and the Texas Highway Department will negotiate with Mexico for the purchase of a bridge across the Rio Grande between Del Rio and Villa Acuna, Mexico.

The bridge is owned by the Citizens Bridge Company.

In case negotiations fail, State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer has been authorized to proceed with plans for construction of a toll free bridge over the Rio Grande at Del Rio.

### Traffic, Other Mishaps Claim 9 Texas Victims

At least nine Texans died in week-end traffic mishaps and other violence, a United Press compilation showed today.

Five persons lost their lives in traffic accidents. Fire killed two others.

At Fort Worth, John Madison Morton, 68, died of a head injury. A corner's report called his death murder, and police held Morton's son, Elisha, 27, for investigation after he told them he had scuffled with his parent.

W. C. (Red) Stevens died at Odessa, victim of burns suffered in a fire in his hotel room. Ernest Fleischauer, 73, burned to death in his farm home, near Waco.

There were two traffic fatalities at Fort Worth. Bobbie Tom Compton, 21, was killed when his automobile collided with a truck. Anacleto Gonzalez, 75, a pedestrian, died of injuries suffered when an automobile ran him down.

Dallas also marked up two traffic deaths. Ardis Rainey, 54, Lario, Tex., was killed in a two-car collision at the city's outskirts. Two-year-old Patricia Ann Carter of Dallas was crushed to death beneath the wheels of a U. S. Mail truck near her home.

Walter Jackson, 78, of Chisholm, Tex., died at Waco from injuries suffered when an automobile driven by a Port Arthur youth struck him.

At Bonham, Wayne Louks of Gordon, Nebr., a rodeo performer, was killed. His horse fell on him during the final event of a rodeo held in connection with the Bonham fair.

### DC-3 Missing With 21 Aboard

MIAMI, Fla., Oct. 4 (UP)—A chartered DC-3 passenger plane carrying 17 passengers and a crew of four reported itself lost and out of gas early today and disappeared somewhere in the Atlantic ocean.

Coast Guard rescue control here sent 10 military planes to search the area around the Bahamas Islands where the aircraft's first distress signal was heard.

"Gas running out; need bearings," was the last clear signal heard from the plane at 12:19 A. M. EST by the Nassau, Bahamas, airport tower.

An hour and 24 minutes later a "mayday" distress signal was heard but Coast Guard and Civil Aeronautics authority listeners were unable to get a "fix" on the location. Coast Guard rescue officers said they believed the pilot became lost on a night flight from Teerboro, N. J., and called the Nassau tower in the belief it was in that area.

The plane, a New England Air Express charter piloted by A. D. Oliveren, took off from the Bendix airport at Teerboro at 7:25 P. M.

With 700 gallons of gas, its destination was listed as Miami and eventually San Juan, Puerto Rico. Weather officials reported the night was ideal for the "visual flight" plan of the aircraft and could not explain why he was so far out at sea and off course on a flight down the eastern coastline to Miami.

CAA officials said they were informed by Bendix airport that the plane was listed as being equipped with flotation gear and three man life rafts, enough for all aboard.

### Clear, Cool, Dry Weather Outlook

### U. S. DELEGATE SAYS POWERS TO PRESS PEACE THREAT CHARGES

#### Johnson Asks Supreme Court To Affirm Ruling

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4, (UP)—Rep. Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas today asked the full supreme court to affirm an order by Justice Hugo L. Black assuring him a place on the Texas ballot as Democratic nominee for the U. S. Senate.

Last week, at Johnson's request, Black set aside an order which would have barred Johnson from the state's general election ticket.

The injunction against Johnson had been issued by Federal District Judge T. Whitfield Davidson pending an investigation of primary election fraud charges filed by Johnson's opponent, former Gov. Coke R. Stevenson.

On Saturday, attorneys for Stevenson asked the full court to set aside Black's action, which occurred following a chambers hearing last week.

Attorneys for Johnson and Stevenson appeared in person before the full Supreme Court as it reconvened for the 1948-49 term.

After they stepped forward and orally presented their motions, Chief Justice Fred M. Vinson nodded acknowledgement. The court then recessed for a week. No action on the case is probable until at least next Monday.

#### School House Burns Kids Get Holiday

DENTON, Tex., Oct. 4 (UP)—Insurance adjusters today were checking over the loss caused by an estimated \$30,000 to \$40,000 fire at the Stonewall Jackson elementary school here last Friday night as pupils gained a brief holiday.

Classes were not held today, as school officials sought a temporary building which could be equipped for classes.

REBELLION QUelled LIMA, Peru, Oct. 4 (UP)—A bloody revolt against the Peruvian government ended today when the rebel fleet surrendered formally in nearby Callao, the port of Lima.

Rear Admiral Heriberto Maguina Sosa's boarded the cruiser Grau and accepted the formal surrender. The result already had been crushed by navy forces and civilians.

An unconfirmed report circulated that Capt. Enrique Aguilera Parde, leader of the seaborne revolt, committed suicide aboard the Grau. Two officers and two seamen who had been wounded were removed from the vessel.

PARIS, Oct. 4, (UP)—Russia threatened to boycott the United Nations Security Council on the Berlin question today, but United States delegate calmly replied that the western powers would press their charges that Russian actions threaten the peace anyway.

Soviet Delegate Andrei Vishinsky set the stage for a Russian boycott—possibly even another dramatic walk-out such as that of 1946 over the Iranian issue—in a table-pounding, arm-waving speech in which he asserted the Security Council has no right to intervene.

American delegate Philip Jessup quietly replied that: "The Soviet government still refused to list the blockade of Berlin. The Berlin issue is still a threat to peace."

Vishinsky charged the western powers with raising war fears, with trying to junk the Big Four Foreign Ministers' Council, with attempting "illegally" to bring the Berlin dispute before the council, with violating the UN charter and the Potsdam and Yalta agreements.

Jessup calmly answered that the latest note of the Soviet government suggested a new meeting of the council of foreign ministers on the whole German question had not changed anything. In effect, he rejected the Russian note, asserting that inclusion of the issue on the agenda would violate international agreements, he shouted:

"We shall not be a party to such violations."  
Again, after explaining that he was not discussing the substance of the Berlin question, but merely procedural questions, he cried: "And the Soviet government does not intend to deal with the substance of this matter because the security council does not have competence."

Inclusion of the Berlin dispute on the council's agenda, the Russian deputy foreign minister asserted, would violate the United Nations charter and other international agreements. He insisted that the charter "excludes" the United Nations as a whole "from competence to consider the question."

Although his speech dealt in part with the actions of Russia and the western powers in the Berlin situation, and made the old familiar charges that the west was stirring the trouble there, Vishinsky insisted he was not dealing at his stage with substantive questions in the Berlin case, but merely with procedure.

Even as Vishinsky spoke, the big three foreign ministers were meeting elsewhere in Paris to confirm their preliminary agreement of rejection of a new Russian proposal, unless the Berlin blockade is lifted unconditionally. The Soviet proposed a new meeting of the big four Council of foreign ministers.

The Security Council convened at 3:12 P. M. (12 A. M. CST) in an atmosphere as tense as any yet produced at the Paris meeting of the UN. The United States surrendered the chairmanship of the council to Argentina at the outset of the meeting because of direct concern in the Berlin issue.

For the first hour the council argued over a technicality whether translations should be consecutive or simultaneous. Blandly Vishinsky told the council that there was no blockade of Berlin. That was the text taken by Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov in proposing a renewal of Big Four consideration of the German problem.

"The measures taken by Soviet authorities against which the complaints were directed are responsible measures which the Soviet government had to take in view of the separate currency reform in Western Germany, which put the Berlin and the whole Soviet zone in a position where they were threatened with a flood of new currency," Vishinsky said.

### Tribe Manager Lauds Pitching Predicts Victory

CLEVELAND, Oct. 4 (UP)—"There is no Hal Newhouse in Boston, and we're going there just a day early for the World series."

That statement from manager Lou Bourdeau today as the Indians were en route to Boston for the first play-off of a championship tie in the history of the American League, summed up the feeling of the entire club.

The Indians were soundly beaten yesterday by Detroit, 7 to 1, but more specifically they were beaten by Newhouse, a veteran pitcher Bourdeau termed "the greatest left-hander in the game" in a sad post-game meeting with the press.

Newhouse beat us almost single-handedly yesterday, Bourdeau said. "We could have batted against him for two days and still lost the game. He's one of the greatest pitchers of them all."

The youthful Cleveland manager, however, refused to talk about his own pitching plans for the pay-off game with the Red Sox today that will decide the champion of the league.

"I probably will start one of three men—Bob Feller, Bob Lemon or Gene Bearden—but I don't expect to make up my mind till game time," he said. "In fact, I have a total of six pitchers in mind I might start, but I want to think it over until that last moment."

Bourdeau refused to be downhearted about the Detroit loss and he maintained the Indians still were "up" for today's game with the Sox.

"There's too much experience I fear in field to let a little thing like this stop us," he said.

### Lyons Quits Sox, Onslow Succeeds

CHICAGO, Oct. 4 (UP)—The Chicago White Sox announced the resignation of Ted Lyons as manager and today picked Jack Onslow, manager of their Memphis farm club, to succeed him.

Onslow's appointment was announced by Charles Comiskey, secretary of the White Sox, who yesterday accepted the resignation of Ted Lyons.

Lyons' resignation was made public shortly after Sox had finished one of their most disastrous seasons, losing more than 100 games. Lyons' two-year contract expired yesterday.

### Strike Threatens French Government

PARIS, Oct. 4, (UP)—The shaky coalition government of Premier Henri Queuille was threatened today by a strike of about 350,000 Communist-led miners which paralyzed coal production throughout northern France.

Communist strike leaders rejected government concessions by which Queuille had hoped to limit the walk-out to 48 hours, and the General Confederation of Labor (CGT) branded the government offer a "last minute maneuver designed to deceive the workers and public opinion."

No violence was reported as the strike took 100 per cent effect in the northern and northeastern coal fields, but the government alerted mobile guards, and equipped garrison troops with full battle kit.

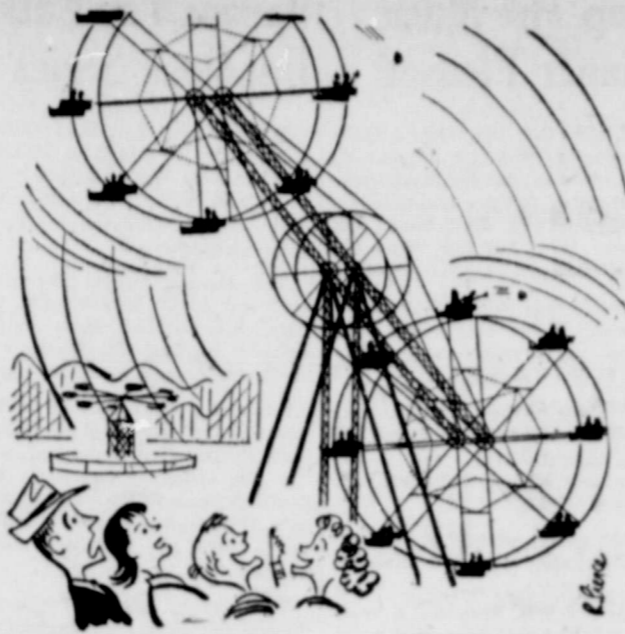

To end the quarrel, Nail said he sent George to bed. A short time later he heard a shot and ran to the boys' upstairs bedroom. He

found George fatally wounded in the head with a 12-gauge shotgun. An hour later police found the younger boy hiding under the house. He admitted to officers that he had shot his brother but apparently did not understand the enormity of the deed.

"George wanted to take the comic books next door," he explained. "I didn't want him to."

The father said he did not know how his son learned to load and fire the rusty 12-gauge shotgun which had been kept hidden in a closet.

## Protest Pauper Burial For Vets

AUSTIN, Tex., Oct. 4 (UP)—Members of the executive committee of the Texas Department of the American Legion were on record today with a protest against burial of veterans in pauper graves, as well as a request that the attorney general launch a study of the state's laws relating to children.

The committee, meeting here yesterday, endorsed a resolution which urged the passage of state legislation to prevent the burial of Texas veterans in pauper graves.

William C. (Bill) McGraw, state commander and former attorney general, said the Legion was "indignant" over the recent burial of four veterans "in potter's field."

"I am sure the communities where this took place must have overlooked it," he said, "because it is not characteristic of Texas and Texans."

"From now on out," he said, "this can't and will not happen again."

The executive committee urged at the same time that the legislature provide money for a study to be conducted over the next two years, by the attorney general's department on laws relating to children.

GATESVILLE, Tex., Oct. 4, (UP)—Four men were in the hospital here today for treatment of burns received when gasoline being poured into an asphalt machine flared up into a blaze in Hamilton, Texas.

One of the four is in a serious condition with third-degree burns on his face and arms. He is Joe Dempster.

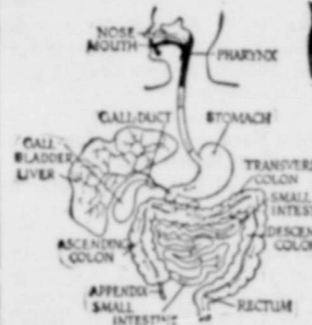

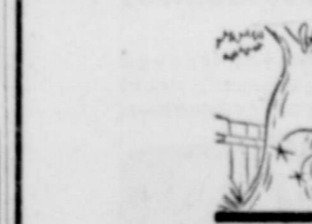

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4 (UP)—In another slap at Russia's expansion in the Baltic, the United States again has stated that it does not recognize Soviet annexation of Latvia.

Officials said today that Secretary of State George C. Marshall reaffirmed this country's position recently by recognizing a new charge d'affaires for the Latvian government. Little Latvia, Estonia and Lithuania were swallowed up by Soviet annexation eight years ago.

Marshall's action was taken weeks ago but was only disclosed today.
