

Pageant to have two performances

Members of the Holy Family Catholic Church of Nazareth are making final preparations for the presentation Sunday and Tuesday nights of the Tenth Annual Nazareth Nativity Pageant.

The program, which begins at 8 both nights, depicts the prophecies of Christ's birth, his infancy and childhood in an effort to put the real meaning back into Christmas, and to share that meaning with others.

Stanley Maurer is the state director, and Norma Schacher is the assistant director. Director of the pageant choir is Sharon Brockman.

The pageant is portrayed in 13 scenes by actors using pantomime or shown in tableaux, while the speaking parts are narrated from offstage. Instrumental and vocal music accents the entire program, and a congregational sing-along of Christmas carols is included.

This year, Mary is portrayed by Patti Schacher and her voice will be narrated by Jimmie Schulte, while Stanley Maurer will act as Joseph and Steve Albracht will be his voice. Jesus as a boy will be portrayed by Matthew Hatla.

Paul Huseman will be the Angel Gabriel, while Charles Heck will speak his messages. Elizabeth's voice will be coming from Irene Wilhelm and her actions will be performed by Betty Wilhelm, while Zachary will be portrayed by Daniel Braddock and his voice will be supplied by Gene Kern.

Other parts will include soldiers, angels, shepherds, kings, mothers and babes, among others. Mary Lynn Olvera and Winnifred Waggoner will play the organ and piano, and also featured will be Damian Wilhelm on trumpet, Liz Wilhelm on flute and Jane Johnson on violin. The music for the congregational sing-along is provided by the Young Adult Choir and the Catholic Youth Organization.

Although the program remains basically the same from year to year, changes and improvements are always being made, and this year a new scene will be added, entitled "The Inn at Bethlehem," and will be highlighted by the singing of "No Room," a song written by John W. Peterson.

Also, scenery, props and costumes are made more lavish each year.

There is no admission charge. The program, open to the public, has been seen by thousands of people over the years.

The final dress rehearsal will be Friday at 8 p.m. at the church.

Administration no help

Hance sees potential disaster

than 400 attended the concert, which featured a turkey dinner prepared by the Middle School CVAE girls and an evening of music by five elementary, junior high and high school choral groups and 10 soloists.

US Rep. Kent Hance has predicted a major depression in the West Texas agribusiness economy if the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) starts foreclosing on loans. And the Reagan Administration's hard-line policy toward agriculture is adding to farmers' money problems, he said.

"It is rumored that almost 1,000 potential farm foreclosures or liquidations will be activated in West Texas farming communities," said Hance.

"This could trigger similar actions in other agriculture financial areas to double this number of foreclosures or liquidations and made the farm picture extremely bleak for the next two years," he added.

"For those of us who understand agriculture, this will affect virtually every business and family in West Texas. We could easily experience a situation like the great Depression, and the President needs to take immediate action to attack the problem as such," Hance said.

"The President knows I am unilaterally opposed to his line of reasoning regarding the farm program," Hance said, adding, "But the way the picture looks now, there is little hope of help from the President."

"The Farm Bill which Congress is considering is a

total disaster," Hance added. "I voted against it in the House, and unless the President can be urged to reconsider his stand, I will strongly oppose the farm bill on final passage."

The Texas congressman was especially critical of the recent efforts by the Administration to increase foreign aid and food stamp appropriation while maintaining a hard line regarding farm policy; all within four weeks of abandoning a goal of a balanced budget by 1984.

Hance said: "The President and his advisors opposed us on an amendment by Congressman Charles Stenholm which would have provided for a mandatory crop set-aside program, without subsidy, and would have saved almost 12 billion in 1982 in addition to helping the farm economy."

"The present farm policy of the President has only added to the problems brought on by the farm policies of the past three Presidents in which a cheap raw materials line of reasoning has been favored at the expense of our farmers. Every major agricultural country in the world protects its farmers better than does the United States under the present line of thinking."

"We have not had an adequate farm program in the past five years, and under the present thinking in Washington [See HANCE, Page 14]

Deed records to be microfilmed

The Castro County Commissioners Monday approved the recording on microfilm of deed records in the County Clerk's Office. The process will cost the county \$29,059.20 over a two-year period.

Jim Kidwell, representative of the Southern Microfilm of Texas, Inc., and Business Records Corp. of Dallas, recommended his system to insure the safety of the deed records that could never be replaced in case of theft, fire or natural disaster.

Kidwell suggested microfilming all real property records and index books and storing the film in Dallas. Should any local records be damaged or lost, new records could be made from the microfilm.

He also told the commissioners about the company's ability to reproduce deed records by reducing the sizes of the records into books approximately half the size of the county's old record books. The process would save floor space and approximately 80 shelves, he added.

To microfilm 166 old, handwritten or typewritten books and 137 photostat books, the cost totaled \$29,059.20. To reduce the size of 166 books would cost an additional \$23,406. The total process would cost \$52,465.20, Kidwell said.

Kidwell added that a price increase of 10% would begin Jan. 1, but that storage of the microfilm would be free. Commissioner Ed Bennett said that he thought the microfilming was necessary and important, and he asked County Clerk Zonell Maples if the reduction of books was necessary.

The County Clerk said that several books and indexes in bad condition should be replaced, but the other deed records could probably wait.

The commissioners approved the microfilming of all old deed records and reducing of a few of the books most needing it.

The company will bill the county for half of the total this year and the other half in the next fiscal year, Kidwell said.

The commissioners heard from Fire Marshal Ron Antelak, Fire Chief Randy Griffith and Assistant Fire Chief Tommy Cleavinger about the possibility of

New bus route relieving traffic

At Monday night's meeting of the Dimmitt School Board, trustees were informed about a decline in enrollment which is affecting the school lunch program, and heard that a new bus route has helped alleviate some traffic problems around the elementary school.

Board members also voted to switch employee insurance carriers for next year, appointed a textbook committee, and discovered that the district's total assessed valuation had to be lowered by more than \$1 million because of errors in assessment.

"Some of the errors were from double assessments on the same property, or transfer of people or property," Supt. Robert Ryan said, "and, of course, many of the errors were caused or brought to notice because of the combining of the tax evaluation districts within the county."

"We didn't really lose any money, we just don't have as much as we thought we did,

getting a replacement tractor for a problem tanker unit.

The unit has been having transmission and motor problems along with other difficulties when taken on runs.

"How much do you use it?" Commissioner Edd Wilson asked.

During cotton ginning season, "we've run it two or three times a week, easy," Cleavinger said, adding that having the rig could make

"the difference between a house burning down or not."

The tanker is often used to help with large fires in the Hart area, Cleavinger said.

This unit is the largest rig in the county, and it carries 2,500 gallons of water, he added.

Wilson suggested that the firemen check with the Sunnyside Volunteer Fire Dept. about how it was able to purchase its unit with financial aid from the National Forest Service.

"Check around and see what you come up with," Wilson said.

Cleavinger said that a new tractor would cost around \$20,000, and a used diesel rig would cost about \$10,000.

The firemen said that they would check some more and report back to the commissioners.

In other business, the county governing board:

—Accepted County Attorney Jimmy Davis' recommendation that it nominate one of its four members to sign checks and to sign and approve minutes in the absence of County Judge M. L. Simpson Jr. Ed Bennett was appointed to serve in this capacity.

—Learned that all the licensed attorneys in the county will have to meet and appoint someone to handle any county courts scheduled during Judge Simpson's absence.

—Approved the payment of \$6,803.13 to the Castro County Tax Appraisal District for the first quarterly budget payment for 1982. The county's share in the budget is 19.6%.

—Discussed the precinct boundary proposals which are still pending. The commissioners said that they hope to solve the boundary question without going into court.

Breakfast, hunt take in \$9,000

"Over \$9,000 was brought in by the Pheasant Hunters Breakfast," Cliff Lewis, treasurer of the Dimmitt Kiwanis Club, reported Monday. He added that this was an approximate figure, and none of the expenses had been taken out yet.

More than 400 were served at the breakfast, and 162 permits have been sold so far this season, members reported at the club's Monday meeting. Permits will remain available throughout the season.

Entries need to be phoned in, Mrs. Heller said, so that no one will be overlooked in the judging.

Winners from last year's contest will not be considered again this year unless significant changes have been made in their displays.

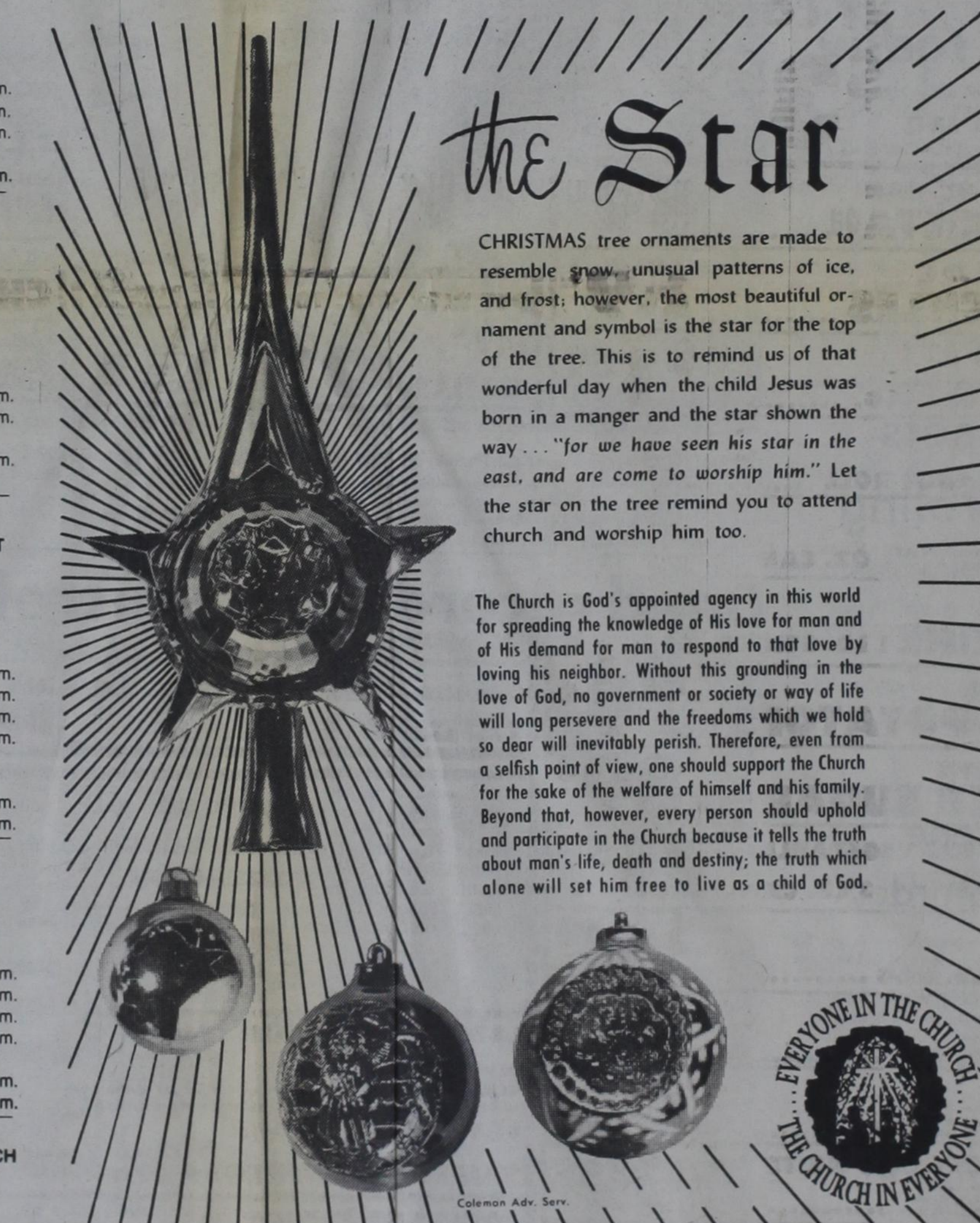

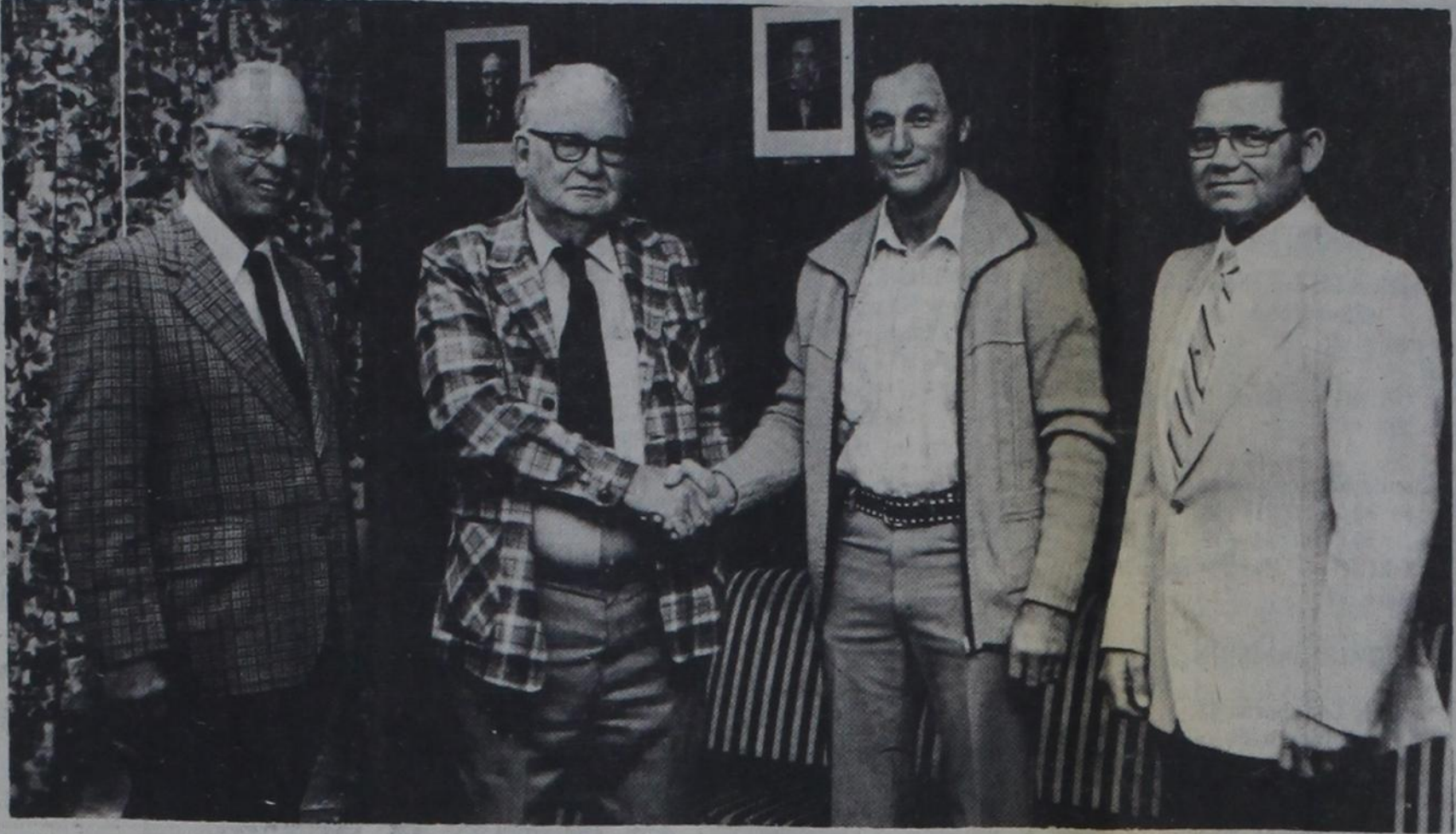

Wright has been served by rural electrification most of his life, and has farmed in the cooperative's service area for 25 years.

Wright and his family live east of Dimmitt, and he raises mainly irrigated corn and cotton.

Wright and his wife, Katy, have three children and are members of the First United Methodist Church, where he is on the administrative board. Mr. and Mrs. Wright are former co-winners of Dimmitt's Citizen of the Year Award, and he is a former winner of the "Outstanding Young Farmer of Texas" award, presented by the Texas Jaycees. The Wrights

have lived in Castro County all their lives.

The Deaf Smith REC serves rural homes, businesses and industries in Deaf Smith County and portions of Castro, Oldham and Parmer Counties.

In accepting the appointment, Wright said, "I will strive to represent the ideas of my fellow consumers while promoting the continuance of dependable service at the lowest possible cost."

Bailey Co-op sends checks

Members of the Bailey County Electric Cooperative who were receiving service in 1961, 1962 and 1963 will receive capital credit checks for their prorated part of the net margins for those years.

Checks were mailed during the first week of December. The total amount for 1961 is \$34,749.20, for 1962 there is a total of \$109,029.72, and the portion of 1963 being paid at this time, 14.418% of this year's allocation, is \$17,899.63.

This is a total of \$161,678.55.

Bailey County Electric Cooperative Association is chartered under Texas State Law as a non-profit corporation. It is operated to provide electric service to its members at cost. Any funds received in any one year over the cost of doing business is set aside as net margins.

Since the money belongs to the member-owners of the cooperative, they are issued capital credit certificates for their prorated part. This money is forever assigned to them or members of their estate.

The board of directors has the authority to administer these funds, and any time it feels the cooperative is in a financial position to do so, will refund these credits in cash.

Policy states that this will be done on a "first-in--first-out basis. The net margins from 1954 through 1962, and 1966, have been paid in full, plus 14.418% of 1963.

Sen. Tower says cotton grading needs changing

US Sen. John Tower (R-Texas) this week expressed concern about apparent inequities which have resulted from changes in the manner Texas cotton is graded.

In a letter to Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block, Tower noted that the Agriculture Marketing Service recently has undertaken changes in the manner in which the Altus, Oklahoma, classing office grades cotton.

"I have received numerous complaints that cotton samples from the same producer with the same quality have been graded differently," Tower said.

The senior senator from Texas asked Block to look into the situation, and emphasized the need for grading procedures for cotton to be "consistent, equitable and fair."

"Cotton classed at a lower grade obviously brings a lower price. Farmers who have had cotton from the very same field graded at different levels are justifiably concerned about what has happened, particularly since this year for the first time they are paying a fee for the service."

Amstar is the nation's largest manufacturer and distributor of nutritive sweeteners and also a supplier of industrial tools and equipment. Its Industrial Products Group manufactures and markets portable electric power tools, mechanical and electric hoists, rotary unions, jacks and other products, and it designs and sells clarifiers and filters.

In fiscal year 1981, which ended June 30, Amstar's sales were approximately \$2.0

billion and its net income was more than \$73.0 million.

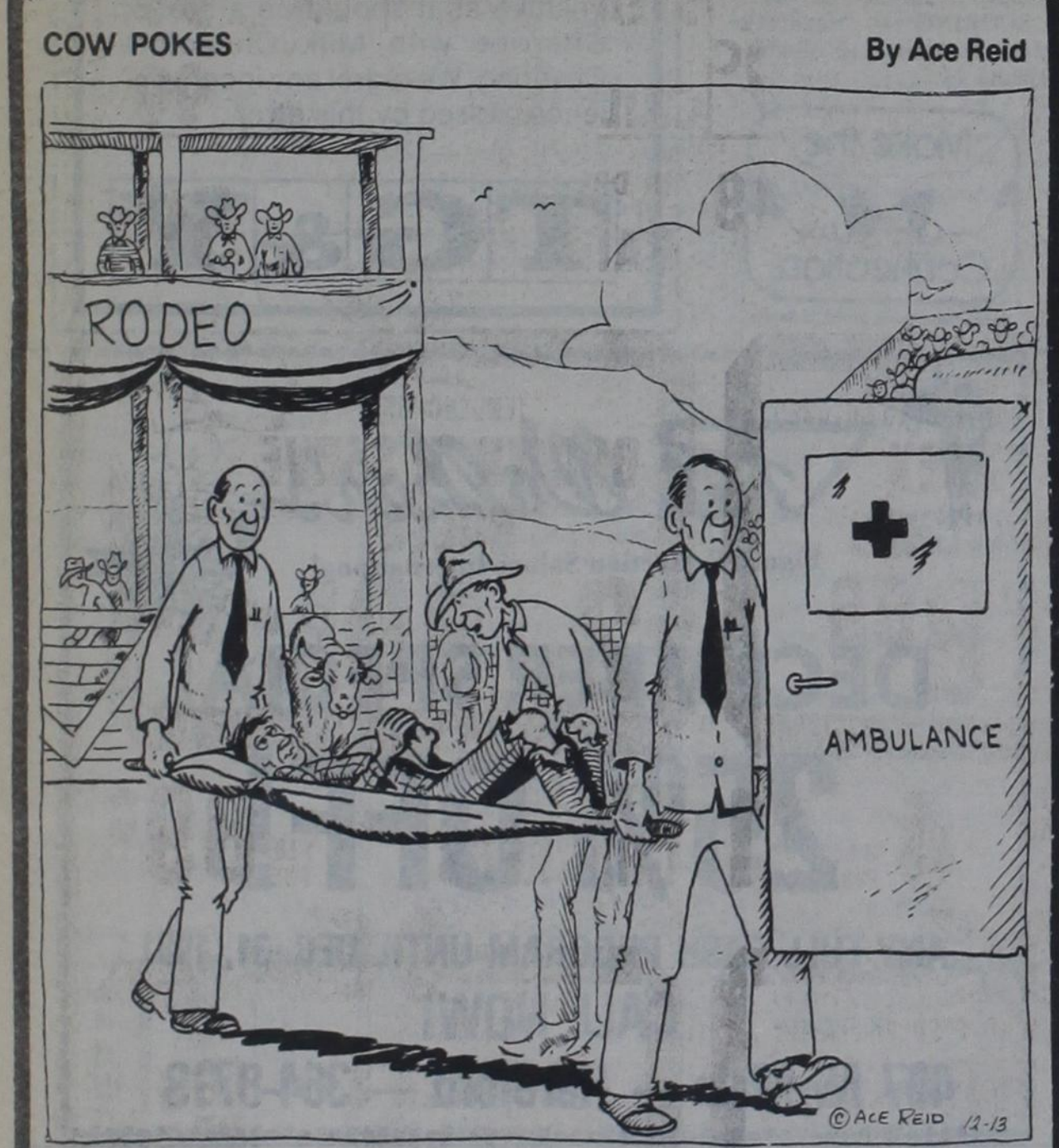

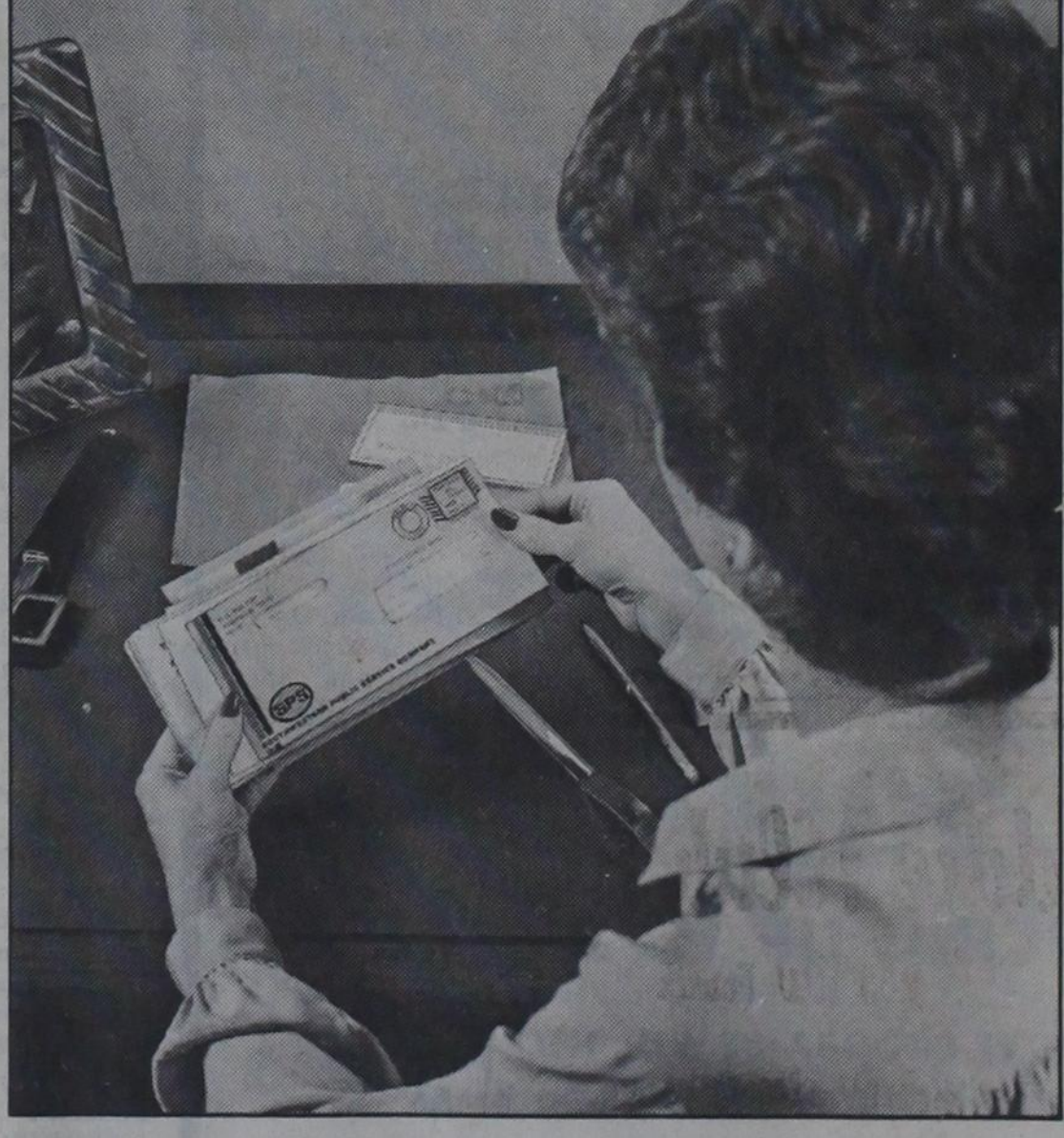

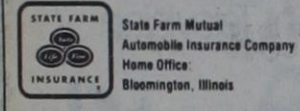

State Comptroller Bob Bullock announced that representatives from his Lubbock and Plainview offices will be in area towns during the next two weeks issuing 1982 liquified gas (LG) fuel decals.

A representative will be at the courthouse in Dimmitt Dec. 30 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Bullock said recent changes in the LG fuel law will permit his office to tax vehicles on both weight and mileage, and decals should cost less for those who drive fewer miles.

LG fuel users must bring the renewal notice they recently received in the mail, as well as the current mileage of their vehicle, to the courthouse to take advantage of this change.

If they did not receive a renewal notice, they may contact the Comptroller's office in Lubbock at (806) 795-0691 or Plainview at (806) 293-5288 for assistance, or call the Comptroller's toll-free number 1-800-252-5555.

Conservation plan -- III Program proposed

[Editor's Note: The US Dept. of Agriculture has identified the critical soil and water resource problems of the nation, analyzed them, and proposed a national conservation program to address them. This is the last in a series of three articles that outlines the conservation problems, trends and analyses, and the proposed national program.]

The US Dept. of Agriculture announces a proposed national conservation program to deal with the serious resource conservation problems ahead for American agriculture.

Four points highlight the program, according to Barney Lee, district conservationist, Soil Conservation Service (SCS), at Dimmitt. They are:

- Setting soil and water conservation priorities;
- Strengthening the role of local and state governments in conservation planning;
- Increasing budget coordination and cooperation between USDA agencies; and
- Targeting more USDA conservation assistance to critical problems and areas.

This program is the proposed response to Congress required by the Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act of 1977 (RCA), reports Lee. It is based on an extensive appraisal of the condition of the nation's soil and water resources and an analysis of future trends.

Highest national priority in the proposed conservation program is reducing soil erosion to maintain the long-term productivity of agricultural land. Second priority is reducing flood damages in upstream areas. Other priority activities are conserving water and improving water supply and quality, community-related conservation, improving fish and wildlife habitat, and increasing the use of organic waste.

Strengthening the relationship between land owners or users and government at all levels is a principal feature of the proposed program. This would include having local conservation coordinating

boards identify critical resource problem areas, set priorities and develop programs for action. Local boards would be based on the existing organizations — conservation district boards, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) committees, extension advisory boards and others. State boards would be organized along similar lines. A national board also would be set up to advise the Secretary of Agriculture.

The relationship between the state government and the federal government would also be strengthened through an agreement signed by the governor and Secretary of Agriculture to establish cooperative activities and through federal block grants.

The program is the USDA response to the Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act of 1977 (RCA). SCS and Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service offices throughout the state have a supply of the leaflet that summarizes the program and that contains a pre-addressed, postage-paid response form.

The offices also have a reference copy of the full report of the program and draft environmental impact statement.

Other features of the program include targeting USDA conservation dollars and people to critical areas; promoting tax incentives for conservation systems; targeting research, education and information toward the most critical problems; and setting up pilot projects to test new solutions to conservation problems. Current programs would continue.

Details of the new program are presented in the RCA Revised Draft Program Report and Environmental Impact Statement available for reference use at SCS and Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service offices throughout the state. The two USDA offices also have leaflets that summarize the program and that contain a postage-paid, pre-addressed

response form.

Comments on the proposed new program are encouraged. They must be mailed to George C. Marks, SCS State Conservationist, PO Box 648, Temple, 76503 before Jan. 15, 1982.

PUBLIC NOTICE

In accordance with rule 052.01.00.043(a) of the Public Utility Commission of Texas' Rules of Practice and Procedure, Continental Telephone Company of Texas announces it has petitioned the Commission for increased rates to offset costs associated with a change in accounting for inside station connection costs. The increase is the result of an order by the Federal Communications Commission, directing telephone companies to expense certain station connection costs in their accounting procedures. The increase in rates to result from the accounting change will produce an increase of less than one half of one percent in gross intrastate revenues of the Company. The increase will not affect monthly recurring charges but will be reflected as an additional element to nonrecurring service connection charges when a premise visit is required. The new service charge is intended to offset costs of administering unpaid checks and will affect gross revenues by approximately \$35,000 annually. The effective date of these rate changes will be based upon approval by the Public Utility Commission.

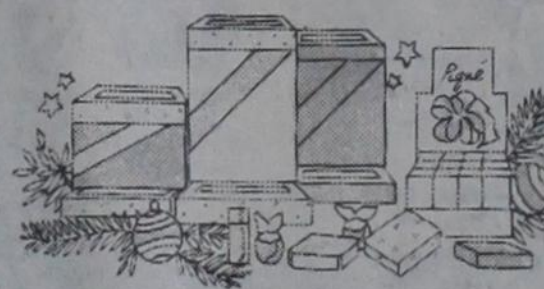

AFS programs explained in assembly

At an assembly sponsored by the FHA Monday morning at Dimmitt High School, American Field Service exchange student Robert Watson of Ireland, showed slides of his homeland, and local AFS President Hazel Nelson talked about the programs of AFS.

"Walk together, talk together, all ye peoples of the earth; then, and only then, shall ye have peace," Mrs. Nelson said, is the AFS motto. She told the audience that AFS dates back to the American volunteers who drove ambulances in Europe during both world wars.

"After World War II, convinced that their organization

could contribute to world peace, the AFS drivers turned their attention to student exchange," she said. "Their belief in the value of personal contact in understanding differences and fostering international cooperation inspired the AFS programs which now span the globe."

Under the Winter Program, American families host students from foreign countries for a year of school. Dimmitt AFS committee member Janice Bell said Dimmitt has hosted "about 23 or 24 students since joining the program in 1960."

Watson is the current student here in Dimmitt, and he is being hosted by the

family of Fred Bruegel Jr. Anne Marie "Mia" Berg of Norway also came here this year, but was injured in a truck-motorcycle accident the day before she was to have started classes. She was in the hospital for several weeks in Amarillo, but has now returned to Norway with her parents, and is continuing in her recovery from the injuries she received. She was hosted by Bettye Huckabay.

AFS students from 55 countries are living in 2,500 US communities, Mrs. Nelson reported. She added that the local group is also looking for host families to apply for the 1982-83 school year.

The Americans Abroad Program sends American students abroad for either a summer or full-year placement. The only two from Dimmitt to ever participate in this program were David Nelson, who went on the year program to France, and Nita Parker, who went on the summer program to Colombia. This year, 3,500 American AFS students are traveling to 55 countries.

Mrs. Nelson said that another Dimmitt student has an application in for a summer program, but has not yet received notice of approval.

The AFS also has a Domestic Program which exchanges students within the United

States, and a Multi-National Program which arranges exchanges between countries other than the United States.

Short-term exchanges of a weekend to two weeks in length are also arranged, and the AFS has just initiated the Class Room Program in which a group of 15 to 30 students

and chaperones may go to a European community and attend school there for a three-week period.

"For AFS to be successful, the programs need community support and involvement," Mrs. Nelson said, "and we are fortunate here because the support in Dimmitt is

excellent.

"The school is also very important in the success of the program," she added. "I think the support of the faculty, student clubs and organizations, and each individual student has been really great, along with the friendship and consideration that has been extended to each AFS'er."

Announcing the special "AFS Weekend," which will be held in Dimmitt Jan. 21-24, Mrs. Nelson said several families have expressed interest in being hosts for that event, but that several more may be needed. Eight area AFS'ers will be invited to stay with families here for those days, and special activities are planned for touring spots of interest and for opportunities for the students to become acquainted with a wider variety of Americans.

Part of the expenses for October, however, were in increased salaries and several major repairs in the kitchen area.

About 130 students are riding on the two runs of the new bus route in the east part of town, Ryan told the board. He said the new route "is smooth-functioning."

He said that mothers have been "very cooperative" in acting as bus monitors, and that no problems have been encountered as far as he knows in getting drivers or in loading students.

"The traffic on Stinson Street by Richardson Elementary has been reduced significantly, and previously planned changes in the landscaping along the street there will not have to be made," Ryan reported. He said that the city does plan, however, to paint stripes on the street to more clearly delineate the traffic lanes.

In deciding to change employee insurance carriers, the board was notified that the monthly amount employees would have to pay for coverage under the current Blue Cross plan would be raised an average of 43.7% or about \$13.76 higher per month for next year's coverage.

"We asked for bids from all of the local insurance agents and several agents outside of Dimmitt, and Horace Mann and the Texas Association of School Boards were the only ones to submit bids," Ryan said, adding that the Horace Mann bid was even higher than the proposed raise in Blue Cross, and so was not considered.

The TASB proposal was slightly higher than the current Blue Cross plan but will be considerably less than the 1982 Blue Cross rates. The TASB rate will be an increase of about 14.9% over the current Blue Cross rate, and 24.9% less than the proposed new Blue Cross rate. The provisions of coverage will remain virtually the same, Ryan said.

The 1982 textbook committee will receive samples of books in such subjects as

social studies, speech, physical science, math, Spanish, economics and kindergarten studies, and must turn in its recommendations by the March meeting of the school board.

ton, the prospects for any improvement in the foreseeable future are dim.

"One of the ways we can solve our budget problems is by creating a strong farm program whereby our farmers can make a decent living by supplying food and fiber for the world. When the farmers are operating at a profit they pay additional taxes, and this would also greatly help in balancing the budget."

"The FmHA officials have assured me they are going to try to work out financial programs with the good management farmers to help keep some of them in operation, but the picture looks very bleak unless we can change farm policy thinking with the President and his major advisors."

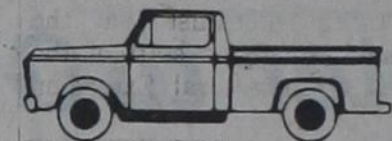

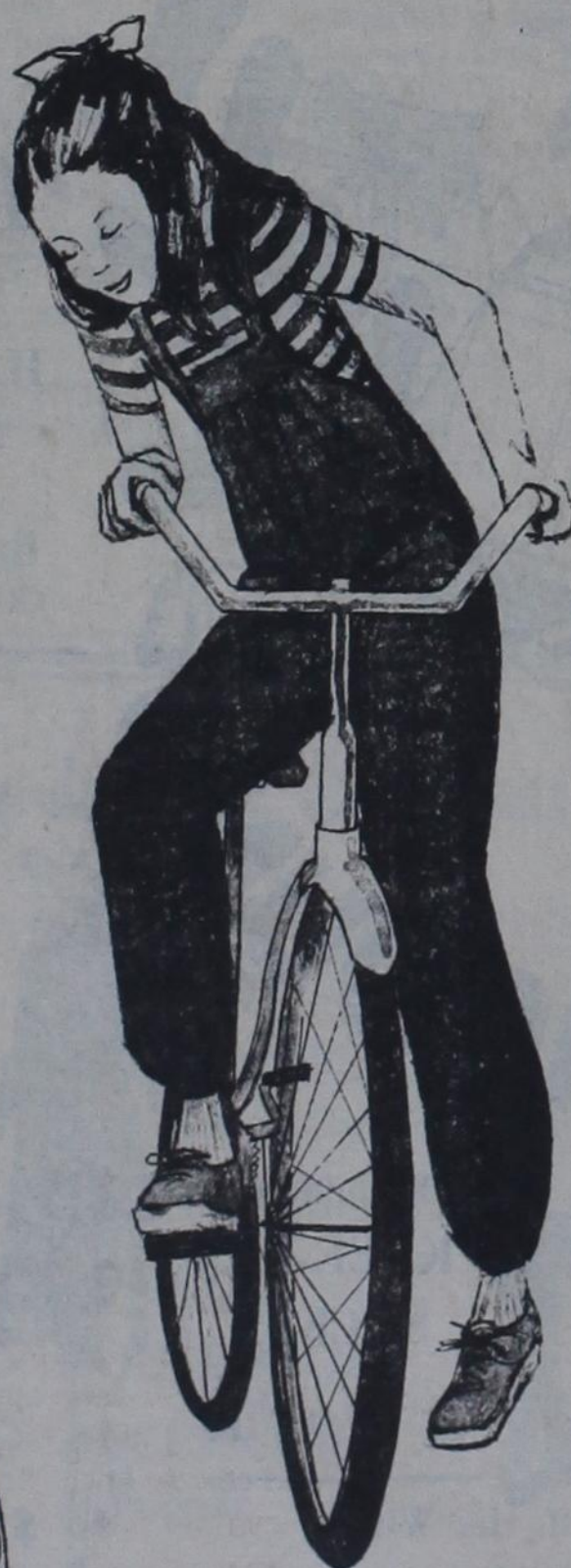

View from the library

Today the "View from the Library" writer is depressed. Why not a depressing bit about a depressing book? That ought to make everyone happy.

The depressing book is a book of contemporary collection of poetry. Wouldn't you know it? The poet in question is not well known to us but very well known to readers of the magazine, "The New Yorker." The poet is Anne Sexton, and the book is a complete collection of her poetry. She began her life's work in the 1950's and wrote furiously until she died in 1974.

A short biography of Anne Sexton by her best friend precedes the poetry. If one does not know Anne Sexton and a little of her life, it is wise to read this biography. It explains, at least in part, why much of the following poetry is so terse, so revolting and so wildly comic.

Anne Sexton began having terrible periods of depression after the birth of her first child. After she attempted suicide, her psychiatrist urged

her to start writing, and this was the start of her career.

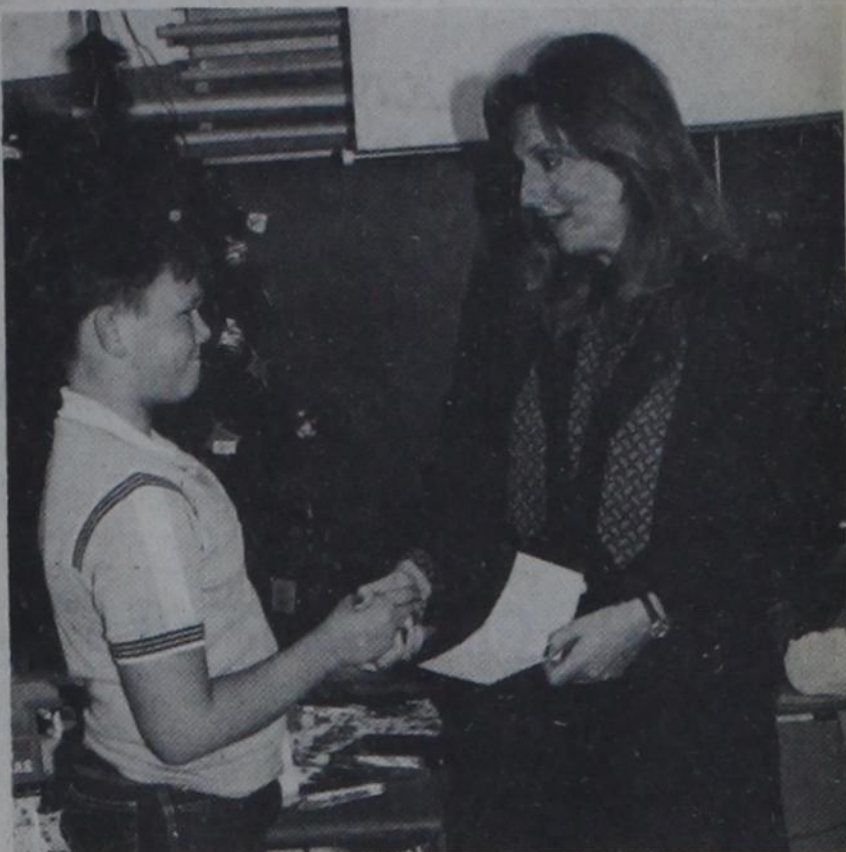
Yet the depression came again and again and Anne Sexton was confined several times to the psychiatric ward of a hospital. Much of her work reflects the invisible anguish and dullness of life in an institution. In the meantime, though, her poetry created outspoken alarm (because of her subject matter), it was widely read and she won many citations and awards.

Towards the latter part of her life she became more frequently depressed and more frantic as she tried to find a solution. Her poetry became metaphysical and oddly religious. However, it never helped and she finally committed suicide.

For those of you who are not depressed and would like lighter reading, there are other things in the new batch of books coming onto our shelves.

(However, I am still depressed even after writing this, so please excuse me while I go and bang my head around the card catalog or something. I read somewhere that Melvin Dewey used to do that.)

Orders being taken by SCS for seedlings

"The Running Water Soil and Water Conservation District will be taking orders for windbreak tree seedlings beginning this week and continuing until the Colorado Forest Service cuts off the orders in March," according to Lilly Nicholson, clerk for the Running Water SWCD. "The cost of the tree seedlings, will be a little higher this year than last year," Mrs. Nicholson said. "However, the selection will be about the same."

"Many of the evergreen tree seedlings come either potted or bare root. The bare root orders come with 50 trees in each package; they are covered with heavy canvas and the roots have peat moss around them. The potted orders come in 2-inch pots, with 30 trees per order," she explained.

The selection includes pine, spruce, cedar, fir, juniper, lilac, plum, Russian olive, willow, elm, honeysuckle, two varieties of cherry and several other species that adapt well to this area.

"I discussed the tree seedlings with Marvin Strachan, nursery manager at the Colorado State Forest Service Nursery, and he assures us that the trees are in excellent shape this year, and should be ready for delivery about April 1," Mrs. Nicholson reported.

The following follow-up warning to VA Pensioners to get their AIQ cards completed and on the way is now urgent. We are here to help with these forms and other claims by Veterans, their survivors and dependents. The following from the Waco Regional Office is dated December 8th:

More than a million and a quarter Veterans Administration pension recipients received reminders this month that it's time to take the annual look at their incomes for this year to make certain they still meet the legal eligibility rules.

A questionnaire, required by law, was sent with November checks, and, with certain exceptions, VA pensioners must complete and return it by January 1, 1982, or face suspension of their payments.

One excepted group includes 596,000 VA pensioners over 72 years of age who have been receiving pensions for the last two years. Also excepted are children under 23 receiving pension under laws in effect prior to December 31, 1978.

Instead of income questionnaires, these groups received, with their November pension check, a reminder that they must report any changes in the number or status of their dependents and any increase in their annual income which puts it over VA limits.

VA officials said these pension recipients need not report the June 1 cost-of-living increase in their social security since VA automatically records this information.

Help on completing both the annual income questionnaires and the reminder cards is available from VA regional offices, veterans county service offices, and from the major veterans organizations.

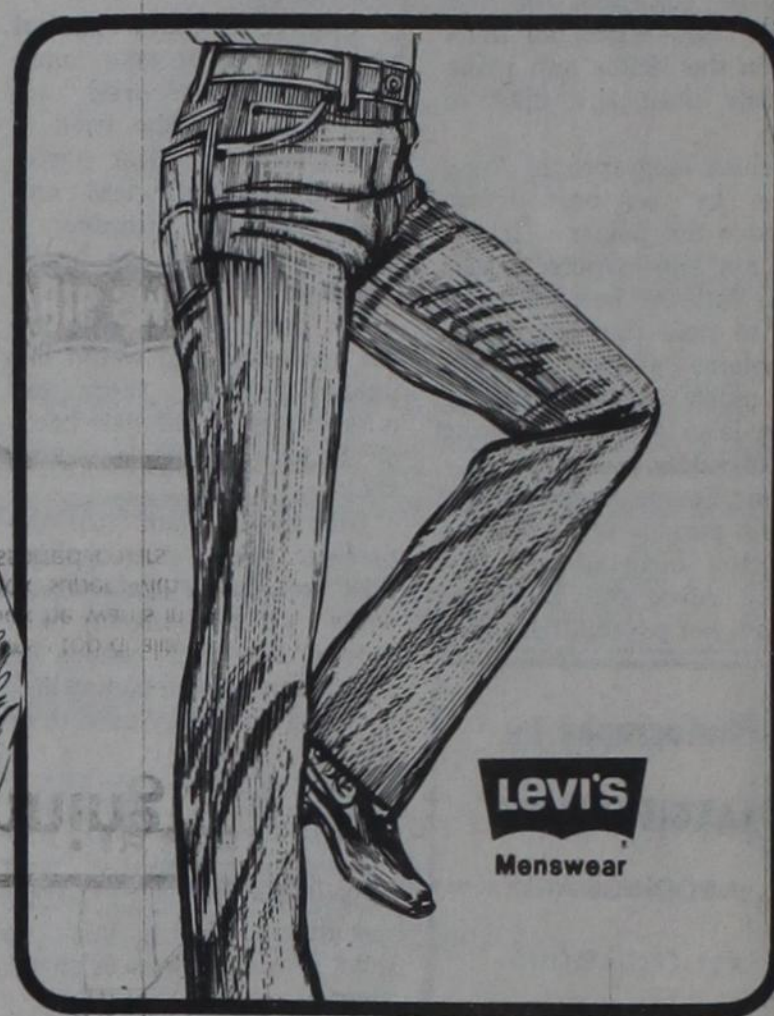

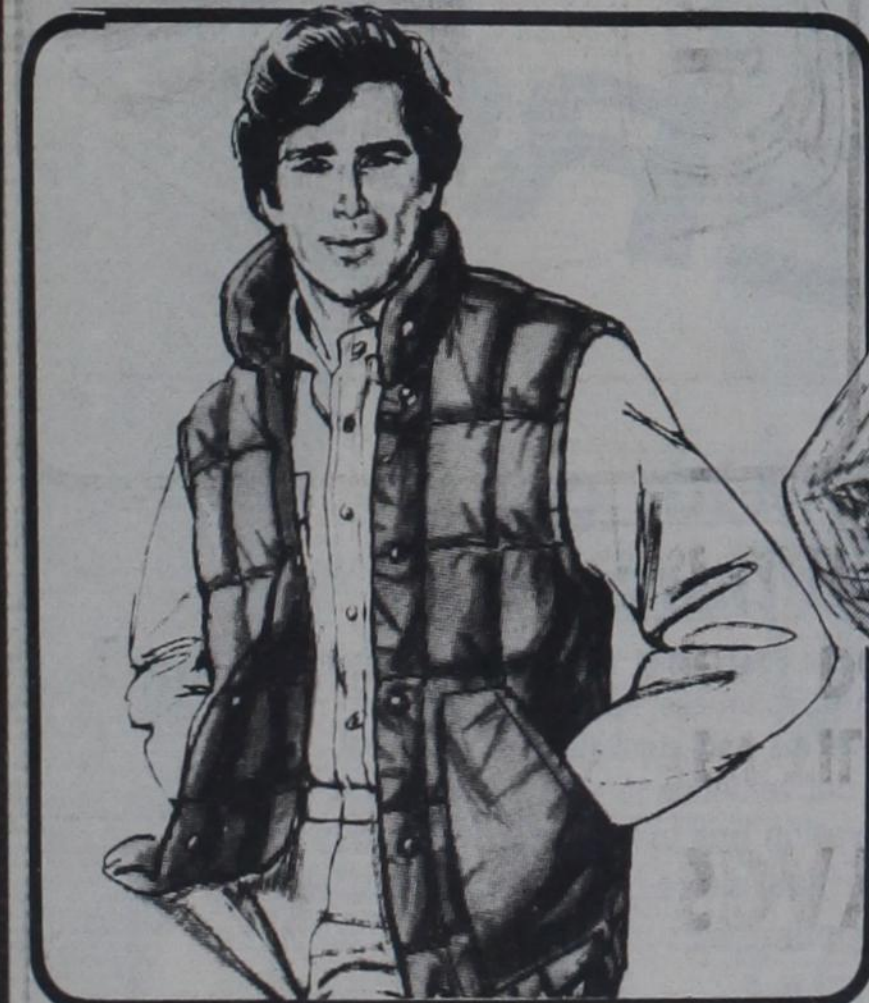
