Victory in Texas belonged today to President Truman, Lyndon B. Johnson and Gov. Beauford H. Jes-

Mr. Truman got the state's 23 electoral votes.

Jester won his second term as chief executive of the Lone Star state. And Johnson won election to the senate seat which eluded him by 1,311 votes at a special Democratic election in 1941.

The Texas Election bureau had counties, 13 complete, and had takulated 644,481 votes.

United Press Staff Correspondent Gov. Thomas E. Dewey conceded today that President Truman had been elected in the closest presidential race

It was one of the greatest upsets in American political history. Mr. Truman had been given no chance in preelection polls and forecasts. But he seized the lead with the first returns last night and never lost it .

He swept a Democratic congress into office with him. Republicans have lost control of both the House and

Dewey, who had been mulling over cabinet selections and preparing to move to Washington in January, gave up shortly after 11 A. M. today.

In a crowded suite at the Roosevelt Hotel in New York James Hagerty, Dewey's press secretary, called in reporters and said: "The Governor has just sent the following telegram: 'My heartiest congratulations on your election and every good wish for a successful administration. I urge all Americans to unite behind you in support of every effort to keep our nation strong and free and to establish peace in the world."

Democrats already had claimed the victory. Sen. J. Howard McGrath, Democratic national chairman walked

into party headquarters at the Biltmore Hotel in New York and said it was all over. He said Ohio's 25 electrol votes had turned the

"We have possession of sufficient facts," McGrath added, "to say that President Harry S. Tru-man and Sen. Alben Barkley have swept into a Democratic victory.' He predicted Mr. Truman's

European Recovery Now Based

On Reviving German Industry BY PETER EDSON NEA Washington Correspondent

WASHINGTON-(NEA)-Reconstruction of German Industrial pro-

duction now seems to be the bedrock upon which American policy for European recovery is being built. Cries of alarm over this development are coming not only from the raucous Moscow radio and its parroting followers. British, French, Dutch and other allied govern-

parroting followers. British, French, Dutch and other allied governments are equally concerned.

Ambassador Averill Harriman's arbitrary action last month, overruling the European governments' ellocation of Marshall Plan money, to give Germany \$70,000,000 more, was one indicator. Lifting the ban on American investment of blocked marks in German industry was a second step. There are now reports that American firms may soon be permitted to invest dollars in Germany. Economic Co-operation Administrator Paul Hoffman's present effort to negotiate a stop or dismantling of German was releast earmarked for reparations is

Hoffman has named a committee of five U. S. corporation presidents to make a resurvey of the reparations situation. Its chairman is George M. Humphrey of the Hanna coal, steel and shipping interests, Cleveland. Others are John L. McCaffrey of International Harvester, Gwilym A. Price of Westinghouse, Frederick V. it will be the third since the end of the war. Under the Potsdam reement of August 1945, all reparations deliveries were to be completed within two years after determination of Germany's postwar indard of living and level of industry. That determination was ade in February 1946. It was based on German steel production

of 10,700,000 tons a year. It was decided that the Germans should not be allowed to produce aircraft, armaments, ocean shipping, radio transmitters, synthetic ammonia, gasoline or rubber, ball bearings and certain machine tools. Electric power capacity was also cur.

Some 2000 war plants in the three western zones of Germany were then earmarked for dismantling and distribution to the allied countries on the basis of war damage and contribution to the victory. Russia was to get 25 per cent of these reparations—three-fifths of which were

to be in exchange for raw materials.

In May 1946 Gen. Lucius D. Clay, U. S. military governor, stopped allocation of plants in the U. S. zone for reparations. His reason was that the French and the Russians were not co-operating in treatment

of Germany as one economic unit, as agreed at Potsdam.

In October 1947 Clay issued a new list of plants available for reparations. It cut approximately in half the original list of 2000. It corrected some obvious mistakes.

Under the October 1947 list, 914 plants in western Germany were carmarked for reparations. In the U. S. zone were 186 plants, 233 in the French, 495 in the British, which took in the Ruhr. Actually allocated to the Inter-Allied Reparations Agency in Brussels, Belgium, are 135 plants from the U. S. zone, 210 from the British, 64 from the French. The total is 409 out of 914. 



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
