Israeli forces opened a new drive on the southern Palestine front today while the United Nations Security

Council debated what to do about the Holy Land war. The Jewish forces jumped off from newly-captured Iraq-Suweidan, 25 miles south of Tel Aviv, and overran Arab strongholds all the way to Faluja, one of the last

two Egyptian bases in Southern Palestine. Israeli officers expected Faluja, already encircled, to capitulate within a few hours. Faluja is 32 miles south of Tel Aviv. Its fall would leave the Egyptians only the seacoast town of Gaza in the Negev.

In the Security Council, Russia supported Israel's proposal for early Arab-Jewish peace talks to end the war in Palestine.

Jacob Malik of Russia told the council in Paris that the Jews and Arabs should be directed to negotiate either directly or through acting Palestine Mediator Dr. Ralph

Bunche for "an established formal peace." His proposal amounted to rejection of Dr. Bunche's proposal yesterday for an armistice, the establishment of a no mans land between the two forces, and the gradual reduction of their armed forces.

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




