While in Nanking: Communist troops driving Nanking have been caught in the jaws of a government pincer and Huai River north of Pengpu, private and government reports indicated today.

Telephoned reports from Pengpu, 105 miles north of Nanking, said three nationalist army groups smashing down from the north hit the Communist flank at Sushien today and forced an abrupt halt to the drive on Nanking

The Nationanst torce, under the overall command of Gen. Tu Yi-Ming, were part of the troops the government ordered to leave besieged Suchow and come to the rescue of Nanking. Suchow is 70 miles northwest of Sushien.

The threat to their rear forced the Commnists to abandon their attack on Pengpu and fall back across the river, the private reports said.

Government military spol asman Lt. Gen. Tang Wen-Yi con-firmed that the Communists Ind abandoned their attack on Pengpu and retreated across the riv er. Government troops are in hot pursuit, he said.
