



They are designed to protect ome-buying World War II veterans from shoddy construction and from being cheated by unprincipled contractors or salesmen. They go into effect December 15.

The rules specify the minimum quality of materials, construction echniques, workmanship, installation and structural details necessary for veterans loan guarantees. The GI standards parallel the wiped off the books.

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
