Dulles Urges Anti-Communist Bloc

COMMUNISTS ON ATTACK IN BREAK THROUGH TRY

BY JOSEPH JACOB NANKING, Dec. 7 (UP)—United Press Staff Correspondent Communist forces have launched a powerful attack on Nationalist forces southwest of Suchow in an effort to break through a government "interception line" barring their retreat, government reports said today.

A Nationalist military news agency correspondent said the battle is developing into the third major clash of the month-long fighting along the approaches to Nanking.

This dispatch said the 2nd Nationalist army group of more than 100,000 men formed a line between Yungcheng and Hsiachien, 50 and 20 miles southwest of Suchow, as part of a "vast annihilation campaign" to destroy the Communist forces in the field.

Twelve Communist army groups of about 180,000 men are trying to break through the Nationalist line, the government dispatches said.

Brownwood City Manager Resigns

BROWNWOOD, Dec. 7 (UP)—John W. Perryman, Jr., 33, city manager here for 16 months, has resigned effective Dec. 18, to accept the Paris, Tex., city manager post at a higher salary, it was disclosed today.

The Brownwood city council accepted the resignation with regret and elected Jack Board, municipal airport manager, as acting city manager.

Perryman, who holds a lieutenant commander's post in the Naval Reserve Aviation (engineer)—instituted many municipal improvements during his 16 months. He is a native of St. Jo, Tex.

The second government column previously was stationed in Northern Anhwei Province and has not yet been engaged in the battle for Nanking, Central News said.

The Communist underground meanwhile announced plans to take over all Shanghai industry when the city is captured and warned industrialists against sabotage.

The Nationalist defense ministry finally confirmed Communist claims that the government's 7th Army group commanded by Gen. Huang Po-Tao had been cut off and destroyed by Communists at Nienchuang, in the Sushien area.

A special communique said that Huang shot himself to death with his pistol on Nov. 22 after his forces had been cut down from 70,000 men to three regiments.

Owner Ready To Report On Sears Program Heifer

Frank Robinson of the Ranger FFA chapter is ready to make his first report on the Jersey heifer which he received through the Sears Foundation last August.

The heifer which is to be the foundation stock for Robinson's future herd was bought with \$100 given the Ranger chapter for the Sears Roebuck foundation program and with an additional \$51 which Robinson borrowed from the bank. Robinson was chosen through a vote of the FFA chapter as the one to receive the animal. He was selected on the basis of his ability and his interest in raising stock.

The heifer was purchased from the Payton Jersey farm at Stephenville when she was seven months old. Robinson said he thought it enough when he so much trouble getting registration papers but that when he did the name practically stumped him. The heifer is named "Roxy Fancy Cowslip, born February 12, 1948, tattoo right ear R70, Sire Roxy Cowslip Design 442933, Dan Fancy Lady Ropy Design 157971."

Robinson says that he hopes to show the heifer at the Tri-County Livestock Show in Ranger and the Eastland County Livestock Show. The 16 year-old owner of the animal is a junior in high school and that by the time he finishes school he will have the heifer and her calf to start out on a program aimed at a commercial dairy. He expects to be able to expand his acreage by that time and will work toward additional breeding stock.

The cast of 50 will be headed by Miss Jeanie Brown of Bryan who will portray Mary, Mother of Jesus. The Modern Choir and the Sing Stars, two college musical groups, will furnish atmosphere music.

Included in the cast is Miss Norma Jean Heinlen, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Carl F. Heinlen, 401 S. Marston, Ranger. She will play a Villager in the pageant.

Written by Dr. L. H. Hubbard, boyhood resident of El Paso and now president of TSCW, the play, in nine scenes, is an authentic dramatization of the birth of the Christ Child.

Mrs. McLaughlin also announced today that additional books have been contributed to the library by John Harvey Wylie, Mrs. Mary Young, Cecelia Mooney and Mrs. W. M. Bourdeau.

Truman Received Less Than Majority

NEW YORK, Dec. 7 (UP)—President Truman was elected with less than a majority of the total popular vote cast in the Nov. 2 election, United Press tabulations showed today.

The tabulation, with the official count from 42 states and unofficial count from six, showed a total popular vote of 48,682,679.

Of these, Mr. Truman received 24,059,194 votes, or 282,145 fewer than half the vote already tabulated.

The President, however, had a plurality of 2,138,129 votes over Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, whose popular vote was 21,921,065.

Navy Abandons Survivor Search; 33 En Route Home

JOHNSTON ISLAND, Dec. 7 (UP)—Thirty-three survivors of a mid-Pacific air crash were in route to Kwajalein island aboard the Carrier Redova today and the Navy discontinued the search for their four missing comrades.

The men were picked up by the Redova last night, 29 hours after she ditched the crippled C-54 transport plane. Shortly after their rescue the Hawaiian Sea Frontiers at Honolulu said the search for the four still missing was being discontinued. Survivors had indicated that the men were dead, the Navy said.

Capt. James M. Lane, skipper of the rescue ship, reported: "All survivors are on board. The four missing apparently are beyond hope."

Lane said the survivors had told him two men went down with the plane, another died Sunday night and the fourth jumped into the sea.

"All are believed drowned," Lane said. The message added that all the survivors were "well and happy."

Lt. Col. W. R. Calhoun, of Birmingham, Ala., pilot of the C-54, was among the rescued. He recommended that the search be discontinued.

Air force identified the missing men, all passengers, as: S-Sgt Robert C. Harrell of Milledgeville, Ga. S-Sgt William A. Colvin, Jr., of Cross City, Fla. Sgt. Charles T. Millspaugh of Fort Jervis, N. Y. Sgt. James A. Mitchell of Fort Wright, Wash.

The money is to be spent for the purchase of books with special attention to children's books. Mr. and Mrs. Gray have sponsored the children's section of the library and have made other valuable contributions to it.

The children's section also received another very fine gift Monday. It is a completely new set of tables and benches for the children's reading section, a contribution from James Smith of the West Texas Vocational Institute in Ranger.

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Union To Sell Christmas Trees

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., Dec. 7 (UP)—Christmas trees planted by the late President, Franklin D. Roosevelt, will be sold in seven upstate cities this month "as a community service" by the United Electrical Workers Union (CIO).

UE International Representative James Green said union locals will sell the trees at \$1.50 each and contribute any profits to the local's welfare fund. Each local has made arrangements with the late president's son, Elliott, to handle 5,000 trees.

Roosevelt will ship trees from the family estate in Dutchess county to Jamestown, Buffalo, North Tonawanda, Rome, Syracuse, Schenectady, and Poughkeepsie. He is personally directing the sale of his trees in New York City.

Youngster Dies In Bus Tragedy

CLEBURNE, Tex., Dec. 7 (UP)—Leaving from a school bus window to wave goodbye to a friend today was listed as the cause of death for Dwain Howeth, 11, son of Mr. and Mrs. Garland Howeth of the Glen Rose Star Route of Cleburne.

The boy was killed instantly when his head hit a telephone pole last yesterday afternoon.

Authorities said the mishap occurred as the bus was leaving the Glen Rose School, where the boy was a fifth grade pupil.

VOICES U. S. POLICY IN STRONG CALL FOR WORLD SOLIDARITY AGAINST REDS

Group To Probe Business Firms' Profit Excesses

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7 (UP)—A congressional subcommittee called two accounting experts today to testify on an economist's statement that business corporations are "overstating" their profits.

Sen. Ralph E. Flanders, R., Vt., chairman of the Joint economic subcommittee investigating profits, said "we want to find out just how much difference there is between real and reported profits."

He said he hoped the two accountants could help. They were William A. Hutton of the University of Michigan and George D. Bailey of Detroit, past president of the American Institute of Accountants.

Prof. Sumner H. Slichter, Harvard University economist, said yesterday that American corporations overstated their profits by about \$16,400,000,000 (B) in the past three years.

He said the practice was "highly misleading to stockholders, employees, customers, and the public." He did not accuse corporations of doing it deliberately.

PARIS, Dec. 7 (UP)—John Foster Dulles, in a major American policy address before the United Nations today, called upon the entire world to close ranks against Communist threats and violence.

Dulles spoke in the political committee during debate on the Korean problem. He accused Russia of supporting Communist terrorism in Korea and defying the United Nations.

Overwhelming solidarity against Communist violence and coercion offered those countries outside the Iron Curtain the best chance for peace, he said.

"We see violence, terrorism and internal dissension being stimulated from without by those who hope thereby to gain international objectives," Dulles said.

"Every non-Communist government in the world is, to a greater or lesser extent, subjected to these tactics.

"There is one elemental defense and that is through the UN to evidence at least a moral solidarity with those who, in violation of our charter, are subjected to such threats of violence.

"It may be that the greatest service the UN can render is to be an instrumentality for demonstrating that whenever those methods are used or threatened internationally,

the rest of the world community closes ranks to prevent the success of those methods by whatever peaceful means available, either to the UN as an organization or to member states acting pursuant to the charter."

Dulles' speech was the boldest plea for an anti-Communist bloc the United States has yet delivered before the UN.

The Assembly voted late yesterday to end the current session next Saturday night and reconvene in New York on April 1 to complete its unfinished business.

The Korean question, as well as Palestine and the problem of the Italian colonies, might be among the unsettled issues.

However, the general (steering) committee voted today to recommend to the General Assembly that the Italian colonies be taken up for immediate consideration.

The steering committee recommended that the issue be placed before a special political committee for at least preliminary consideration before adjournment Saturday.

The vote, six to four with three abstentions, was a partial victory for British delegates who have sought discussion of the Italian colonies at this meeting. Britain is interested in obtaining a United Nations trusteeship over Cyrenaica.

Dulles explained the American resolution outlining a program for ending the Korean dispute. He suggested a fresh UN commission be formed to observe the withdrawal of American and Russian occupation forces as early as possible.

He asked the UN to endorse the American-supported government set up in the United States occupation zone of Korea and to ignore the Communist government established in North Korea.

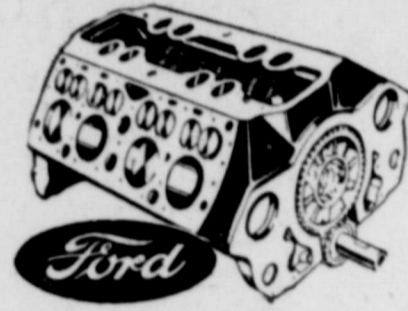

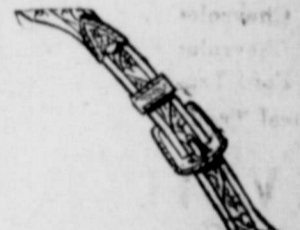

New Standards On GI Housing Loans Set Up

The Veterans Administration Saturday set minimum standards for GI loan houses.

They are designed to protect home-buying World War II veterans from shoddy construction and from being cheated by unprincipled contractors or salesmen. They go into effect December 15.

The rules specify the minimum quality of materials, construction techniques, workmanship, installation and structural details necessary for veterans loan guarantees.

The GI standards parallel the minimum construction requirements of the Federal Housing Administration. The veterans agency emphasized they are not intended to standardize house plans or discourage builders from including extra features.

Earlier this year the VA set up an appraisal service to provide builders a pre-construction price estimate of "reasonable value," based upon the building plans. Periodic inspections by VA representatives, as the appraised houses were being built, assured the veteran-buyer that the property was meeting specifications.

Gray said a veteran building a home of his own doesn't have to use the new building guide. Such a veteran needs only to meet the GI bill requirements that his house is "suitable for dwelling purposes" and that its cost does not exceed reasonable value as determined by VA.

Gray said his agency also is ready to aid in site selection and in architectural design and arrangement of veterans houses. These guides are not mandatory, but are strongly recommended.

Mr. Robert D. Deputy, VA Contact Representative, will be in Ranger each 1st and 3rd Monday each month, at the Chamber of Commerce from 9:30 A. M. to 12:00 Noon, to help any veteran, their dependents or beneficiaries to obtain any benefits to which they might be entitled under laws administered by the VA.

Gas Flare Case To Supreme Court

AUSTIN, Tex., Dec. 7 (UP)—The state of Texas was ready today to tell the Supreme Court the merits of a state Railroad Commission order which would have shut down 16 oil fields accused of wasting 116,800,000,000 (b) cubic feet of natural gas every year.

The state opened its second battle with the oil operators last night by appealing directly to the Supreme Court to uphold the Railroad Commission's order.

The action came only a few days after Judge Charles O. Betts of 98th District Court had granted a permanent injunction preventing the commission from enforcing its order, which would prevent flaring of gas.

The injunction suit was filed by the Sterling Oil Co., operators of the Heyser Field, one of the 16 named by the commission in its close-in order.

Brady Bank Loss Estimate Grows

BRADY, Tex., Dec. 7 (UP)—Brady merchants said today that the loss suffered by a Brady bank that was burglarized yesterday was greater than first estimated. It was reported yesterday that the thieves got away with \$6,000 in cash and checks while the alarm was ringing. Bank officials said the robbers got away with \$960 in cash alone.

But three merchants told newsmen they believed the loss would exceed \$10,000. They said they had deposited over \$5,700 in checks and believed other merchants also had made heavy deposits.

Police said they had no clues.

Gulf Refinery Expansion Finished

PITTSBURGH, Dev. 7 (UP)—The Gulf Oil Corp. announced today the completion of a \$19,000,000 expansion program at its refinery in Port Arthur, Tex.

Gulf said new processing units installed at Port Arthur will enable the conversion of a greater portion of the incoming crude oil either to fuel oil or to gasoline, depending on the demand.

The new equipment could add 66,000 barrels to the refinery's daily crude charging capacity, the firm said.

New construction includes a desulfurization unit, a polyform unit, three atmospheric-vacuum topping stills and an extension of docking facilities.
