United Press Staff Correspondent PARIS, Dec. 11 (UP) - Russia still was fighting with the Western Powers today as the United Nations went into the closing hours of its unhappy Paris session.

Only two positive accomplishments stood out as the UN neared adjournment after more than two-and-one-half months of bickering and propaganda speeches - approval of a Human Rights Declaration which delegates believed might become a Magna Carta for the peoples of the world, and passage of a declaration outlawing geno-

Soviet delegate Andrei Vishinsky made clear that the East-West fight would be carried through to the moment of adjournment when he ignored western appeals for agreement on a watered-down Anglo-American plan for a conciliation commission for Palestine.

Vishinsky began what it appeared would be a fulldress oration in his typical pyrotechnic style by denouncing American and British "zig-zags" in Palestine policy, and accusing the two nations of "playing a double game" in the Holy Land.

### 168 New Oil Wells Swell Year's Total

AUSTIN, Tex., Dec. 11 (UP) -The Texas Railroad Commi sion reported today that 168 new oil wells were completed in the past week, boosting the year's total to 7,420.

The week's completion continued the year-long pace which was far ahead of the 1947 total. At this time last year, 5,475 oil wells had been completed.

Nine gas wells were brought in during the week, bringing the year's total to 672, compared to 608 at this time a year ago. The number of dry holes also

was above last year's figure, as 81 during the week boosted the total to 3,350, while 2,629 were eported at this stage last year. The commission also reported that the average daily oil allow-
