

A warm mass of air from the Gulf brought on the rain and sidetracked a cold front which peterd out before reaching Texas. Temperatures yesterday and last night were considerably above

readings were not representative of the size of the rain which began most places as a drizzle, then ieveloped into steady downpours.

The early morning readings included .27 inch of rain at Wich ita Falis, .13 at El Paso, .05 at Fort Stockton, .03 at Van Horn .09 at Presidio and San Antorio and traces at Amarillo, Big Spring, Lubbock, Lufkin, Brownsville and Laredo. Dallas, which had only a trace at 6:30 A.M., had more than .11 inch at mid-

The rain certainly is not coming oo soon, said Hamrick. The prolonged dry spell has laid the groundwork, say agricultural experts, for a return of dust bowl conditions of the mid-thirties.

Hamrick said the outlook was for the rains to continue ov most of the state today, tonigh remaining comparatively mild.





His left hand darts into his hip pocket and comes out with a piece of brown wrapping paper. His right hand produces a pencil stub from another pocket.

"How are you?" I asked. "Fine," he replied. "Nice weather, isn't it? Sunshine feels good."

Wearing blue overalls and a rellow shirt, he was at work in a metalcraft shop where he earns his living making perfectly formed ash trays and decorative bowls of hammered copper and aluminum. He is in his middle 50's. "What do you think of the
