Ranger will be indirectly represented at the Presidential Inaugural Ball in Washington, D. C., Jan. 20, according to a story appearing in the Colorado Springs, Colorado newspaper.

The representative will be Annie Laurie Jensen of Colorado Springs, formerly of Ranger and the daughter of V. V. Cooper, Sr., of Ranger.

Here's the way the Colorado Springs paper put it: "Thrill of a lifetime" is how Annie Laurie Jensen described her reaction to the news that she was chosen to attend the Presidential Inaugural Ball in Washington, D. C., Jan. 20.

"It's my first Inaugural Ball and something I've always dreamed of, but never thought I'd quite realize."

Mrs. Jensen, widow of a World War I veteran, is from Ranger, Tex. She has been a resident of Colorado Springs for about a year and a half, and owns the apartment house in which she lives at 805 North Tejon St. Her son, Carl, 26, is employed with the Stewart & Stevenson Construction Co. in Houston, Tex. He received a degree as a mechanical engineer from Texas Tech. in Lubbock, Texas, in 1947.

Mrs. Jensen will leave from Denver for Washington on Jan. 15, at 2 p. m. She will be in a party including Mr. and Mrs. Barney L. Whitley (he is Democratic national committeeman) and Dr. and Mrs. Lester E. Thompson (she is Democratic national committeewoman). They expect to arrive in Washington on Monday.

For traveling, Mrs. Jensen plans to wear a tailored suit of black with a gold blouse, and off-the-face hat of black velvet with a large gold pin adorning the front of the brim. Over her suit, she will wear a short fur jacket.

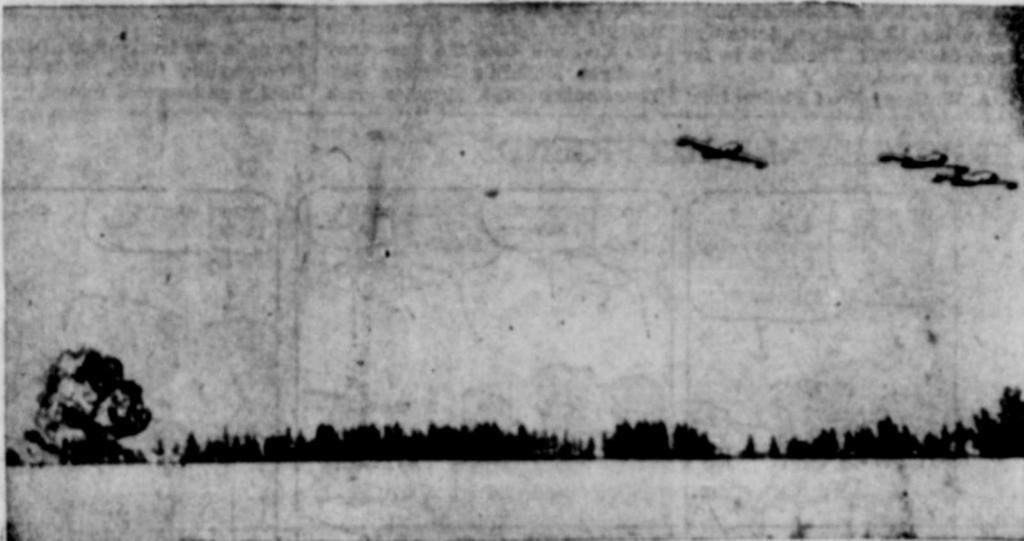
For the ball, Mrs. Jensen will wear a black formal with slender crepe skirt, bodice of black lace over pink, and a short bolero of the same material as the skirt. Black elbow-length gloves and a necklace of pink pearls, and silver slippers will complete the costume. Her evening wrap will be of black velvet.

For the reception given by the Colorado State Society of Washington, D. C., on Jan. 19 at the Willard Hotel, Mrs. Jensen will again choose smart black in a simple dress with rounded neckline and long sleeves. The front of the blouse is trimmed in glittering sequins of gold and black. Her small, close-fitting hat will be trimmed with a feather plume and a veil studded with gold sequins.

Mrs. Jensen was active in political affairs in Texas where she campaigned for Congressman Clyde L. Garrett in 1944. She served on the Democratic campaign committee in Colorado Springs during the last election, and is committeewoman of her precinct. No. 16, Mrs. Jensen is also president of the Texas Club here in town.

Funeral arrangements for Mrs. D. D. Kolp of Fort Worth, the former Aline Gholson of Ranger, were pending today, awaiting the arrival of a son, Donald D. Kolp, Jr., of Cincinnati. Mrs. Kolp was the daughter of Mrs. Virginia Gholson of Fort Worth, formerly of Ranger and the niece of the late John M. Gholson of Ranger, and of Mrs. Hayden Neal of Ranger.

Mrs. Kolp, 51, was found dead and her husband, 52, unconscious in their residence at 2221 Mistletree Ave. in mid-afternoon Sunday. Kolp was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital, where attendants reported the former Houston banker was responding to treatment satisfactorily after being placed in an oxygen tent to overcome the effects of natural gas.

### REJECTS BRITAIN'S SECOND NOTE OF PROTEST ON PLANE INCIDENT

Washington Turns Cold Shoulder To Britain's Plea For Aid In Crisis

UNITED PRESS STAFF CORRESPONDENT TEL AVIV, Jan. 10 (UP)—Israel charged Britain today with seeking to "torpedo" Israeli-Egyptian peace talks, and sharply rejected a second British note protesting Israeli shooting down of British planes Friday.

An Israeli government spokesman announcing that the new British note had been rejected said it had been properly addressed to the "Israeli Government" but that the text of it had referred to "Jewish authorities in Tel Aviv" rather than to the government of the Jewish State.

A protest note sent yesterday by the British was rejected because it was addressed to the "Jewish authorities in Tel Aviv." Britain has not granted diplomatic recognition to the Israeli government.

### New Ruhr Authority Is Just Another of Many Committees

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—Faster than the Germans can dig themselves out of their own war ruins and rubble, the Allied governments now seem to be trying to bury them in a maze of red tape. The litter of control agencies, groups, commissions, committees and authorities now imposed on the German economy probably beats anything thought up by Berlin bureaucracy under the Nazis.

Latest outfit to be proposed for the Allied government organization chart is the new Ruhr Authority. It has just been announced in London, following six weeks of negotiations by representatives of six countries—the U. S., Britain, France, Belgium, Luxembourg, Netherlands—and the Allied military governors, speaking for occupied western Germany.

What the new Ruhr Authority is supposed to do is spelled out in a four-page communique and a 14-page draft agreement. Approval of this agreement by the six governments is expected by March 1. But, after wading through this wordage, some doubts may remain as to how much authority this Ruhr Authority will really have.

ANYONE looking for a permanent solution to the age-old riddle of the Ruhr therefore looks in vain at the proposed agreement. The troublesome question of ultimate ownership of Ruhr industries was not even considered in London. All that was done by the six powers was to set up another committee.

Take a look at the existing structure. At the top of the heap is the Allied Control Council—a four-power committee which no longer exists because of Russian non-co-operativeness. The three western zones of Germany are supposed to be run as a single economic unit, except that the French aren't fully co-operating, too. So there are numerous bi-zone "committees" to run American and British zones.

Administration of breaking up Ruhr cartels and monopolies is administered by American-British military governments. Also under the bi-zone administration are Coal and Steel Control Groups.

Then there is a Military Securities Board. It is supposed to see that Ruhr production is not used for rearmament of Germany.

Finally you come to the proposed Ruhr Authority. It seems to be set up in a kind of vacuum. It is an independent agency. It takes orders from no one, reports to no one. It has no authority to enforce whatever decisions it might make.

THE Authority's principal purpose is to allocate distribution of Ruhr coal, coke, pig iron and steel among domestic production and exports. But there is some question as to what it has to allocate. German steel production was limited to 10,700,000 tons a year by the Four-Power Allied Control Commission when it was still functioning. The idea was to confine production to what the Germans would need for their peacetime civilian economy. Thus far, German steel production has never reached this figure. Therefore, there is no surplus over domestic needs for allocation.

Creation of the Ruhr Authority may be considered a constructive move, however, in that it looks ahead to the day when Ruhr production will be up to capacity and there will be something to allocate.

EA—the U. S. Economic Co-operation Administration for the Marshall Plan—is working to build up Ruhr production. So is the OEEC—the 16-nation Organization for European Economic Co-operation.

The Ruhr Authority has no official connection with, or responsibility to, either of these recovery outfits, although it is supposed to coordinate its work with them. In fact, there is one provision in the new draft agreement which says that if the Ruhr Authority makes a decision that will increase the financial burden of U. S. occupation of Germany, the American Military Government may veto that decision. This makes the Ruhr Authority even less potent.

## Water Search Brings Gas Boom

CLINTWOOD, Va. (UP)—Residents of this mining town drilled two wells hoping for water during a drought last fall and hit natural gas instead both times. It brought on one of the largest wildcat natural gas developments in the country.

The development, being financed by the Clinchfield Coal Corporation, sprawls over more than 1,000,000 acres of mountain land in three southwest Virginia counties.

Engineers of the development have packed in the largest cable drilling equipment available and 100,000 feet of pipe. They plan to drill as deep as 10,000 feet into the Appalachians if necessary to strike a rich field.

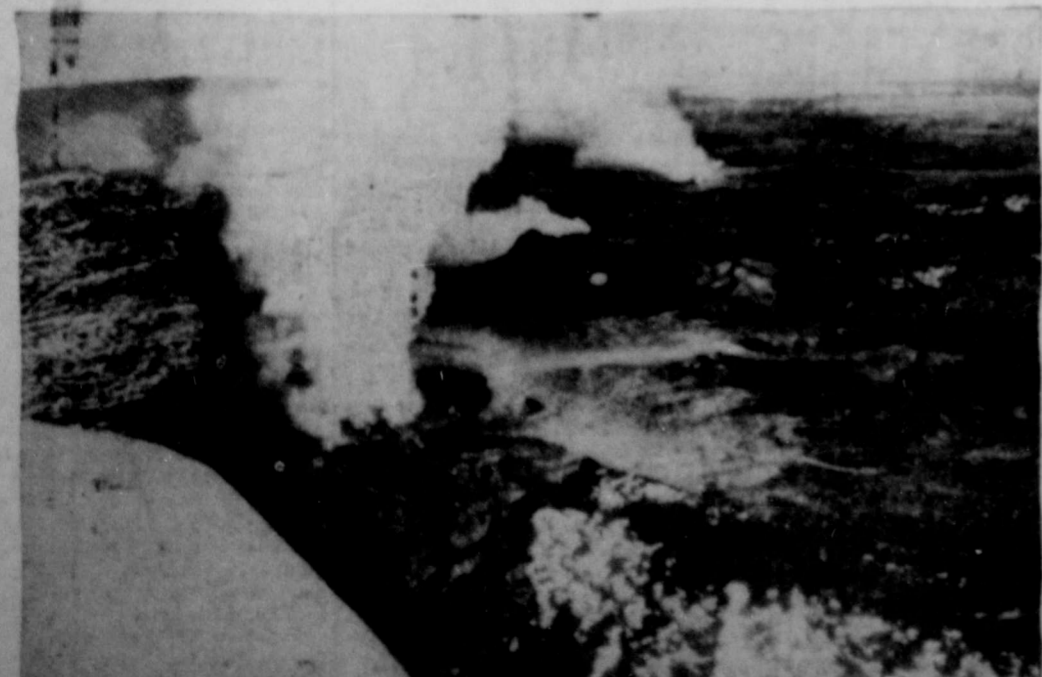
