The annual March of Dimes along the Gulf coast then north campaign will officially get under way tomorrow, January throughout the nation.

Joe Collins, Eastland county chairman, is hoping for a total contribution of \$5,500-or over twice as much as last year. A high quota of cases in the county last year necessitated the borrowing of \$1,550 from the National Foundation. This sum must be repaid this year.

#### FCC Sees Big Year Ahead For Booming Video Industry

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—Here is Federal Communications Commission Chairman Wayne Coy's size up on television prospects for

Seventy-four new stations to be completed, bringing the total to 122. A year ago there were only 17 in operation. Applications for licenses to operate 312 more stations are frozen until engineers solve problem

to operate 3.12 more stations are frozen until engineers solve problem of "tropospheric interference." There are two approaches—synchronizing all stations on same channel, or increasing distance between co-channel stations to more than the present 150-mile limit.

The number of television sets that will be in operation a year from now is put at about 2,750,000. Today there are 1,000,000. A year ago there were only 200,000. Big date in TV is Jan. 12, when East and Midwest stations will be linked by co-axial cable.

Arthur M. Hill had to resign as head of National Security Resources

Arthur M. Hill had to resign as head of National Security Resources Board because Greyhound Bus companies demanded his return to head their organization. Hill had wanted to stay in Washington until his overall mobilization bill was presented to President Truman and Congress. Original deadline for submitting the bill was Dec. 15. Now it is said the bill will be ready shortly.

The job of presenting it will now fall on NSRB Vice Chairman Richard E. Gillmor, president of Sperry Gyroscope. Gillmor had originally planned to go back to private business before the end of 1948. The actual job of drafting the mobilization bill, which introduces many sweeping controls over all phases of the economy, has been under Kenneth D. Johnson, NSRB general counsel. Johnson is a 50-year-old former district court judge in Quincy, Mass. He is a veteran of both World Wars, enlisting in War I as a private, coming out of War II a colonel and special assistant to Secretary of War Robert Patterson.

AN American official just returned from Japan reports that after the An American official just returned from Japan reports that after the November election, some Japanese could not conceal their astonishment that President Truman had been elected. "How can this be?" one Jap demanded. "We have been assured that General MacArthur has approved the candidacy of Governor Dewey. Surely General MacArthur would not allow this to happen." The American then assured the Jap that General MacArthur was a very broad-minded man and would probably permit President Truman to continue in office despite the general's own preference for Dewey. The Jap was relieved to know that this would not lead to an ugly incident.

Members of the Hoover Commission, discussing rumors that their report on government reorganization would be by-passed, attributed the stories to union leaders who feared that Hoover would recommend abolition of the Labor Department. When Hoover heard this he wired several top union officials that it wasn't true, and he invited them to give their suggestions as to how the Labor Department could be strengthened. So far, he has received no reply.

A LCOHOL Tax Unit in Treasury's Bureau of Internal Revenue, which somehow got the job of making harmless the souvenir automatic weapons brought home by war veterans, now reports the job is about done. During the past two years, Alcohol Tax Unit agents have inspected 97,466 weapons and have removed the firing apparatus from over 12,000 of them. Just after the end of the war these guns were ught up by gangsters, and accounted for many deaths.
