El Paso, Texas, Jan. 28. (UP)- American Air Force and Navy planes ranged over wide areas of Europe, Africa and the Atlantic today in search of a missing B-20 Super-Fortress from Biggs Base here.

The plane with 15 U.S. airmen aboard, disappeared yesterday on a 3,000-mile flight from Dakar, in French West Africa, to its base in England.

The plane, one of the 97th Bombardment Group, left Biggs Base on Nov. 2. and had been based in England.

U. S. Air Force said two search operation headquarters had been set up-one in England and the other at Port Lyauey, in French Morocco.

British-based B-29s were ordered to search as far south as the north coast of Spain but foggy weather restricted their activity.

Three B-17 bombers in the North African area were sent from the Air Force base at

Air Force authorities in Eng land said the missing plane should long since have exhausted its fuel and it "definitely is down its somewhere."



## 3 Dead 5 Injured In Elevator Fire

BOSTON, Jan. 28 (UP)-Three hundred commuters escaped through an emergency exit when a flash fire swept through an elevator "shaft and tower of a subway station, killing three persons and injuring five others.

Police found the burned bodies of two women and a man, all un-dentified, who had fallen in their flight on a narrow stairway leading to the tower. The five injured persons were subway employes who were at work in the tower The station is the only one of its kind on the Metropolitan transit Authority system. Passengers are carried by huge elevators to the street level where there is a tower, about a story and a half high. "Part of the tower serves as an elevator shaft and above that there is office space.

The Atlantic station is the first stop outside the tube that extends under Boston Harbor from Maverick Station in East Boston to the city proper.







## ICE AGAIN STRIKES TEXAS TELEPHONE LINES

ON THE HEELS of one of the most widespread ice storms in Texas history, which did about two million dollars worth of damage, another blanket of ice this week spread over much of Texas, leaving new wreckage from Oklahoma to Temple, and west to Pecos.

North and East Texas, on the edge of the first January ice area, bore the brunt of the new storm. Thousands of telephones were silenced. Many cities were isolated from communications with the outside world as wires snapped and poles crashed to the ground under the heavy weight of the ice. Only a few lines were available to many other points.

#### ICE DAMAGE IS WIDESPREAD

By early Thursday, 1,400 poles were down in Northeast Texas, 11,000 wire breaks were reported, and 1,250 long distance circuits were out of service.

Additional crews of workmen started rolling into the stricken







give \$250 from the Rotary Club to the March of Dimes fund. Now, it's only a matter of the Rotary Club cooperating.


