



News From Olden Assassin Shoots Iranian Shah

TEHRAN, Feb. 5 (UP)-Moham ed Reza Pahlevi, 30 Shah of Iran, was reported by court attaches to be in satisfactory condition today after being wounded twice in an attempted assassination.

The Shah was shot in the back and through the face late yester day on the steps of Tehran University by an assassin disguised as a newspaper photographer.

Three bullets passed harmlessly through the Shah's hat even tho ugh the assassin fired at pointblank range, court attaches said. They said the Shah was hit in the pouth but that the bullet did not injure any bone. The wound in the back was superficial, they said.

Martial law and a curfew was imposed immediately in Tehran. Similar measures were expected to be imposed in the provinces.

The assassin was set upon by the Shah's aides and police. He was beaten so seriously he had to hospitalized


