Burleson Announces A Revision On Farm Vehicle Operators

WASHINGTON — Congressman Omar Burieson today announced that the Department of Transportation has indicated its intention to revise its commercial vehicle driver quilification regulations insofar as they apply to drivers of certain vehicles controlled and operated by farmers. This action followed consultations and study within the Department, with the Department of Agriculture, with farm group representatives and other interested parties.

Texas Water Rights Commission Issues Show-Cause Order on Dam

AUSTIN — The Texas Water Rights Commission issued a show-cause order to Warren H. Elliott of Rochester, directing him to appear before the Commission on June 21, to show why a dam and reservoir he constructed across Eubank Creek, in the Brazos River Besin in Callahan County, should not be removed.

The Water Rights Commission conducted a study and field investigation after receiving a complaint by West Texas Municipal Water District against Elliott.

Dogma and creedalism have so obscured the minds of many thinking people that they do not see the plain pronouncements of the scriptures about what it takes to make one a Christian. The religious world sadly abuses Christianity by calling many "Christianis" who have not the remotest qualifications that are necessary and fundamental to becoming a Christian.

what shall we use as a rule for determining just what a Christian is? It is first necessary that we be agreed upon what is to be accepted as the source of authority for answering the question. All preconceived ideas, preferences, traditions, denominational dogmas, and regard to consequences must be laid aside if we are to agree on one source (an only one) of authority. So, in order to learn just what makes a Christian, we must go to the original source of Christianity — the sacred words of the New Testament. We must be willing to accept them as the only and the final authority for what makes one a Christian (2 Tim. 3:16,17).

Having now established what we shall account authority, we are ready to examine the hat are absolutely essential in order for one Christian.
