FRANKFURT. March 3 - (UP) - American troops tightened their blocade of eight Russians in the Soviet Repatriation Mission's headquarters today, sealing off the street against all bystanders and traffic.

The blockade was tightened after one of the Russians appeared at the gate this morning, asked for a newspaper and was obliged by a Lieutenant of military police on guard to prevent anything from reaching the Russians.

The American Lieutenant who broke his own blockade was continued on duty under orders not to repeat the incident, but the officer in charge, Provost Marshall Col. S. A. Wood, was extremely provoked.

"I don't want any airlift starting here," Wood snapped after his troops ordered photographers to move away from the front of the blockaded building and stand across

## **Grave Digger**

NEW YORK, March 3 (UP)-Francis Cardinal Spellman, Ro-man Catholic Archbishop of New York, laid aside his vestments today to help dig graves at Calvary Cemetery where a seven-weeks-old strike has held up the burial of 1,020 bodies.

The Cardinal, undaunted by taunts of "strike breaker" from officers of the United Cemetery Workers (CIO), said he would lead 100 seminary students through the picket lines to assist him with the task.

"This is the most important work I've had in my 10 years in New York," he said. "We'll do the best we can."

Spellman declared that the food, tobacco and agricultural workers of America, with which the UCW is affiliated, is a "wellknown Communist dominated un ion," and that he believed the strikers were misled. The strike, he said, was a "moral issue.





#### Strike Settlement Plan Rebuffed

TEXAS CITY, Tex., March 3-(UP) - A proposal to settle the six-week strike at the Carbide and Carbon Chemicals Corp. plant by a mass meeting received a cold shoulder today from at least one side in the wage dispute.

Mayor Lee A. Robinson came up late yesterday with the idea of a public forum "in the interest of public sentiment," and suggested that representatives of the company and of the striking maintenance and Operators Union (AFL) take part.

Reaction was slow but definite. N. Newman, secretary of the Galveston Building and Trades Council, observed, "a strike can' be settled in public hearing."





#### Installment **Buying Controls**

WASHINGTON, March 3 (UP) Government controls over installment buying will be eased Monday, giving purchasers more time to pay for automobiles and other durable goods.

The relaxation was ordered by the Federal Reserve Board. The action marked the first softening of consumer credit controls since they were reimposed last Sept. 20 at the height of the price rise. Here is the way installment buy-

ng will be affected: Automobiles - Under present egulations, consumers must make a down payment of one-third of the purchase price and pay off the balance within 18 months. Under the new order, consumers still down payment, but they will be given 21 months to pay the bal-

For your health's sake, urge your State Legislators to vote for the Minimum Standards

TOPEKA, Kans, March 3 (UP) liquor legally in their homes and private clubs Saturday night for the first time in 68 years.

A bill legalizing the sale, possession and consumption of liquor needed only to be signed by Gov. Frank Carlson and to be published in the official state paper.

It was passed by both the Senate and House of Representatives late yesterday after almost two months of legislative wrang-


