### Students Make **Burials Possible**

NEW YORK, March 4 (UP)-Burials were resumed today at strikebound Calvary Cemetery where Catholic Seminary students are digging graves for 700 un buried dead under the persona direction of Francis Cardinal Spellman.

The Cardinal said he would be at the cemetery to oversee the grave-digging "every day" until the job is completed or the strike of 240 members of the CIO Cemetery Workers is settled. Cemetery officials estimated the job would take two or three weeks.

A hundred young students for the priesthood worked all day yesterday and opened 90 graves. Spellman said the regular workers averaged only 42 a day. The students still must complete graves for a backlog of over 600 bodies in addition to graves for 30 new funerals a day.

The strikers, all Catholics, said they were particularly bitter because the Cardinal had selected students from a seminary they support financially to act as strikebreakers." They are, demanding a five-day, 40-hour week for the same wage of \$59.40 they have been receiving for a six-day week. Spellman said the union and its demands were "Communist inspired."
