### King Withdraws From City Race

## IMPRISONED 10 YEARS, BOY FINDS WORLD AMAZING PLACE

BOSTON, March 15 (UP)—Scores of New England parents today offered to adopt a 14-year-old boy who was imprisoned in a tiny room for 10 years by his mother because he allegedly was illegitimate and she was ashamed of him.

The plight of Gerald Sullivan was revealed in Roxbury District Court yesterday when his mother, Mrs. Anna Sullivan, 45, who has three other children, was arraigned on a charge of neglect of a minor child. She was released in \$1,000 bail pending a hearing tomorrow.

The boy, looked like a "wild animal" and wearing cast-off women's clothing, escaped from his "cell" Sunday and was roaming the streets barefooted when found by a policeman. The officer at first thought he was a girl because of his thick, shoulder-length curls.

Questioned by authorities, the youngster told a fantastic tale. He did not know whether he was a boy or a girl. He could neither read nor write. When shown a picture he said it was "a little baby." He never had seen a dog or cat.



When his mother was gone, the boy was occasionally let outdoors by his brother John, 20, one of the two brothers in the Marine Corps. The rest of the time the youngster was locked in the room. His mother brought him meals on a tray. He learned to speak English by placing his ear to the door of the room and listening to others in the house.

When he was picked up by police, Gerald thought they were sailors. He saw his first bicycle and had his first automobile ride. At the Foster home he played with children for the first time in his life.

Asked how he felt toward his mother, the boy replied: "I'll never love her again. She was very bad to me. She starved

The boy gazed wide-eyed at everything he saw. He was almost at a loss when taken to a foster home and given a room that contained a bed, electric lights and radio. His tiny, six-by-nine "cell" had contained only an army cot and nothing else. No pictures on the walls. No toys or games.

Investigation revealed the boy had been born in 1934 and then was boarded out for four years. Then his mother took him home and locked him up, telling her other children he was a cousin.

Mrs. Sullivan reportedly told police her husband had left her about 14 years ago and she hadn't seen him since. She allegedly said he departed when she learned she was about to bear another man's child. When Gerald's father died, the boy was removed from the house where he had been boarded and returned to his mother.

All Gerald could see from his room was a few tree tops and a patch of sky. Occasionally an airplane flew by. The lone window, barred with chicken wire, faced a blank factory wall. He told police he learned the time of year by the state of the tree tops.

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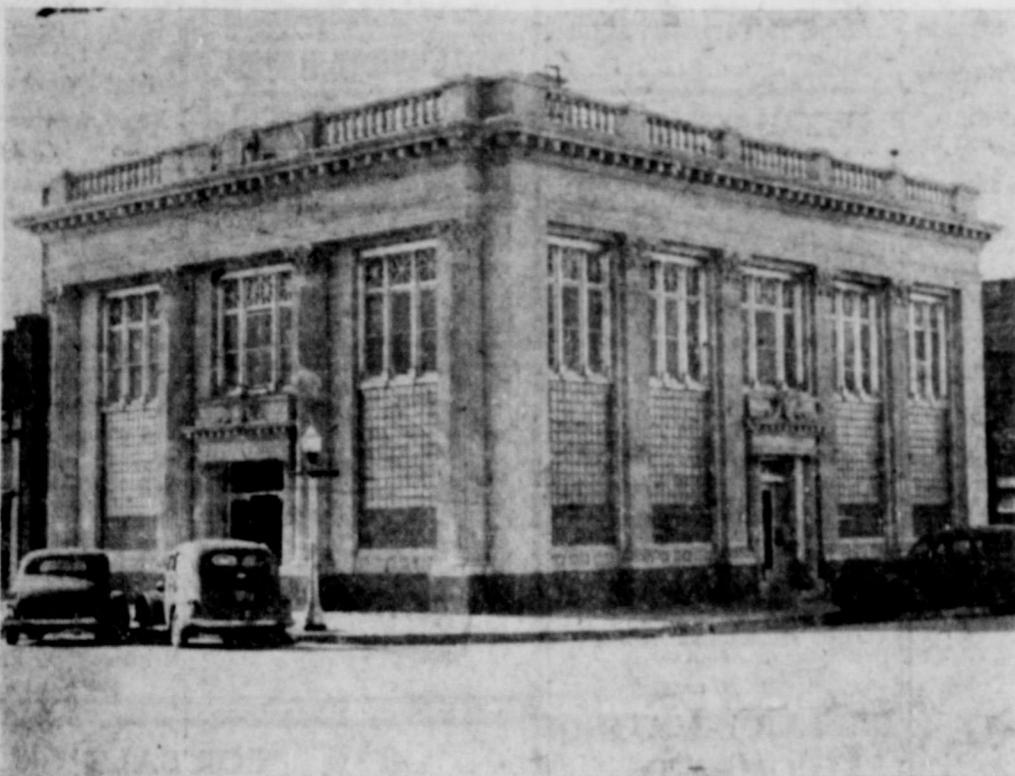

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## Ben Hogan Makes Marked Recovery

EL PASO, March 15 (UP)—Bantam Ben Hogan, refreshed by his first dose of sunshine since early February, looked forward eagerly today to trading his wheelchair for a golf club.

That transformation seemed closer than at any time since the tough little linksman was nearly fatally injured Feb. 2 in an auto-bus crash near Van Horn, Tex.

Hogan, whose casts were laid aside a week ago, rolled his wheelchair onto the grounds of Hotel Dieu Hospital yesterday for the first time since his admittance with a broken pelvis, a fractured collarbone and broken ribs.

Royal Hogan, Ben's brother, revealed in Fort Worth that he was returning to El Paso this week-end, and hopes of bringing his famous golfing brother back with him to Fort Worth.

"I think he'll be coming home soon, but I can't say when," Royal Hogan said. "All of Ben's fractures are in good shape now, some X-rays were made last Thursday and the results were good."

The diminutive golfer's recovery has been rapid since a blood clot which posed a threat to his life was sidetracked two weeks ago by Dr. Alton Ochaner, New Orleans surgeon.

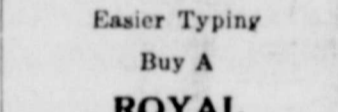
Hospital authorities permitted Ben to sit on the side of his bed last Friday and later, in a chair beside the bed, his brother reported.
